## Wake up AND STOP ROHINGYA ABUSES

Nobel Peace trio to Suu Kyi

"This is clearly, clearly, clearly genocide that is going on by the Burmese government and military against the Rohingya people."

No one would realise better than a woman how it feels when a child is snatched away from the arms of a mother and slaughtered, a man is murdered before the eyes of his wife, or a girl is raped.

That is what happened to countless Myanmar.

As three Nobel laureates listened to such harrowing tales of tortured women and children one by one in the refugee camps of

Cox's Bazar, they could not hold tears back.

The trio, all of them mother themselves, then urged Myanmar's de facto leader and their fellow Nobel laureate Aung San Suu Kyi to speak out about violence against the Rohingyas, often dubbed one of the most persecuted minorities in the world.

They implored her to "wake up" to the Rohingya women back in Rakhine State of brutalities, warning she otherwise risks prosecution for "genocide".

#### ROHINGYA CRACKDOWN EU prepares new sanctions on Myanmar

European Union foreign ministers yesterday agreed to prepare sanctions against Myanmar generals over the killings of Rohingya Muslims and to strengthen the EU arms embargo, accusing state security forces of grave human rights abuses.

As reported by Reuters last week, foreign ministers meeting in Brussels asked the EU's foreign policy chief, Federica Mogherini, to draw up a list of names to be hit with EU travel bans and asset freezes.

In a statement, ministers called for "targeted restrictive measures against senior military officers of the Myanmar armed forces SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

### Hajj expenses to go up by Tk 16,000

Pilgrims have to spend around Tk 16,000 more this year to perform hajj, mainly because of high

airfare. The cabinet yesterday approved the draft of Hajj Package-2018, fixing the maximum cost for a pilgrim under the government arrangement at Tk 3,97,929, which was Tk 3,81,508 last year.

## Cash incentive rules flouted

8 exporters, in league with 2 banks, misappropriate Tk 43cr by abusing central bank provision, finds BB probe

Kuliarchar Sea Foods, a Cox's Bazarbased fish exporter, withdrew about Tk 19 crore in cash incentives from Mercantile Bank last year, violating government rules.

Exporters cannot collect the incentive, meant to encourage exports, until the entire export earnings are credited by the importer to the exporter's bank, according to a Bangladesh Bank circular issued in December 2001.

But some exporters with help of their local banks continue to breach

the rules, a BB investigation has found.

In the last two years, five companies, including Kuliarchar, misappropriated Tk 40 crore in such incentives from Mercantile. Three other companies took away Tk 3.35 crore from Jamuna Bank, the BB report said.

The central bank carried out the probe between May and November last year.

The Daily Star has been able to contact five of the eight companies in question. All of them denied any wrongdoing.

They said they would try to adjust the amount from future export earnings of these firms and make sure this did not happen again.

Twenty-seven export sectors receive cash incentive between 2 percent and 20 percent under a government policy to boost export and encourage exporters to explore new markets.

The sectors enjoying cash subsidy include garment industry, frozen food and fish industry, leather products, finished leather, agro-based products But top officials of both the banks and agro-processing industry.

# 10 killed in N'ganj as bus hits lorry

Attending a wedding in Gazipur on Sunday night, Kajal Rani Saha and her son Shuvo Saha were on way to their home in Chandpur's Haziganj yesterday.

The mother and the son, who failed to get a direct bus to their village, boarded a Chittagong-bound bus near the Kanchpur bridge around noon.

As the vehicle reached Tripurdi area of Narayanganj's Sonargaon about an hour later, it hit a parked lorry on the Dhaka-Chittagong highway. At least 10 passen-

gers, including Shuvo, 16, were killed and 30 others injured. The deceased included three women and two children.

Of the injured, 15 were rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

With her blood-stained saree, Kajal, 46, was seen wailing in front of the emergency unit of the hospital yesterday afternoon.

"Oh God, please don't take away my Shuvo. Please give him back," she kept wailing hearing the news that her son, who used to run their six-member family by selling street food, was no more.

Another victim, Mizanur Rahman, 25, was returning to his home in Feni along with his wife Hena Akhter, 18 and brother-in-law Ramim, 6. The couple had gone to Mizanur's in-laws' house in Keraniganj a week ago.
