





# Rashid Choudhury and his world of tapestry

#### LATE ARTIST'S SOLO EXHIBITION AT GALLERY CHITRAK

Rashid Choudhury (1932-1986) was a pioneering tapestry artist in Bangladesh who, to this day, is much appreciated for blending traditions with modern elements in his work. Art enthusiasts will now have the opportunity to view his works in a 14 day solo art exhibition featuring his tapestries and paintings at Gallery Chitrak in Dhanmondi.

State Minister for Power, Energy and Mineral Resources Nasrul Hamid inaugurated the exhibition as chief guest on January 28. The younger brother of the late artist, Major Zulfiqar H. Choudhury (Retd), and Professor Nisar Hossain, Dean, Faculty of Fine Art, University of Dhaka, attended the inaugural event as special guests. Renowned artist Professor Rafiqun Nabi presided over the programme.

"I tried to paint during childhood. But after getting admitted into Charukala, I transferred to the Department of Economics in University of Dhaka. I still paint every now and then. One of my paintings will be on display at the upcoming Dhaka Art Summit. I was never familiar with the artist Rashid Choudhury; but I saw his works at the National Parliament House, and later learnt much about him. His world of artistic creation will continue to inspire us," said Nasrul Hamid.

Renowned artist Nisar Hossain elaborated on the life and works of Rashid Choudhury. He also proposed to hold an exclusive seminar to help writers compose an authentic biography on Rashid Choudhury.

"Artist Rashid Choudhury was my teacher, who taught me much beyond the classrooms. He was a top-class international artist regarding his works of tapestry. Rashid Choudhury and his friends Qayyum Chowdhury, Imdad



Hossain, Abdur Razzaque and Murtaja Baseer were the pioneers of ushering in Bengali Renaissance during the '50s," said Rafiqun Nabi.

He used colours with vivid splendour to send a distinct message through his work, which still impresses art aficionados both at home and abroad.

To search for fresh themes and present them using a novel approach was Rashid Choudhury's forte. The artist established his uniqueness -- particularly in terms of design and colour composition. The saturation of colours, diagonal compositions and aesthetic elements distinguish his works. The display also includes some rare mixed and oil paintings along with a self portrait on charcoal.

Born in the village of Haroa in Faridpur district, Rashid Choudhury had completed his five-year course in fine arts from the Dacca Art College (now Faculty of Fine Arts, University of Dhaka) and attended a teachers' training certificate course at Asutosh Museum of Calcutta University. He had done his postgraduate studies under a Spanish government scholarship, and studied sculpture at the Central Escula des Bellias Artes de San Fernando in Madrid from 1956 to '57. He also studied sculpture, fresco and tapestry at the Academy of Jullian and Beaux Arts in Paris from 1960 to '64. The artiste received the first prize for fresco painting in Beaux Arts in Paris and first prize in RCD Biennale in Tehran. During his lifetime he was also bestowed with the Ekushey Padak and the Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy Award.

What are your expectations for "Inspector Notty K"? NF: The film has received a lot of positive response already, and so my expectations are getting higher over time. The film was made to cater to the demands of the audience, and all that matters is if people have a good time watching it in the movie theatres.

What character do you play in the film?

NF: I play a police officer named Samira, and I had never played a uniformed individual before. I had an amazing time on set, and it didn't take much time at all for me to become one with the role.

Have you ventured to the movie theatre to watch the film?

NF: I have seen it in a movie theatre in Kolkata, as it was

released earlier there, but I've yet to visit one here in Dhaka. I plan to do so very soon though, with my family. Why do you feel viewers will enjoy the film? NF: In the busy lives we all lead, we all need a little entertainment to recharge ourselves; whether it's by listening to music, watching a movie, or traveling. "Inspector Notty K" has already proved to be quite entertaining with viewers. It is also suitable for audience across all ages, so people can watch it

with their families. You have worked with Kolkata actor Jeet before. What is the experience like?

NF: I am quite comfortable working with Jeet and we share a good understanding, which is necessary to make a good film. In the film I play Samira, and he is cast as Notty K.

What do you hope to achieve in your career this year? NF: I'd like to be more selective with the films I am offered, so that I can ensure something good comes of it in the end. Whatever role I play, it will be worth it if it proves to be memorable for viewers.

### IFFR names winners of Ammodo Tiger Short Competition


Three filmmakers each win €5,000

A three-member professional jury announced the three winners of this year's Ammodo Tiger Short Competition at International Film Festival Rotterdam (IFFR) on Sunday. The winning films of the equal awards each worth €5,000 are "Mountain Plain Mountain" by Araki Yu and Daniel Jacoby, "Rose Gold" by Sara Cwynar and "With History in a Room

4" by Korakrit Arunanondchai. The jury also nominated "What's the Damage" by Heather Phillipson to compete in the short film category of the European Film Awards (EFA) later this year.

The jury consisted of Chinese filmmaker Ying Liang, Dutch graphic designer Mieke Gerritzen and Kenyan filmmaker Jim Chuchu. IFFR's Tiger Short Competition was recently renamed after its new partner Ammodo, an organisation supporting

## "Padmaavat" banned in Malaysia

Malaysia has barred controversial Indian period drama 'Padmaavat" from receiving a theatrical release. The announcement by Malaysia's National Film Censorship Board (LPF) was made on Saturday.

Its "not approved" ruling gives no explanation for the ban. But local media quoted LPF chairman Mohd Zamberi Abdul Aziz as saying: "The storyline of the film touches on the sensitivities of Islam. That in itself is a matter of grave concern in Malaysia, a Muslim-majority country." The film as directed by Sanjay Leela Bhansali sees a Muslim sultan waging war in order to be able to win a beautiful Hindu princess of the Rajput warrior class.

In India, the film was banned for

some two months after protests by Rajputs, but eventually was released on Thursday. India's censors required a title change and a disclaimer that explained that the film was not based on historical fact. The distributor in

Malaysia is expected to appeal the LPF decision to a separately constituted Film Appeals Committee on Jan 30.

Malaysia has a history of banning movies that are widely distributed elsewhere in the world. Last year it banned Disney's "Beauty and the Beast", before relenting and allowing it a PG13 certificate. Malaysia last year also prosecuted filmmaker Lena Hendry, for holding a private screening of a documentary "No Fire Zone: The Killing Fields of Sri Lanka."
