United they travel

The desire to see the unseen and know the unknown is perhaps latent inside every individual. The memories we make during travelling leave a captivating effect on our psyche. When we are depressed, the memorable experience can help us shake off our gloom and bring joy.

But when it comes to travelling solo, it is still considered to be a "guy thing", especially in this part of the world where parents still do not feel comfortable allowing their daughters to travel alone. Even at times, women themselves are not courageous enough to travel alone due to security reasons. Moreover, social taboo renders another barrier.

However, a positive wind of change is blowing as women themselves are taking initiatives to explore the world around them and see the

unseen like their male counterparts. One such initiative is "Travelettes of Bangladesh" (TOB) -- a Facebook group. The platform, solely operated by women, helps women travel as a group across the country by providing them with proper security and facilities.

They first create a public event on Facebook and set a place to travel to. Information like approximate cost is mentioned there as well. Those who are interested send money to the organisers through mobile banking service.

"That's how the process starts," Sakia Haque, president of the platform, told this correspondent.

"Parents do not allow women to travel alone ent," she added. in our society. But if we do not travel, meet new people and explore the world, we will not be able to learn. Ultimately, real empowerment of women will be hampered," she said.

Asked how it started, Sakia said she along with her school friend Manoshi Saha Tuli, now general secretary (GS) of the platform, launched TOB on November 27, 2016 with the motto "Empowering women through travelling". Since its inception, TOB has successfully

arranged 25 expeditions in different districts. In each expedition, they cover several districts. Women of different ages, starting from 12 years old, are allowed to travel with them, said Sakia.

The Facebook group now has more than 15,000 members.

"It is a huge achievement. We started with a couple of members, but now we have thousands of them giving us inspiration to work more with the young minds," said Manoshi, also an intern at Dhaka Medical College (DMC).

"Travellette means a woman who is not afraid to jump out into the unknown world. We want women of our society to be bold and independ-

Talking about the expenses, she said, "Since it is a voluntary organisation, everyone pays for their own expenses. But we try our best to minimise the cost while ensuring a better travel experience." SAFETY MEASURES

TOB has volunteers in different districts. They fix the spot and inform local police stations about arrival of the lady travellers.

"Till now, no unexpected occurrence has taken place. We keep contact with local police stations to keep our travelettes safe," said TOB president Sakia, also a student of DMC.

The platform has been able to gain trust of

Look after women construction workers

Prothom Alo-Seven Rings Cement roundtable told

Women construction workers should be provided with financial assistance during and after pregnancy. At the same time, there should be toilet facilities for them at the construction sites.

Also, the government should invest in skills development programmes for them so that they do not face any wage discrimination.

Speakers said these at a roundtable yesterday. Organised by Prothom Alo in association with Seven Rings Cement, the roundtable titled "Women workers in construction industry" was held at the Bangla daily's office in the capital.

State Minister for Labour and

Employment Mujibul Haque Chunnu said

the labour law should be implemented strictly to ensure workers' rights. Syed Sultan Uddin Ahmed, executive director of Bangladesh Institute of Labour Studies (BILS), said workers have to pay a

contractor to get a job at a construction site. As a result, the already ill-paid workers have to spend a portion of their wages, making it suffer from various construction-related health difficult for them to survive. Sabina Sultana, senior programme offi-

cer at the multi-sectoral programme on

violence against women under the Ministry of Women and Children Affairs, said women workers should also seek assistance by calling the helpline "109". The toll-free number helps women and children who fall victims to different forms of violence.

Nasimun Ara Huq, president of Bangladesh Nari Sangbadik Kendra (centre for women journalists), said accommodation facilities should be provided to the construction workers, especially women. Also, there should be a registration process for them, which will help them receive any

sort of compensation without a hassle. She said women workers were paid less than their male counterparts.

Abdur Razzak, general secretary of Imarat Nirman Sramik Union Bangladesh, said there should be a policy ensuring timely payment of the workers.

Syeda Munira Sultana, programme officer (RMG project) of International Labour Organization, said most of the women are victims of occupational diseases.

