

## Attack on cops will not be tolerated: PM

UNB, Dhaka

Blasting the BNP for attacking police on Tuesday, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday warned that the government would not tolerate such attack anymore.

The PM came up with the warning after she adorned newly appointed Inspector General of Police Mohammad Javed Patwary with the IGP rank badge at the Gono Bhaban.

She said the law enforcement agencies were playing a strong role in maintaining law and order. "Even their members are sacrificing their lives in protecting people's lives and properties."

Hasina also sought cooperation from the people to root out terrorism, militancy and drug menace from the country.

Police perform many tough responsibilities, the PM said.

She also sought people's cooperation so that country's development continued.

On Tuesday, a group of BNP men attacked a prison van and snatched two detained fellow men from the vehicle near the Supreme Court area of the capital. Referring to the incident, Devdas said, "We are arresting those who are responsible for attacking police. The masterminds will be arrested and the drive will continue.

The BNP, on the other hand, is acting watchfully as Khaleda has alerted her party leaders and activists against "possible police harassment" over the verdict following the arrest of Gayeshwar Chandra Roy, said party insiders.

On Tuesday night, plainclothes police arrested BNP standing committee member Gayeshwar and party's executive committee member Onindo Islam Amit in the city.

The BNP also alleged that police raided the houses of many of its leaders, including Jamiruddin Sircar, Netai Roy Chowdhury, Abdul Mannan, Habib-Un-Nabi Khan Sohel and Shafiul Bari Babu, the same night.

A senior leader, seeking anonymity, told this newspaper yesterday that Khaleda advised her party men "not to fall in the trap of the government as it was pushing the BNP to go for confrontation".

"Madam [Khaleda] sent a special message to all the central leaders and high-ups of the party's associate bodies to be careful as the government will use law enforcers to arrest our leaders and activists," he said.

Meanwhile, party's Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir yesterday alleged that the government was provoking the BNP into creating an unstable situation ahead of the court verdict.

"Our top leaders are being arrested. The government is also issuing threats and carrying out drives to arrest them at a time when the situation is peaceful. They [government] themselves are destroying the stable political situation in the coun-

try," he said at a press conference at the party's Nayapaltan central office. He also alleged that the government's main target was to create

uncertainty centring the verdict and that's why the BNP leaders and activists were being detained.

The AL was yet to give any specific directives to its leaders and activists over the verdict. However, sources in the party said members of Dhaka City AL (South) would be on the streets "to assist law enforcers" on

February 8. "We asked our leaders and activists to remain alert and cooperate with the law enforcers to keep the situa-

tion normal. We will not allow BNP men to create any chaotic situation, Shahey Alam Murad, general secretary of Dhaka city AL (North), told the Daily Star.

## Khaleda's trial sees heated arguments

Proceedings interrupted for 10 minutes

Trial of the Zia Charitable Trust graft case was halted for around 10 minutes yesterday as the judge left the courtroom amid heated arguments between the defence and the prosecution. The Special Judge's Court-5, how-

ever, resumed the trial and the defence placed their arguments before the proceedings were adjourned until today. The Anti-Corruption Commission

filed the case in August 2011 with Tejgaon police accusing four people including BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia of abusing power to raise funds for the trust from unknown sources. The three other accused are Harris

Chowdhury, Khaleda's political secretary when she was in power between 2001 and 2006, Ziaul Islam Munna, assistant private secretary to Harris, and Monirul Islam Khan, APS of former mayor Sadeque Hossain Khoka.

Of them, Harris is on the run. On Tuesday, Public Prosecutor

Mosharraf Hossain Kajal completed the closing arguments and sought the highest punishment, seven years'imprisonment, for the accused. Khaleda appeared before the court

Munna, started his submission pointing to "discrepancies" in the testimonies of Harun-or-Rashid, the complainant and investigation officer of The prosecution alleged that huge

# Hasina outlines polls-time govt

Introduced in 1996 through a constitutional amendment, the caretaker government was constituted after the then partisan government's tenure expired.

Comprised of a chief adviser and 10 advisers, it had jurisdiction to carry out only routine work. Its main functions were to provide the EC with all sorts of assistance to hold free and fair parliamentary elections.

However, the non-partisan caretaker government system was abolished in 2011, generating a political crisis which resulted in the holding of a one-sided election in January 2014.

On the completion of four years of the current government on January 12, Hasina in an address to the nation said the next parliamentary election will be held under a polls-time government in line with the constitution, meaning she will hold the office of the head of

government during the election. After around three weeks, she yesterday outlined the framework of the

polls-time government. Earlier in January last year, an AL Defending the decision, some of the

The last caretaker government was constitutionally barred from making any policy decisions. Its size was also fixed by the constitution.

But there will be no such constitutional bar on the polls-time cabinet led by Hasina.

Amid growing political crisis before the 2014 parliamentary election, the then PM Hasina proposed forming an all-party election-time cabinet, and offered the then main opposition BNP to join it and take ministerial portfolios of its choice.

But the BNP rejected the offer.

In November 2013, Hasina formed a polls-time cabinet of 29 ministers with MPs from the AL, the Jatiya Party and the Workers Party.

The BNP boycotted the 2014 parlia-

mentary election. The crisis remains unresolved till date. With the next parliamentary election getting nearer, the issue of the mode of election-time government is dominating the political landscape as the BNP continues to demand a neutral polls-time administration.

quite known what to expect. "When we tried 'hello' and she did the sound... some emotional responses came from the trainers. For us (the scientists) it was very difficult

not to say anything ... " Seeking to measure orcas' ability to copy new sounds, Abramson and a team turned to Wikie, a captive killer whale at the Marineland Aquarium in

Antibes, southern France. Trained to perform tricks for Marineland visitors, Wikie was a good candidate as she had already learnt the

gesture commanding her to "copy" what her trainer does. As part of the trial, the killer whale was asked to mimic never-beforeheard sounds made by other orcas

with different dialects from different family groups.

Then, she was made to repeat human words.

In recordings of the experiment, Wikie takes several stabs at "hello". Every time, she voices two syllables with something resembling an "l" in the middle and an "o" at the end.

The most convincing attempt is a

deep, throaty sound, a bit like a cartoon demon might say "hello".

The orca also manages an eery whisper that does sound remarkably like "Amy".

But she seems to have more trouble with "One-Two-Three". The last syllable sounds a bit like a "raspberry" -that sound of contempt humans make by pushing the tongue between the lips and forcibly expelling air to produce a vibration.

Abramson said the orca's ability to mimic does not mean she understands what she is saying.

The experiment was designed in such a way that no meaning or context was attached to any of the words.
