





## Only the best for mother and child

Upazila health complex in Dinajpur leads quiet revolution in maternity care

For over 75 years, the Finnish government has been giving a "baby box" of clothes, sheets, toys and supplies to every expectant mother. A matter of national pride, the initiative is credited with helping Finland achieve one of the world's lowest infant mortality rates.

Since last July, each baby born at the Birganj upazila health complex in Dinajpur is also provided with a gift hamper. It is but one part of a quiet revolution in maternity healthcare being implemented by local doctors, midwives and public officials. With the aims of eliminating unnecessary caesarean section delivery and enhancing accessibility, the Birganj healthcare team is setting an example for others to follow.

The driving force behind the change is the upazila's health and family planning officer, Dr Zahangir Kabir. "Most pregnant women, especially from rural areas, don't take full advantage of public healthcare. For reasons including a lack of awareness and financial hardship, many mothers-to-be experience pregnancy at home. It is one cause of high mortality rates among mothers and newborns."

An associated problem is the overuse of caesarean section delivery at public facilities. The World Health Organisation reports that caesarean section is used in around 37 percent of deliveries in Bangladesh, while a reasonable rate would be close to 10 percent.

"People run after caesareans," remarks Dinajpur's civil surgeon Dr Mawla Baksh Chowdhury. "It's a risky option." Moreover, the overuse of costly caesareans has helped earn the public system a reputation for being expensive. Together with local doctors and midwives Dr Kabir favoured change.

Together with local doctors and midwives Dr Kabir favoured change. They aimed to increase the percentage of natural births at the complex, to implement free, quality antenatal and postnatal care for mothers and infants, and to raise awareness of the risks of caesarean and home delivery.

Their first move was to develop the first floor of the complex into a maternity friendly environment with a well-equipped obstetrics department, a six-bed labour ward, antenatal and postnatal care units and a welcoming breastfeeding corner.

## Dozens of Rohingya arrive in Indonesia

At least 80 of the persecuted minority group from Myanmar came in a boat

About 80 Rohingya in a wooden boat arrived in Indonesia yesterday, officials said, the latest batch of the vulnerable minority to come ashore in the world's biggest Muslim majority nation.

The group landed in Aceh province on Sumatra island, just weeks after

dozens of the persecuted Muslim minority from Myanmar came ashore in neighbouring Malaysia. All appeared to be in good condition, according to local police chief Riza

It has been rare for Rohingya migrants to attempt the sea routes south since
Thai authorities clamped down on regional trafficking networks in 2015, spark-

ing a crisis across Southeast Asia as large numbers were abandoned at sea.

But there have been concerns desperate migrants might start taking to the high seas again after mainly Buddhist Myanmar launched a new crackdown last year that forced about 700,000 members of the Muslim minority to flee to Bangladesh.

#### World's largest plane set to take flight

The largest plane ever built – backed by Microsoft co-founder Paul Allen and his company Vulcan Aerospace – is set to take full flight for the first time within months.

Known as Stratolaunch, the huge aircraft is so big that it requires two cockpits and six jet engines to take off.

The aircraft also has a wingspan of 385 feet, over a hundred more than the average football pitch. Its six Pratt & Whitney PW4056 747 jet engines are

used to power a monster jet with 28 wheels that weighs 580 tonnes when fully loaded with a rocket payload.

#### Near miss at Tribhuvan

All 139 abroad safe after Malaysian jet skids off runway as pilots abort takeoff

A Malaysian jet carrying 139 people that aborted its takeoff and skidded into mud forced Kathmandu airport to shut down for more than 12 hours causing flight chaos yesterday after the latest near miss on the city's notoriously dangerous runway.

Nobody was hurt in the incident but

hundreds of passengers had flights out of the Nepalese capital cancelled and all incoming flights were diverted after the Malindo Airlines Boeing 737 went off the runway late Thursday.

The jet was speeding down the Tribhuvan International Airport runway when the pilots detected a problem and aborted takeoff, airport spokesman Prem Nath Thakur said.
