The first phase of celebrations will begin at 7am at Bakultala of Faculty of Fine Arts (FFA), Dhaka University, the hub of the celebrations. The programmes will begin with a recital of Raga Basant Bahar on guitar by Dipan Sarkar. The programme, which will have its second part at Bakultala, at 3:30pm, will feature solo songs by noted artistes Fahim Hossain Chowdhury, Salma Akbar, Sajed Akbar, Laisa Ahmed Lisa, Bulbul Islam, Kanan Bala Sarkar;

Sangstha, Bohnishikha; dance presentations



Along with Bakultala, elaborate cultural programmes will also be held from 3:30pm at three other venues across Dhaka -Dhanmondi's Rabindra Sarobar, Bahadur Shah Park in Old Dhaka, and Uttara Sector 3 Rabindra Sarani field, and will feature a wide range of music, dance and recitation performances.

Girls in Bashonti (yellow-ochre) saris will adorn themselves with floral ornaments and boys will wear colourful Punjabi to see and be seen at the major events.

Jatiya Boshonto Utshab Udjapon Parishad has been celebrating the arrival of Spring since the Bangla year 1401 (1995) in Dhaka, although Bangalees have traditionally celebrated the first day of Spring for centuries. Today, Pahela Falgun programmes have spread throughout the country and have become a major cultural celebration.


Chumki: I feel the same. The air during springtime is sweeter than the rest of the year. Some say it is love that's in the air, and spring is indeed, the season of love.

Tension brews when the new employee's bubbly, forthcoming personality takes her boss by surprise, and colleagues begin to suspect that the two are in love. But then things take an unexpected turn.

FIFTY SHADES FREED

dominates international box office

The international opening of "Fifty Shades Freed" has taken in \$98.1 million in 57 markets since its February 6 international premiere, marking the biggest overseas launch of 2018 so far.

The finale of the erotic romance trilogy launched in first place in 54 markets, and topped Sony's "Jumanji: Welcome to the Jungle" for best international weekend of the year, coming in 20% above the actioncomedy's \$81 million first weekend take.

The three "Fifty Shades" movies have now totaled \$1.09 billion worldwide with strong international performances. "Fifty Shades of Grey" took in \$166 million domestically and \$404 million internationally in 2015 and "Fifty Shades Darker" grossed \$114 million domestically and \$266 million internationally last year.

Germany generated the best numbers with \$10.7 million at 731 locations, taking 46% of

the market. It's in line with the performance for "Fifty Shades Darker", which also saw Germany as the top territory, according to trade magazine Variety.

"Fifty Shades Freed" sees Jamie Dornan and Dakota Johnson return as Christian Grey and Anastasia Steele. It is directed by James Foley from a script by Niall Leonard and once again produced by Michael De Luca, Dana Brunetti, and Marcus Viscidi, alongside the book's author, EL James.

Fox's "Maze Runner: The Death Cure" took in \$23.5 million from 19,858 screens in 80 markets, taking the international total for the finale of the dystopian trilogy to \$180 million.

Indian comedy "PadMan" debuted with \$8.9 million in five markets, most of that coming from a number one opening in India with \$7.9 million.
