## Water running dry in hills

CHT villages losing springs, streams

Every day, 30-year-old Ruposhi Chakma has to walk three kilometres to reach a well, to fetch water for her fivemember family. In Chela Chhara village in Rangamati's Kawkhali upazila where she lives, there isn't a nearby water source anymore. An increasing number of families in the Chittagong Hill Tracts are facing the same problem. Over the last five years, countless springs and streams that were once reliable for water are now dry.

Chela Chhara is home to around 150 Chakma families and once had no less than seven springs to rely on for water. "They all dried up," says one villager. "We dug a 15-foot well in a stream bed to access water but it is quite some distance from our houses."

In nearby Upor Para village the situation is similarly bleak. "During the dry season even our well has no water," says housewife Suchona Chakma. "To fetch water in these months involves a difficult two kilometre trek through hilly terrain."

Committee secretary of a local conservation group, Sudatta Bikash Tangchangya believes indiscriminate environmental destruction is to blame. "Many trees have been felled. Stones have been extracted from streams, undermining water retention capacity," he says. "This summer's crisis stems from rampant environmental damage inflicted by vested quarters."

To make matters worse, in parts of Rangamati streams were disturbed by the landslides of 13 June last year, with dislodged stones halting previous water flows.

Nor are wells always a viable alternative. "We dug up to SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

# Driver charged with murder of ten

A van driver who ran over 10 people when he plowed onto a busy Toronto sidewalk was charged with murder yesterday, as Canadian Prime Minister Justin Trudeau urged a rattled nation not to live in fear after the "senseless attack."

Police said the suspect, 25-year-old Alek Minassian, was not known to them before Monday's carnage in Canada's most populous city, which also left 15 people injured.

He also was not in the crosshairs of intelligence and security agencies, leading Public Safety Minister Ralph Goodale to sideline the theory of a terror attack such as those carried out by extremists in London, Nice and other major cities.

"On the basis of all available information at the

present time, there would appear to be no national security connection to this particular incident," Goodale said. But authorities said the incident dur-

ing the busy lunch hour Monday was undoubtedly deliberate, and Minassian -- his head shaved, and in a white police jumpsuit -- was charged with first degree murder in a brief court appearance.

He also faces multiple counts of Alek Minassian attempted murder over those injured in the incident.

Two South Koreans were among the dead, a foreign ministry official in Seoul told AFP, adding that another of the country's citizens seriously injured.

As the wounded recovered in local hospitals, federal, provincial and local investigators were SEE PAGE 13 COL 2

### AL hopeful of Teesta deal

Says Quader on return from Delhi

The move comes as deadline looms

President Donald Trump and French President Emmanuel Macron pledged yesterday to seek stronger measures to contain Iran, as the U.S. leader considers whether to ditch an international accord meant to prevent Tehran from obtaining a nuclear weapon.

At a joint news conference after lengthy talks, Trump did not repeat threats to withdraw from the 2015 agreement with Iran which was negotiated by his predecessor, former President Barack

Obama, but made clear he has little patience for staying in the deal.

Midway through a three-day state visit by Macron, the two leaders were remarkably chummy, repeatedly shaking hands and extolling each other's friendship.

The friendliness extended to their talks on Iran, Syria and trade but there was no indication of a breakthrough on Macron's bid to persuade Trump to keep the United States in the Iran nuclear deal, maintain U.S.
