

DSE suffers biggest fall in 4.5 years

The Dhaka Stock Exchange saw its biggest fall in four and a half years yesterday as political unease looms large on investors' minds.

The DSEX, the benchmark general index of the premier bourse, fell 133.15 points, or 2.21 percent, to close the day at 5,888.29, the lowest in three months.

Selling pressure was seen on stocks from banks, financial institutions, and engineering sectors. Turnover, however, rose 10.76 percent from the previous session to Tk 364.90 crore. **READ MORE ON B1**

Maldives political crisis deepens

Govt warns top court against impeaching president over his refusal to release political prisoners; 2 opposition MPs held

The beleaguered Maldives government yesterday ordered police and troops to resist any move by the Supreme Court to arrest or impeach President Abdulla Yameen over his refusal to release political prisoners.

Police detained two opposition lawmakers as they returned to the country yesterday, as the political crisis in the Indian Ocean archipelago nation deepened with its top court pitted against the president.

The main opposition Maldivian Democratic Party (MDP) said its MPs tried to stage a meeting in defiance of a weekend order suspending parliament, but they were pushed back by armed troops.

Security forces have been deployed inside the national parliament -known as the People's Majlis -- since March last year when Yameen ordered them to evict dissident lawmakers.

The president's crackdown on dissent has tarnished the Maldives' image as an upmarket holiday paradise and sparked calls from the United Nations and several countries to restore the rule of law in the fledgling democracy.

Large number of staffers involved in graft: AG

Citing irregularities in the judicial and administrative functions of the Supreme Court's High Court Division, Attorney General Mahbubey Alam yesterday said the "judiciary had seen degradation" in the last few years, and the image of the HC had changed.

The image of the whole judiciary is being damaged by some HC judges' failure to run their courts properly, he said, adding that a number of court officials and

employees were involved in corruption. The attorney general made the comments while speaking at a function organised to accord felicitations to newly appointed Chief Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain at the Courtroom-1 of the SC's Appellate Division.

"Earlier, I had mentioned some examples of degradation of this court [HC] during the felicitations to a chief justice.

'Why police so ruthless to us?'

Rape victim asks; alleging her brother was sent to jail as the family refused to withdraw case

The investigation officer of a rape case claimed to have found the involvement of the victim's brother more than a year and a half after the incident and the court based on that sent him to jail on January 29.

This happened, according to the victim, because her family refused to withdraw the rape case filed against their neighbour Paritosh Chandra Devsharma.

Paritosh, 26, had been arrested after the case was filed with Dinajpur court on May 12, 2016, and sent to Dinajpur jail.

The 18-year-old rape victim went public on Saturday. At a press conference, she said, "We still don't know why police have been so ruthless towards us instead of being sympathetic."

Police had been mounting pressure on her family members to make an out-of-court settlement. On January 28, they were asked to go to Bochaganj Police Station and persuaded to withdraw the case, the victim said.

But when the family refused to do so, investigation officer Abu Taleb asked Prodip Chandra Devsharma, the girl's brother, to stay back at the police station and asked other

family members to go home, she added. "The next day, we heard that my brother had been sent to jail for raping me," the girl who studied up to class-V said in

"Police brought such heinous charges against my own brother to humiliate my family socially."
