

Siddikur ambles to home title

Siddikur Rahman ambled DHAKA to a four-stroke victory in the inaugural City Bank American Express Dhaka Open -- his third interna-

tional title on home soil in three years - at the Kurmitola Golf Club yesterday.

The two-time Asian Tour winner faced very little challenge from the field which featured golfers from the BPGA, PGTI and ADT - as he romped to a 14-under-par (274) total after a two-under in the final round yesterday.

Having started the day at 10-under, 33year-old Siddikur exchanged four birdies for two bogeys to scoop the winners' paycheque in this tri-sanctioned event with a total prizemoney of 60,000 dollars.

Siddikur had won the Chittagong Open, the last PGTI event held in Bangladesh last year, after having skipped the BTI Open, another PGTI event, in Dhaka two months earlier. He had won the previous edition of the BTI Open in 2016. Siddikur had also won the only other ADT event held in Bangladesh seven years ago.

The ace golfer from Kurmitola felt that his experience of playing around the world and knowing this golf course like the back of his hand attributed to this comfortable victory. "Home advantage and experience -I would say these two things counted. Since I play a lot of tournaments abroad, I have more experience. And the Indians don't play here that much. So the home advantage definitely counted as well," Siddikur told reporters after receiving the winner's paycheque of 10,500 dollars.

The win will be a huge confidence boost for Siddikur, who never lost the lead after the second round. He did not drop a single bogey on the first nine the entire week and was hardly challenged on the final day.

"Honestly I was very comfortable on the back nine. I made two birdies on the first nine and that helped a lot. Overall it has been a great week and I'm feeling healthy which is very important," said Siddikur.

While Siddikur was happy with winning his first international title since April, 2017,

he admitted he will miss playing in an Asian Tour event at home. The Bangladesh Open was held annually for the last three years, but this time there will be no Asian Tour event in Bangladesh. Siddikur's best effort in that particular event was a second-place finish in the last edition.

"I really miss that event," Siddikur said. "If I won that tournament today, I would have gone in the winner's category and got full exemption. I would have earned World Ranking points as well."

Although Siddikur did not need to put in much of an effort on the final day, it was Sweden's Malcolm Kokocinski who excelled with a 67 to grab the second position at 10under-par (278), with India's Shankar Das settling for the third a stroke behind.

Overall the performance of the local golfers was inspiring as some 30 golfer from among 59 made the cut, with Akbar Hossain grabbing fourth position. The youngster, who is tipped to be a future star for the country, ended with an aggregate o seven-under-par (281).

Jamal Hossain Mollah is the other Bangladeshi to finish inside the top ten with an aggregate of four-under-par (284).

It was historic day for the Siddikur family as Siddikur Rahman's wife Samaun Anjum Auroni became the first Bangladeshi female golfer to turn professional.

Auroni, a long-time follower of her famous golfer husband, was an accomplished golfer herself having taken up the game in 2010, the same year Sididikur won his first Asian Tour title.

Auroni was delighted in becoming the first female professional golfer from Bangladesh.

"This is a great day and an honour for me. I hope this inspires other female amateurs to follow the same path. Hopefully we will have women's professional tournaments in Bangladesh some day," Auroni said.

After making a mark in the local amateur scene, she decided to use her knowledge of the game, going for coaching certificates.

"I earned a D level certification in 2016 and a C level certification the following year. That, in effect, made my amateur status null and void. So I was waiting for this day," Auroni added.

Wozniacki says after beating Halep in final

An emotional Caroline Wozniacki finally lifted her first Grand Slam title at the 43rd attempt as she beat Simona Halep in three energy-sapping sets to win the Australian

Open on Saturday. The Dane, who will become the new world number one, burst into tears as she

secured the championship 7-6 (7/2), 3-6, 6-4 against the battling Romanian top seed on her first match point of a gruelling, epic encounter. "I've dreamt of this moment for so many years," said second seeded

Wozniacki after becoming the first player from Denmark to win a Grand Slam. "My voice is shaking. I never cry, but

this is a very emotional moment.

"I want to congratulate Simona, I know it's a tough day," she added after receiving the trophy from Billie Jean King.

'I'm sorry that I had to win today but I'm sure we'll have many matches in the future and it was an incredible match and an incredible fight and again, I'm sorry."

Wozniacki, 27, had to overcome bouts of nerves throughout the long match. She wobbled when serving for the first set at 5-3 and had to come through a tiebreak.

"I want to thank my fiance," she said, looking up to American basketball player David Lee in her box. "I was a nervous wreck this morning, I wanted to win so bad, but you calmed me down."

Both players needed medical attention on court before the Dane prevailed in 2hr 49min on Rod Laver Arena.

For Wozniacki, victory meant shedding at last the unwanted moniker of best player never to win a major, having reached the US Open final in 2009 and 2014, and first becoming number one in 2010. For Halep, who surrendered her num-

ber one status to Wozniacki in defeat, the wait goes on. "It's not easy to talk now but first of all I

want to congratulate Caroline," said Halep, who was also appearing in her third Grand Slam final and first in Australia. "She played amazing. It's been a great tournament for me. Of course I'm sad I

couldn't win today but Caroline was better than me. "But I will fight and hopefully I will face another challenge like I did today. I'm sad that I couldn't make it the third time, but

Wozniacki started the stronger, breaking Halep's opening service game with the early evening temperature still above 30 Celsius (86 Farenheit) before racing into a 3-0 lead.

maybe the fourth time will be with luck."

She had not won a set in either of her previous two Grand Slam final appearances and tightened visibly serving for this one, and the set headed for a tiebreak.

The Dane went 4-1 up before a second mini-break and two solid serves gave her the tiebreak 7-2.

Wozniacki was growing in confidence and Halep needed to save four break points at 1-1 in the second set in a brutal game that lasted 11 minutes.

Soon after Halep signalled to her coach Darren Cahill that she wasn't feeling well and there were worrying scenes as she had her blood pressure taken and an ice towel applied in the next changeover.
