

Govt to build three more power plants

All coal-based, to be constructed by Chinese companies

Chinese companies are going to construct three more coalbased power plants in Bangladesh with a total capacity of 3,960 megawatts.

Two of the plants will be set up by Bangladesh-China joint venture companies while another by a consortium of China and Hong Kong-based firms.

The power plants, with a capacity of 1,320MW each, will

be built in Maheshkhali of Cox's Bazar, Kalapara of Patuakhali and Mirsarai of Chittagong. "All the projects are now at a preliminary stage. Some proce-

dures have to be completed before the construction work commences," State Minister for Power, Energy and Mineral Resources Nasrul Hamid told The Daily Staryesterday. The cabinet yesterday approved the draft of a joint venture agreement between Bangladesh Power Development Board

(BPDB) and China Huadian Hong Kong Co Ltd to form a joint venture company (50:50 share) for setting up a 1,320-MW thermal power plant in Maheshkhali.

It also gave the go-ahead to the related Memorandum of

Association and Article of Association of the joint venture company.

10 injured as BCL factions clash in Ctg

At least 10 people were injured in a clash between two factions of Bangladesh Chhatra League (BCL) during a meeting commemorating former Awami League leader ABM Mohiuddin Chowdhury at historical Laldighi ground yesterday.

Identities of the injured, believed to be activists of the student front of ruling party, could not be known immediately.

City unit BCL organised the meeting to commemorate the former Chittagong City Corporation (CCC) mayor, also former president of city unit AL, with eminent sociologist Prof Anupam Sen Gupta attending as the chief guest.

The clash erupted around 5:30pm in presence of ABM Mohiuddin's son Mohibul Hasan Chowdhury Nowfel, also ruling Awami League's central committee's organising secretary, over chanting slogans, said eyewitnesses.

Dubai police say

India yesterday mourned Bollywood superstar Sridevi Kapoor after her death in Dubai aged just 54, as police in the emirate said she drowned in her hotel bathtub.

The body of Sridevi, one of the biggest names in Hindi cinema, had been due to be brought back to Mumbai yesterday by charter flight. It was not immediately clear however when Dubai authorities would release it.

Putin orders 5-hr truce in Syria

Humanitarian corridor to let civilians leave enclave; 29 killed since UNSC vote

Russian President Vladimir Putin has ordered a daily five-hour truce and the creation of a "humanitarian corridor" to allow civilians to leave the rebelheld Syrian enclave of eastern Ghouta, Russia's defence minister was quoted as saying.

In one of the bloodiest offensives of Syria's civil war, eastern Ghouta, a suburb of Damascus controlled by opponents of President Bashar al-Assad, has been subject to heavy bombardment by government forces. Russia is Assad's most powerful ally.

"With the aim of eliminating casualties among the civilian population of eastern Ghouta, a daily humanitarian pause is being introduced from Feb. 27, that is tomorrow, from 09:00 until 14:00," Russia's RIA news agency quoted Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu as saying yesterday.

"A humanitarian corridor will be created for the exit of civilians. The coordinates (of the corridor) have been prepared and will be announced in the near future," Shoigu added.

The announcement came after at least 29 people were killed in eastern Ghouta despite the UN security council resolution passed on Saturday that demanded an end to the fighting.

Tk 10,000cr in 10 years

Govt gave it to 7 banks hit by capital deficit, says Muhith in JS

Four state-run and three private banks were facing a capital deficit of Tk 9,417.42 crore as of September last year, said Finance Minister Abul Maal Abdul Muhith yesterday.

The government provided those banks with Tk 10,272 crore between fiscal 2005-06 and fiscal 2016-17 to help them meet the deficit, he said in reply to a query from independent MP Md Abdul Matin.

"Yes, the state-run and private banks are now facing capital deficit. Out of total 57 banks in the banking sector, four state-run banks are having a capital deficit of Tk 7,626.23 crore while three private banks Tk 1,791.20 crore as of September 30, 2017," Muhith said.

In a scripted answer, the minister informed the House that the capital deficit at the state-run Sonali Bank stood at Tk 3140.41 crore, while it was Tk 689.9 crore at Rupali Bank, Tk 1,272.93 crore at Janata Bank and Tk 2,522.99 crore at BASIC Bank.


ACC to go after big shots

DU expels 1, suspends 6 for assault

The Disciplinary Board of Dhaka University yesterday recommended expulsion of a BCL activist and suspension of six others to the university syndicate for assaulting a student on February 6.

The board, comprising the VC, deans, provosts and the proctor, decided it during a meeting chaired by VC Prof
Akhtaruzzaman, said

Proctor Prof AKM Golam Rabbani. "We made the recom-

mendation after considering the probe body report that found these students' involvement in the attack," said Prof Rabbani.

Assistant Secretary of Salimullah Hall unit BCL Omar Faruk, who reportedly initiated the attack on Ehsan Rafiq, a second-year student of the Department of Disaster Science and Management, has been recommended for expulsion.

6 more killed in stone pits

Five workers were crushed to death and three others injured while extracting stones at a quarry in Kalairag area of Companiganj upazila on Sunday night.

They were digging in a pit when a massive chunk of earth

fell over them.

In Jaintiapur upazila, another worker died after he was critically injured in a similar incident yesterday morning.

As many as 16 workers died in the illegal quarries of Sylhet in the last two months.

After Sunday night's incident, three of the workers' bodies remained buried in the pit for hours.

The victims are Motiur Rahman, 30, Ruhul Amin, 22, Ashik Ali, 38, Atabur Rahman, 30, and Moyen Uddin, 32, said Dilip Kanti Nath, inspector of Companiganj Police Station.

In a Jaintiapur quarry, Delowar Hossain, 26, was criti-

cally injured in the morning and died hours later in a hospital, Moinul Jakir, officer-in-charge of Jaintiapur Police Station, said.

Two probe committees were formed to investigate the Companiganj incident.

The district administration formed a three-member probe body headed by Additional Deputy Commissioner Mohammad Abdullah while police formed a two-member probe committee headed by Additional Superintendent of Police Abul Hasnat.

The committees were asked to submit their reports in

seven days.
Police detained Abdur Rouf, who hired the workers from

the quarry.

Last year's death toll in illegal quarries in Sylhet was 32.

On January 2 this year, five workers died while extracting stones in Jaflong area.
