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Don't take our homes away

Mymensingh char people reiterate demand following land acquisition decision

Hundreds of char people in Mymensingh yesterday reiterated their demand for removal of their homesteads and farmlands from the proposed acquisition list. At a rally at Char Gobindapur Primary School in Sadar

upazila, they termed the acquisition list "motivated and unfair". People including women and children joined the rally as part of their continuous movement. They have been contin-

uing their movement for nearly two years under "Basatbhita Rokkha Committee". Blaming the administration for such a list, the speakers said

they do not want to be "Rohingyas" in their homeland and they want to live on their century-old ancestral homestead. The government wants to save farmland for the country's

betterment, they said. Then, why is the administration trying to acquire agricultural land for development of Mymensingh as a divisional city? they asked.

They urged the government to revise the plan.

They made an ultimatum to meet the demand within this month. The protesters said they will continue their "logical and non-violent" movement until their demands are met. They also demanded withdrawal of two cases filed with

Kotwali Police Station against their activists accused of assaulting police and obstructing them in discharging their duties in February this year. They said the administration first prepared a list of 1220-

acre of land for the development. But, it was later cancelled and the proposed list of 4366-acre was released mostly belonging to agricultural land round the year. The proposed acquisition area of 4366-acre includes vast tracts

of farmland and households, they said, adding, "The administration should implement the first list to avoid a huge loss.

ASSAULT BY BCL LEADER RONY

Rashed, wife flee home

Uniaid Coaching Centre Director Rashed Miah, who lodged a written complaint against Bangladesh Chhatra League leader Nurul Azim Rony on Thursday after a video clip of the latter assaulting him went viral on social media, has fled home feeling insecure.

Rashed in the general diary filed with Panchlaish Police Station the same day has also sought security as "Rony and his musclemen were threatening him for filing the complaint". "On Thursday, Rashed filed a general

diary seeking security," Mohiuddin Mahmud, officer-in-charge of the police station, told The Daily Star. "We have started our investigation." Meanwhile, Panchlaish police registered

the compliant as a case on Thursday night an hour after Rony was suspended from the post of general secretary of Chittagong city Unit BCL. Rashed in the complaint mentioned that

Rony physically assaulted him and repeatedly slapped him inside the office room of the coaching centre in city's GEC area on February 17 while demanding Tk 20 lakh as extortion money. Contacted, Deputy Commissioner

(North) Md Abdul Warish of Chittagong Metropolitan Police said, "The written complaint was registered as a case and police have launched an investigation..."

"We have also collected the CCTV footage... We are analysing it," he said. "Legal on February 17 to inquire about irregularities actions would be taken if the allegation at the coaching centre. turns out to be true."

RASHED FLEES HOME

Feeling insecure, Rashed and his wife have been staying at their relatives' houses.

"Soon after filing the complaint on Thursday noon, Rony and his fellows went to my residence in Sugandha Residential area in the evening..." he told The Daily Star over the phone.

"He even went to my office and later called me a number of times. We are feeling worried..."

Earlier, a video clip went viral on social media where a furious Rony was seen slapping Rashed time and again, grabbing him by the hair.

At one point, the BCL leader goes outside the room and comes back a little later. He then lights a cigarette and talks to someone over phone. Hanging up the phone, he starts slapping Rashed again. In the 6:02-minute clip, Rony was seen slapping Rashed 13 times.

The Daily Star could not independently verify the authenticity of the clip. Rashed claimed he was beaten as he had refused to pay Rony extortion money.

RONY CLAIMS INNOCENCE

Meanwhile, in a Facebook post on Thursday night, Rony posted 10 screenshots of a conversation between him and Rashed. In the post, he said he started the coaching centre along with Rashed after investing his family money.

Apart from that, in a statement issued by Rony right after the incident, he claimed that he gave Tk 9.50 lakh as a loan to Rashed in two phases.

He also said he went to the coaching centre

Talk to people first

Speakers tell govt about fixing natural gas price

Civil society representatives yesterday demanded that the government fix the price of natural gas in a fair and rational way through public hearings so that people do not have to suffer.

Criticising the government's recent decision of increasing the price of compressed natural gas (CNG), they said such an increase would raise the transportation cost. It will ultimately add to peoples' living expenses, they said.

They made the remarks at a meeting

organised by Nagarik Committee, a

civic platform, at Dhaka Reporters

Unity (DRU) in the capital. Prof Shamsul Alam, energy adviser to Consumers Association of Bangladesh, said the government has recently increased the price of CNG from Tk 40 to Tk 48 per cubic metre for popularising the liquefied petroleum

gas (LPG). "This price increase is unjust and similar to public repression. Such a move will raise transport cost as 60 percent vehicles use CNG. We protest such an increase and demand its immediate cancellation," he said.

The energy expert recommended separating the gas sector from the ministry of power, energy and mineral resources. He also recommended bringing it under a regularity body to solve the gas crisis and uphold con-

sumers' rights. In January, the government directed its concerned bodies to fix new price of liquefied natural gas (LNG) in consumer level without going through any public hearing, Prof Shamsul said in a

concept paper. "Prices of all kinds of gas -- LPG, SEE PAGE 5 COL 7
