Taking care of the urban poor's health

A young girl with some documents in her hands sat in the waiting room of Nagar Shastho Kendra in the capital's Meradia.

With dull eyes and a pale look, she entered the room of counsellor Feroza Begum. The 19-year-old seemed a bit relieved sitting in front of Feroza.

Salma Akhter was in the eighth month of her first pregnancy and it was her monthly visit to the health centre. When she was about to leave the room, Feroza told her what to do before and after the delivery and asked her to visit the centre also for effective family planning.

The health centre is part of Urban Primary Health Care Project (UPHCP) launched in 1998. With the slogan "Shebar Alo, Shobar Kacche", the project started its operation in 2001 to give better treatment to underprivileged people in cities. Health centres running under the programme have been supported by the LGRD ministry. Learning that Salma had no difficulty with her preg-

nancy, Feroza said the expected delivery date was close and Salma needed to be extra careful about her health. She should also save some money for the future of her and her child, the counsellor suggested. Feroza also advised Salma to keep in touch with her

gynecologist and said she should rush to the hospital if she had any bleeding.

Like Salma, people from low-income households have easy access to the urban primary healthcare centres where they get better and affordable services.

to Beauty killing

Police say, citing confessional statement of a relative MINTU DESHWARA

The probe into the rape and murder of Beauty Akhter took a dramatic turn as the Habiganj police chief yesterday said key accused Babul Mia was not the killer. Instead, her father Sayed Ali, uncle Moyna Mia and a hired killer were involved in the murder.

The murder took place in presence of Beauty's father, Superintendent of Police Bidhan Tripura said, adding that the hired killer pinned her down, while Moyna hacked her to death with a knife.

After Babul was arrested, he confessed to the abduction and rape of Beauty, but denied the allegation of murder.

On suspicion, police detained Sayed Ali and Moyna Mia on Thursday. However, the hired killer has not yet been found, officials said.

Father linked One-stop cheating service in exams

Cops nab 10 of a gang, including 3 bank officials

It's like a one-stop shop where subject experts solve questions and supply those to jobseekers and university admission candidates directly at the examination halls using electronic devices.

A Chinese device that looks like a regular debit or credit card but works like a cellphone and a tiny wire-

less bullet-like earphone sets one up for two-way communications. One just needs to put the tiny earphone in the earhole and the device in the pocket or wallet.

After a few minutes into the test, the examinees are told the answers through the device.

Detectives on Friday arrested 10 members of such a gang including three bank officials from different areas in the capital for their alleged involvement in helping examinees cheat in job recruitment exams and university admission tests.

"This gang has pocketed a huge amount of money illegally. From each examinee or group, they used to take from Tk 35,000 up to Tk 10 lakh," Abdul Baten, joint commissioner of Detective Branch, told a press briefing at DMP Media Centre yesterday.

Gazans bury their dead after Israel kills nine

AFP, Gaza City

Palestinian mourners in the Gaza Strip yesterday buried their dead, including a journalist, after Israeli troops killed nine during the latest border clashes in a week of bloodshed.

Thousands of protesters approached the border fence around Gaza for a second Friday in a row, burning tyres and hurling stones at Israeli forces, who responded with tear gas and live ammunition.

In addition to the nine dead, at least 491 were wounded by Israeli gunfire, the health ministry in the Hamas-run enclave said.

Israel said there were around 20,000 protesters and that they were seeking to breach the border.

Numbers were down from the previous Friday, when tens of thousands

Italian police have arrested a postman after finding nearly half a tonne of undelivered mail stashed in his house.

The 33-year-old, who has not been named, told officers he did not deliver post for three years because he felt he was not paid enough. He quit the job last year.

The hoard of undelivered mail was discovered by police after they searched his home in the northern city of Turin. Officers' grew suspicious after a routine traffic

stop, during which they found a 20cm folding knife and 70 letters in the suspect's car.
