

Act now to save banks from graft

Speakers urge govt at a discussion

Noted citizens, including economists and former caretaker government advisers, yesterday urged the government to ensure punishment of perpetrators of crimes in the banking sector. Or else, graft would destroy the sector, they said.

The banking sector is struggling because the boards of directors of banks are overtly politicised, banks lack honest officials, and above all the central bank itself has been exposed to vulnerabilities, they said at a discussion.

Socio-political platform Nagorik Oikya arranged the discussion on corruption at the capital's Jatiya Press Club yesterday.

Salehuddin Ahmed, a former governor of Bangladesh Bank, said there was discipline in the banking sector and banks were running smoothly until 2009. The disorder that followed is an ominous sign, he said.

"Bringing politics into the board rooms and inside banks cannot be acceptable under any circumstances," he added.

He said there were good norms and regulations for the banking sector but those were not being properly followed. Despite unravelling of several scams, the government did

not take any visible steps, he said, urging that honest and dedicated bankers be given opportunities and the corrupt ones punished.

Noted economist Prof Anu Mohammad said corruption in banks has reached such a level that now people are nonchalant when they hear about Tk 100 or Tk 200 crore scams. SEE PAGE 13 COL 1

Anyone suffering from diarrhoea today knows oral rehydration solution (ORS) found in packets at any drug store is the panacea. Even if that is not available, people know they can make it at home -mixing a fistful of sugar or molasses and three pinches of salt with half litre of water.

The simple solution has saved millions of lives worldwide, especially children at risk of contracting severely dehydrating, fatal diarrhoea. British medical journal The Lancet called ORS potentially the most important medical advance of the 20th century.

One, as a Bangladeshi, can be proud of the fact that one of the scientists who contributed to the development of ORS is a Bangladeshi. He is Dr Rafiqul Islam.

HC snubs plea for re-evaluation

The High Court yesterday rejected a writ petition that sought re-evaluation and scrapping of the existing quota system in the civil service, as the writ petitioners are not affected by the system and it is a policy decision of the government.

The court passed the order saying that the petition was not acceptable for the two reasons.

Following the HC order, the quota system in government service will remain in force, petitioners' lawyer Aklas Uddin Bhuiyan told The Daily Star.

He said his clients would move an appeal before the Supreme Court's Appellate Division against the HC order.

The bench of Justice Syed Muhammad Dastagir Husain and Justice Md Ataur Rahman Khan came up with the order after hearing arguments from the writ petitioners' counsel and the deputy attorney general concerned.

During the hearing, Aklas prayed to the HC to issue a rule questioning the legality of the government decision to keep the quota system in government jobs.

He said grandchildren of the freedom fighters are easily getting jobs due to the quota system, but many brilliant students are being deprived of the jobs because of the system.

The quota system is discriminatory and a violation of the constitution, he said, mentioning that a student of Dhaka University took his life as he failed to get a government job "due to the system". The court said the three writ petitioners include two

journalists and a university student, but they were not aggrieved for the quota system as they did not apply for any government job. Deputy Attorney General Amit Talukder opposed the

petition, citing two decisions of the Appellate Division that had ruled that keeping the quota system in the service is the policy decision of the government.

Oscars show salutes #MeToo movement

Women filmmakers and artists of colour celebrated a year of diversity at the 90th Academy Awards on Sunday, saluting the #MeToo movement against sexual harassment and urging under-represented artists to seize the momentum.

A segment dedicated to the issues was narrated by Ashley Judd, Salma Hayek and Annabella Sciorra, three of the dozens of women who have accused Hollywood mogul Harvey Weinstein of sexual misconduct, helping touch off the #MeToo movement.

Weinstein has denied having nonconsensual sex with anyone.

The women described 2017, which included blockbuster and critically acclaimed films that were not centred on white men - from female-led action movie "Wonder Woman" to racial satire "Get Out" - as a move toward a more inclusive film industry.

Protests and condemnations continued to pour in yesterday over the attack on Muhammed Zafar Iqbal, an eminent writer and a professor at Shahjalal University of Science and Technology (SUST).

People across the country held human chains and rallies, observed work stoppage and organised cultural programmes protesting the attack and demanding exemplary punishment to all those involved. Prof Igbal was stabbed at his university around 5:30pm

on Saturday and suffered injuries in the back of his head, one in his back and another in the left hand. Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday paid him a visit

at Combined Military Hospital (CMH) in Dhaka around 12:45pm yesterday.

She stayed there for 15 to 20 minutes, Maj Gen Munshi Md Mojibur Rahman, chief cardiac surgeon and consultant surgeon general of Bangladesh Armed Forces, told The Daily Star.

"Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina talked to Prof Iqbal and also inquired about his health.

The victim was identified as Tauhidul Islam, 11, only son of Kawsar Ahmed of Panchgaon village.


