20 AL, BCL men hurt as car hits them in Sylhet

At least 20 leaders and activists of local Awami League and Bangladesh Chhatra League were injured as the private car of Finance Minister AMA Muhith hit them in Sylhet city's Shibganj area yesterday.

Some of injured are Kabirul Islam Kabir, assistant personal secretary (APS) of Shafiqur Rahman Chowdhury who is general secretary of the district unit AL; Abul Hossain, APS of AK Abdul Momen Chowdhury (brother of the finance minister); and BCL leaders Mosarraf Hossain, Jakir Ahmed and Lokman Ahmed.

Among the injured, 12 were admitted to MAG Osmani Medical Collage Hospital, hospital sources said.

The car's brakes failed while they were waiting for the minister alongside a road after the Juma prayers, Kotwali Police Station Officerin-Charge Gousul Hossain quoted the driver as saying.

The minister was not in the car, OC added.

Why cultural events curtailed on DC Hill premises

JS committee on cultural affairs ministry asks Ctg DC

The parliamentary standing committee on cultural affairs ministry has sent a letter to the deputy commissioner of Chittagong asking about the "cap" on cultural programmes on the Chittagong DC Hill premises.

Cultural Affairs Minister Asaduzzaman Noor told it to reporters in the sideline of a programme at Chittagong District Shilpakala

Academy on Thursday. Contacted, DC Zillur Rahman said he had received the letter. He, however,

could not specify the date. "We have received the letter recently and are preparing a draft...," he said. "We haven't banned cultural programmes at the DC Hill, but we want to bring a discipline in this regard," he said.

"... Many organisations have mushroomed and they want to hold programmes there [DC Hill]," he said. "If all of them are allowed to hold events, there will be at least three programmes a day."

"Alongside the residences of divisional commissioner and deputy commissioner, there is a residential area consisting around a hundred houses in the area," he said. "If programmes take place every day, it will become impossible to live there."

Moreover, the place gets dirty and use of loudspeakers during the events creates sound pollution.

"We want to formulate a rule under which it would be mentioned which programmes could be organised on the DC Hill premises and who would be permitted...," he said.

Contacted, Rashed Hasan, president of cultural organisation Prama Abritti Sangsad, said if the DC's intention was not to allow just any organisation to hold programmes, it could have been done so under the present rule. There was no need to restrict cultural programmes.

"Under the present rule, interested organisations have to apply to the DC for permissions. He could then easily verify which organisations are genuine and which are not."

On September 23 last year, Housing and Public Works Minister Eng Mosharraf Hossain after joining a cleaning campaign at the DC Hill told journalists that different organisers dump rubbish on the premises during programmes and make the place dirty.

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With the month-long Dhaka International Trade Fair drawing to a close, a huge weekend crowd throngs the ground in the capital's Agargaon yesterday.

A "remarkable progress" has been made in the areas of security, connectivity, development cooperation, cultural exchange, power trade, commerce and defence exchange during the last nine years since Prime Minister Hasina assumed office in 2009, he added.

The foundation of strong relations between Bangladesh and India was laid Sheikh Mujibur Rahman who took the initiative of regional cooperation in truly transformed."

FROM PAGE 4 He rather put the onus on some unfavourable policies pursued by the government that hiked up the LPG prices. He cited high licence fee of Bangladesh Energy Regulatory Commission (BERC) and limitation in importing over 3,000MT LPG vessels as examples.

Energy Division Additional Secretary Muhammed Ahsanul Jabbar, now in-charge of LPG related affairs, admitted the inordinate delay in finalising the LPG price policy. "We're working on it and the retail pricing formula will be in place within the next six months."

Contacted, State Minister for Power and Energy Nasrul Hamid expressed his frustration over the delay. "I'm not happy with the overall performance of the Energy Division as it achieved only 9 percent in the ADP (annual development programme) imple-

mentation." Industry insiders noted that in spite of the high price, LPG market is growing gradually in the country. In 2016, the total LPG market was around 400,000 MT and the demand shot up to over 500,000 MT this year.

The call reverberates through daylong fair at JU; Star reporter gets Conservation Media Award

Bird lovers flocked to Jahangirnagar University campus to enjoy a daylong bird fair yesterday.

People of different ages, especially children, were roaming around the campus to view various species of local

and migratory birds. On the Zahir Raihan Auditorium premises, there were around 12 stalls. Birds from 10 to 15 species in the form of mummy were displayed. A discus-

sion was also held there. Besides, children participated in a drawing competition where they drew

pictures of different birds. To create mass awareness about conservation of birds as well as biodiversity, books, posters, journals and calendars

were distributed among the visitors. The main attraction of the fair was to watch migratory birds making a stopover at the university lakes. With

telescopes and binoculars, visitors especially the young ones thronged the lakes to enjoy the birds chirping and flying over the waterbodies.

The visitors gathered the information about the birds from four stalls set up at the venue.

Prof Kamrul Hasan of zoology said, "We are trying to reach the awareness message through the fair."

Around 69 species of guest birds usually visit the campus every winter along

with 126 native species, he said. However, due to noise pollution triggered by the movement of a large number of people and the continuous honking of vehicles, the quality of habitat required for migratory birds is degrading, said Prof Kamrul,
