Housewife found dead in Savar

Police recovered the body of a housewife from her house at Shimulia area of Savar yesterday.

The deceased is Rulia Akter, 20, wife of Nazmul Hossen of the area. Family members of the victim claimed that she was murdered by her husband and mother-in-law over a family feud.

Abul Kalam Azad, sub-inspector of Ashulia Police Station, said, primarily it is suspected that she was strangled as torture marks were found on her neck.

The body was sent to Dhaka Medical College morgue for an autopsy. Police are looking for Nazmul and his mother.

'Drug dealer' held in city

UNB, Dhaka

Armed Police Battalion (APBn) arrested an alleged drug dealer along with 226 bottles of contraband Phensedyl from the capital's Airport Road yesterday.

The arrestee was Raihan, 30, son of Mazdar, from Rajpara of Rajshahi.

Tipped-off, a team of APBn-5 conducted a raid in the area and made the arrest.

Bureaucracy collapsed due to politicisation

Says economist Dr Akbar Ali Khan

The bureaucracy in the country has collapsed due to its politicisation, eminent economist Dr Akbar Ali Khan said yesterday.

"When politics and bureaucracy are mixed and politicians hold the absolute power, bureaucracy cannot work properly," he said while delivering a public lecture.

"Such a politicisation becomes visible during promotions. If you are in the government's good book, then you will get promoted..." he added.

"Bangladesh is the only country where promotion takes place although there is no vacancy in that post," said Dr Akbar, a former top bureaucrat.

The Department of Public Administration of Dhaka University organised the lecture on the campus.

In the lecture, the former adviser to a caretaker government said politicisation and more than necessary posts in the administration, such as the post of additional secretary, create delay in the administrative work.

Pointing to the provision of the public order that allows the government to sack

any official who has served more than 25 years without showing any reason, Akbar said, "In such a situation, it is difficult to make bureaucracy effective."

About delay in the administrative work, he said a file has to pass eight to nine hands, from the section assistant to the minister, to accomplish a task. As a result, around five additional days get wasted.

"Let's say, all the officials are honest, nobody takes any bribe. But creating five extra posts [in the administration] delays decision making at least for five days," he said.

The country has more than 600 additional secretaries and every ministry has at least two to three such secretaries. Some even have more than 20, he said. The posts of additional secretary delay the office work in terms of decision-making, he added.

In the lecture, he also stressed the need for reforming the judiciary so that the trial proceedings can be finished swiftly.

"The main reason behind the delay in trial proceedings is the British law, which we follow. It is based on lawyers, where one party will win and another will lose. But the lawyers do not want to dispose of the suits," Dr Akbar said.

Nowhere to go

Woman treated at DMCH waits for family

For the last two months, Rakhi has been waiting for someone to come and take her home.

The forty-year-old hardly recalls her memories of life.

She was admitted to the burn unit of Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) with a leg injury and had a surgery on July 7 last year.

Rakhi was discharged from DMCH on November 22 last year.

According to the hospital record, the woman experienced an accident in Mugda area and locals admitted her to the hospital.

Now, she is living on the diets allocated for other patients with nobody to care for her and nowhere to go.

DMCH Director Brig Gen AKM Nasiruddin said they contacted the Department of Social Services. A process to send her to a government shelter in Faridpur is underway, he added.

of [being] bias, while at the same time denying that human rights violations have taken place in Myanmar," Lee said. "I would ask the authorities to rethink their position, and to put the victims first."

The UN envoy said she is determined to carry on -- to the best of her ability -- this very important task of helping the victims of human rights violations and abuses in Myanmar, as mandated to her by the United Nations system.

"I've a responsibility to speak on behalf of these victims, and I will not be deterred. This is why I am going ahead to visit neighbouring countries to reach out as far as possible to all victims and witnesses to learn of their experience," she said.

Yanghee Lee was appointed by the UN Human Rights Council in 2014 as the Special Rapporteur on situation of human rights in Myanmar.

The World Bank yesterday said the Rohingya crisis in Bangladesh is growing at a rapid pace and there is an urgent need to support the host communities to cope with the influx and to help the refugees who are extremely vulnerable.

After visiting the Rohingya camps in Cox's Bazar area, World Bank South Asia Region Vice President Annette Dixon praised the government of Bangladesh and its people for sheltering and caring for the large influx of Rohingya fleeing violence in Myanmar.

She said the World Bank was ready to work with the government to help the host community and the displaced Rohingya people in Cox's Bazar.

Foreign Minister AH Mahmood Ali on Thursday said the Rohingya problem can be solved permanently with sustainable return of Rohingyas to Myanmar.

DU won't issue IDs

Expressing solidarity with the students' movement, Prof MM Akash of the DU economics department said the university authorities could have easily solved the issue by talking with the demonstrating students rather than using activists of a student body to disperse them forcibly.

He also urged the university authorities to come up with a peaceful solution to the crisis.

On Monday, around 400 BCL activists foiled the demonstration of a section of DU students who were staging a sit-in in front of the vice chancellor's office, demanding

scrapping of DU affiliation with the seven colleges.

The BCL activists allegedly harassed some of the female students and took one of the coordinators of the protest inside the VC office and assaulted him there.

Then on Wednesday, around 100 students broke the collapsible gate of the Arts Building and demonstrated in front of the proctor's office with the demand of punishing the BCL men and forming a probe body including two student representatives to investigate the incident.

They also confined the proctor for several hours as he failed to give them

any assurance and later went to the vice chancellor and gave him an ultimatum to meet their demands within 48 working hours.

But in a surprise move, on Thursday night, the university authorities filed a case against 50 unknown students for vandalising the gate of the Arts Building and formed a three-member probe body to investigate the incident.

They also formed another three-member committee to investigate the Monday's incident. However, they did not include any student representative as per the demand of protesting students, said the students.