While working at construction sites, they hazards including breathing problems, hearing loss and skin diseases, she added.

Man 'kidnaps' wife STAFF CORRESPONDENT

A man and his cohorts allegedly kidnapped his wife from Magura town yesterday after she filed a complaint with Ain o Salish Kendra.

Farjana Akhtar, 26, filed a complaint against her husband Rakibul Islam, 50, on Sunday seeking help, said Abu Ahmed Faijul Kabir, coordinator of ASK in Dhaka.

Farjana left her husband's house in Magura town on January 19 due to domestic violence and was living separately in Dhaka, said Faijul. He further alleged that Rakibul, a businessman who maintains close link with powerful people in Magura town, filed a theft case against his wife on January 25 with Magura police "to harass her".

Following this, Farjana and ASK field officer Shamsunnahar, 50, travelled to Magura from Dhaka on Tuesday to seek bail in the case. Farjana was taken off the bus a couple of kilometers off Magura town by Rakibul and his men from the bus around 4:45pm, Faijul said, quoting Shamsunnahar. Rakibul and his men also beat Shamsunnahar when she tried to stop the men from taking Farjana away in the microbus. On information, police rescued the ASK official and took her to a local hospital.

Faijul said ASK has been preparing to file a case against Rakibul accusing him for kidnapping. Magura police said they were trying to rescue the woman and arrest the accused.

2 'robbers' killed in Gazipur, BCL men 'beat up' Rangpur 'gunfights'

Two suspected robbers were killed in separate "gunfights" in Gazipur and Rangpur

early yesterday. In Gazipur, a suspected robber was killed in a reported gunfight between his cohorts and police at Patka in Sreepur upazila around 3:30am yesterday. The deceased is Abdur Rab Hawladar, 35, hailing from Goshairhat upazila in Shariatpur, said police.

Around 3:00am, a team of police was patrolling the area when the robbers shot at their vehicle. The team fired back, resulting in the "gunfight", said Joynal Abedin, assistant sub-inspector of Sreepur Police Station.

At one stage, Abdur Rab sustained injuries after being hit by a bullet, fired by one of his cohorts, claimed police. He was declared

dead at Sreepur Upazila Health Complex.

Three police personnel were also injured, said police. They were treated at a local health complex. Police recovered a locallyautopsy.

made pipe gun, a Chinese axe and three machetes from the spot. The body was sent to Gazipur Shaheed Tajuddin Ahmed

Medical College morgue for an autopsy. In Rangpur, a suspected robber was killed and another hurt in a "shootout" with police.

led by Mahmudur Rahman Kanon, information and research affairs secretary of RU unit, showed up and asked why they were staying there, said Moynul, adding that another leader was Jhalak Sarker, BCL joint secretary of arts faculty. "At one stage of conversation, Kanon started punching in

my face and eyes. The rest of them also joined him in beating me," alleged Moynul, who was admitted to Rajshahi Medical College Hospital. Asked, Kanon denied beating Moynul. He claimed that

he had slapped his junior to stop the latter's altercation with Moynul. Jhalak Sarker also denied the allegation.

6 killed in road accidents

At least six people including two of the same family were killed in separate road accidents across the country yesterday. In Mymensingh, school boy Mohadev Pal, 8, was killed

after being hit by a human-haulier on Dhaka-Mymensingh highway in Trishal upazila, police said. Local rushed the victim to Trishal Upazila Health

Complex where the doctors declared him dead. Protesting the incident, agitated locals put a barricade on

the highway for an hour. On information, police rushed to the spot and brought the situation under control.

In Thakurgaon, Fazila, 60, and her granddaughter Kabita 6, were killed after a three-wheeler skidded off the road and fell into a ditch on Priganj-Katihar road in Pirganj upazila, reports our correspondent quoting police.

The incident left five, including the duo injured. They succumbed to their injuries at a local hospital, police said. In another incident in Thakurgaon, college student Shahnaj

Begum, 17, was killed after being hit by a bus on Boda-Marea
