



Horrific tale of kidnap

Gang led by Manikganj AL leader demands Tk 45 lakh in ransom; Rab rescues victims, detains 10

"They put us inside sacks in a dark room with our hands and legs tied, eyes blindfolded, mouth gagged and our bodies beaten up by bamboo sticks for three days."

Transport businessman Jafor Iqbal, 40, revealed this horrific tale to The Daily Star yesterday after being rescued from the den of an 'abduction gang' allegedly run by Selim Molla, vice-president of ruling Awami League's Harirampur upazila unit in Manikganj. Jafor and his friend Miraj Ali, 35, were picked up by some

unidentified people from the capital's Tejgaon area on Friday. They were rescued by Rapid Action Battalion (Rab) on early Monday. The duo gave a statement before a Dhaka court yesterday where they disclosed their abduction in details.

Metropolitan Magistrate Fahad Bin Amin Chowdhury

recorded their statement. Talking to the newspaper, Jafor said he along with Miraj went to Farmgate early Friday morning on a business purpose and was talking in front of Govt Science College. At one stage, a microbus stopped in front of them and someone from inside asked them about the way to Dhanmondi,

he added. As they were showing the way to Dhanmondi, two to three people forced them into the vehicle and two to three hours later they found themselves inside a room where SEE PAGE 12 COL 4

GLOBAL INDEX Bangladesh happier than India, Sri Lanka

Bangladesh has slipped down five notches in this year's World Happiness Report rankings, but it remains a happier place than India and Sri Lanka.

The country has been ranked 115th among 156 countries surveyed for the report while Sri Lanka and India came in at 116th and 133th positions.

The report was released yesterday ahead of the International Day of Happiness on March 20.

Among the other South Asian countries, Pakistan, Bhutan and Nepal were placed 75th, 97th and 101st in the rankings.

The report ranks countries by happiness levels based on six key factors: income, freedom, trust, healthy life expectancy, social support and generosity.

Finland is the happiest place on earth, followed by Norway and Denmark, says SEE PAGE 11 COL 1

Prof Muhammed Zafar Iqbal has called upon fanatics to go talk to "Come to me with-

out your weapons and ask me questions. I will answer all your questions," said the professor

He was addressing a reception accorded to him at Mukta Mancha on Shahjalal University of Science and Technology (SUST) campus, where he was attacked by a suspected radical Islamist on March 3.

"How can a man be so unhappy that he comes to kill another man only to go to heaven? I would like to know what bothers you, what your pains are," he said.

Zafar is a professor of computer science and engineering at SUST and a renowned educationalist and writer. He came under the knife attack from behind during a programme on the campus. He was stabbed multiple times in the rear of his

Police arrest accused who wanted to take revenge of filing a case against him by victim's brother

Monirul had a grudge against the schoolgirl's family. He never expressed it, rather became a friend of the family. Secretly, he was planning revenge. Yesterday, he stabbed the girl when she was on her way to school.

Manjur Rahman, officer-in-charge of Chapainawabganj Sadar Police Station, said this while talking to The Daily Star.

"I noticed him [Monirul] following me on my way Sathi Khatun to school over the last three days," said Sathi Khatun at the surgery ward of Rajshahi Medical College Hospital (RMCH).

The 13-year-old girl of Hujrapur in the town did not tell her parents of the matter, fearing that her parents might stop her from going to school Besides, the sixth-grader thought that Monirul had no ill motive to follow her, said Sathi, daughter of Abdus Salam.

Police arrested Monirul Islam, 25, in the evening.

Monirul's grudge began to grow when the girl's elder brother filed a case against him for attacking him five years ago and he had to spend six months in jail, said OC Manjur. This incident led to the attack on the girl, the police official said.

In 2013, Monirul stabbed Sathi's brother and badly injured one of his hands with a hammer following a quarrel over playing carrom. The case is still under trial, said Sathi's father.

"It was five years ago. Meantime, we forgot our grievances. He [Monirul] was also trying to build a good relation with us," said the father.

Google guru tests flying taxis in NZ

Pilot-less flying taxis are being tested in New Zealand as part of a project backed by Google cofounder Larry Page that supporters say will revolutionise personal transport.

New Zealand regulators late Tuesday approved plans for Zephyr Airworks, a subsidiary of Page's company Kitty Hawk, to develop and test the futuristic air taxis.

Known as Cora, the electric aircraft has a dozen small lift rotors on its wings, making it capable of vertical take-off and landing like a helicopter.

But developers say it is much quieter, meaning it could transport passengers in urban areas using rooftops and car parks as landing pads. "We are offering a pollution free, emission free

Tillerson warns about Russia

Fails to thank or praise Trump in farewell speech; China hopes firing won't affect N Korea talks

President Donald Trump threw US diplomacy into fresh turmoil by firing his secretary of state, Rex Tillerson, and promoting two officials condemned by human rights groups for endorsing or overseeing torture.

A visibly shaken and demoralised Tillerson spoke briefly at the state department on Tuesday, without taking reporters' ques-

tions. He did not criticise Trump's decision but nor did he include the president in a list of thank yous. He warned of Russia's "troubling behaviour and actions" in a parting statement. "Russia must assess carefully as to

how its actions are in the best interests of the Russian people and of the world more broadly," he said. "Continuing on their current trajectory is likely to lead to

greater isolation on their part, a situation which is not in anyone's interest." The US has accused Russia of actively interfering in the

2016 presidential election, stealing Democratic party communications and pushing out disinformation through social media, claims Moscow denies. Kremlin yesterday said ties with the US could not get any

worse under next Secretary of State Mike Pompeo, after the sacking of Rex Tillerson, reported AFP.

"It's hardly possible to fall below the floor, so it is unlikely things will get any worse in this regard," President SEE PAGE 11 COL 4
