Genocide Day observed

Marking the atrocities and massacres committed by the Pakistani military on the civilian Bangalees on the Black Night of March 25 in 1971, National Genocide Day was observed yesterday in different districts across the country and Bangladesh missions abroad.

In Dinajpur, the day was observed in a befitting manner -offering prayers, placing floral wreaths at mass graves, and holding discussions, reports our district correspondent.

A group of people -- led by Shibli Sadiq, lawmaker of Dinajpur-6 constituency -- placed floral wreaths at Chararhat mass grave in Nawabganj upazila of the district. Pakistani army shot dead 98 Bangalees at Chararhat on October 10 during the Liberation War.

In Hakimpur upazila of the district, special prayer was offered by the upazila Muktijoddha Sangsad at its complex. In Joypurhat, special prayer was offered and a discussion was organised at Abul Kashem Moydan in the town.

M Mokammel Haque, deputy commissioner of loypurhat, chaired the discussion. Advocate Samsul Alam Dudu, lawmaker of Joypurhat; Arifur Rahman, chairman of Joypurhat Zila Parishad; Belayet Hossain, acting superintendent of police; and Amzad Hossain, district commander of Muktijoddha Sangsad; spoke at the discussion.

Earlier, an art competition was held for school children at

the same venue. In Rangpur, Muktijoddha Sangsad organised a discussion

and offered a special prayer at the public library ground.

Meanwhile, Barisal Sanskritik Sangathan Samonoy Parishad (BSSSP) observed the day, and demanded international recognition of the genocide carried out by the Pakistani occupation forces, reports our district correspondent.

Marking the day, a discussion was held at Sahid Abdur Rab Serniabat Secondary School.

Prodip Kumar Ghosh Putul, a freedom fighter; Shafiur Rahaman Jamal, son of a martyr; Sushanta Ghosh, a liberation war researcher; addressed the meeting with Papia Jesmin in the chair. Around five hundred students took part in the programme.

Another programme was held at Govt Women's College with the principal of the college Motaleb Howlader in the chair. Mahabub Uddin Bir Bikrom addressed the meeting as the chief guest.

Launch campaign for international recognition of genocide Ghatok Dalal Nirmul Committee urges govt STAFF CORRESPONDENT

War crimes trial campaigners yesterday urged the government to launch a campaign for international recognition of genocide committed throughout nine months of the country's Liberation War in 1971.

They made the call, as the government has an initiative to earn recognition of March 25, now being observed as National Genocide Day, as International Genocide Day.

At present, each year, December 9 is observed as International Genocide Day based on a motion placed by Armenia before the United Nations in 2015, according to Ekattorer Ghatok Dalal Nirmul Committee, a platform campaigning for war crimes trial.

The declaration was made unilaterally and in presence of Bangladesh and 192 other countries at the UN. Which is why, there is no scope to declare March 25 as international genocide day, the committee said in a declaration paper, which was read at a programme at the capital's Central Shaheed Minar.

A Rangpur court yesterday sentenced a couple to life term imprisonment for killing a domestic help after rape in 2003.

The convicted are Altab Hossain, 65, a former subinspector; and his wife Saleha Begum, 55.

The Women and Children Repression Prevention Court of Zabid Hossain handed down the verdict yesterday in the presence of the duo.

According to the prosecu tion, Monjila Khatun, 14, was employed as a domestic help at the couple's house. On May 24, Altab Hossain raped the girl and later strangled her to death and later with the help of his wife hid the body at a

Patrons of war criminals should also be tried: PM

Mentioning that the patrons of war criminals who had been involved in genocide during the 1971 Liberation War are equally guilty, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said they should also be tried for their crimes.

"We've held the trial of war criminals and executed the court verdicts. I think it's necessary to equally try those who rewarded the war criminals, gave the national flag to their hands and made them ministers in independent Bangladesh," she said while addressing a discussion in the capital.

The prime minister continued, "The war criminals carried out the genocide. But those who patronised them, made them ministers, MPs and created a scope for them to do politics are equally guilty."

Ruling Awami League arranged the programme at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre, marking Genocide Day.



Hasina said BNP founder Ziaur Rahman and Khaleda Zia had made war criminals ministers.

She said the trial of those who had directly been involved in genocide will continue on the soil of this country. "There's no mercy for them. They must be tried. And hatred will also be vented on the patrons."

She said no genocide with so severity was committed in any other country across the world where so many people had been killed in a short time. "There's

no newspaper in the world that didn't carry the news of this genocide."

She said, "I become surprised when some political leaders in our country, even Khaleda Zia, say that 30 lakh people were not killed (during the Liberation War)."

About parliament's adoption of a resolution in 2017 to observe March 25 as Genocide Day, she said they took the decision so that the nation and next generations do not forget the misdeeds of the Pakistani occupation forces and their local collaborators, including Razakars, Al-Badr and Al-Shams, who committed the genocide

The prime minister said they must establish Bangladesh as a dignified country in the world. "Bangladesh will have to go ahead upholding the status of a developing country."

She said the centenary of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and the golden jubilee of the

HC summons Comilla civil surgeon over newborn's head injury

The High Court yesterday summoned the civil surgeon of Comilla, director of Comilla Medical College Hospital (CMCH) and its five doctors to appear before it on April 4 in connection with head injury of a newborn during a Caesarean section.


The five doctors are Karuna Rani Karmokar, Nasrin Aktar Popi, Janibul Hoque, Dilruba Sharmin and Ayesha Afroj. The HC also issued a rule asking them to explain why stern actions should not be taken against them.

Hoque passed the order and rule on a suomoto (voluntary) move following reports on the incident in different newspapers including the daily Janakantha and Amader Somoy. According to the news reports, expecting Julekha Begum, 30, wife of Shafik Kazi from Jatrapur village under Muradnagar Upazila of Comilla was admitted to CMCH with labour pain on March 17. The doctors led by Dr Karuna Rani Karmokar, head of the Gynaecology department of CMCH, operated on Julekha on March 18, the Janakantha The bench of Justice Salma Masud reportsaid.

Chowdhury and Justice AKM Zahirul The doctors cut the uterus of Julekha and thus the baby's head during the operation, it said. The baby's body was dumped near the hospital through its security guard, it added. On behalf of Ain o Salish Kendra, four

lawyers -- M Asaduzzaman, Farhana Islam Khan, Anisul Hasan and Shagufta Tabassum Ahmed -- placed the newspaper reports before the court.

Asaduzzaman told The Daily Star that the doctors' negligence had caused the death of the baby which is a criminal offence under Section 304 of the Penal Code.
