NO LONGER A ROAD

Biogas power plant sits idle

Although the construction work of a biogas plant with a capacity to produce 80 kilowatts of power in Dashmina upazila of Patuakhali under Barisal was completed in June 2016, it is still sitting idle.

Constructed at a cost of Tk 8.49 crore, the government set up the biogas power plant as part of a seed farm, the largest in the area, on Char Bashbaria.

Bangladesh Machine Tools Factory in Gazipur, owned by Bangladesh Army, was in charge of the construction of the 40,804 square feet plant.

Six Chinese engineers supervised the setup of the plant that began on December 27, 2014, and was later handed over to Bangladesh Agriculture Development Corporation (BADC).

But since then, the environment-friendly plant lies idle.

According to BADC officials, the biogas power plant is ready to run, but it is unable to start operations for a lack of quality straw and skilled manpower to run it.

Md Tasir Hismi, an official of the constructing firm, said, "We set up a

modern straw-based biogas/power plant for the first time in Bangladesh. It has been designed to produce the power needed to run the seed farm."

About 50 kilometres east of Patuakhali city, the seed farm was set up on 1,044 acres of char land. It produces quality seeds that are distributed to farmers across the country by BADC.

The char area is surrounded by rivers on all sides, providing irrigation all year round. The farm was set up at a cost of Tk 245 crore under a four-year government project that ended on June 30, 2017. It also houses a warehouse, dormitory, labour sheds, office buildings, and a workshop.

After the project ended, the seed farm was transferred to BADC on July 1, 2017.

The idea behind the seed farm that includes a biogas power plant was noble.

The fields would produce crops, mainly paddy, for seeds; the straw of the paddy would be dried, cut and processed in the plant to produce power to run the farm and a bi-product of organic fertiliser; the fertiliser would again be used on the crops.

Biswajit Sikder, the then deputy assistant engineer of the seed farm, said

the straw would first be processed to produce 500 cubic metres of biogas that would be refined to get 300 cubic metres of pure gas and stored in gas chambers.

The pure gas would run two generators -- one producing 50KW of power and the other 30KW -- to deliver an uninterrupted supply of power to the seed farm, he added.

At present, solar panels light up the office building, while the rest of the infrastructure remains in the dark after sundown.

The biogas/power plant needs 1.5 tonnes of high quality straw a day to produce power and the straw was supposed to be collected from crops that are produced in the farm, he said.

Kishor Kumar Biswas, deputy director of the farm, said, "We are unable to run the power plant for a lack of quality straw." The straw that is produced in the farm loses quality after it is dried in the sun, he added.

"We also have a dearth of skilled manpower to run the plant."

He said he wrote to the higher authorities on January 11 in hopes of making the plant functional. He is yet to receive a response.

In Faridpur, Saiful Islam, 29, son of Azahar Ali Mir of Saltha upazila, died as a bus hit him while he was crossing Dhaka-Khulna highway in Majkandi area of Madhukhali upazila after he had got down from another bus on Thursday, reports our Faridpur correspondent.

In Jessore, Raju Hossain, 34, the helper of a bus driver, was killed and at least 30 others were injured when the vehicle fell into a ditch beside Jessore-Narail road near Karimpur Secondary School, reports our Benapole correspondent.

Seven of the wounded were rushed to Jessore General Hospital while the others to Narail and other places, passengers and hospital sources said.

The sudden attack came on February 7 afternoon ahead of the verdict in the Zia Orphanage Trust graft case against BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia. Khaleda, also a former prime minister, was jailed for five years on February 8 after she was found guilty in the case.

In a statement, the Bangladesh High Commission in London had said the BNP activists and members of its wings forcibly entered the commission premises on the pretext of submitting a memorandum.

we could not avoid admission related forgery due to the MCQ system. We have found out some admission seekers communicating with outsiders with the help of special devices.

"If we introduce descriptive format system, we would be able to evaluate the merit of students properly," he observed.

Like the admission tests, there will be no MCQs in all other exams, including mid-term, class tests and quiz tests, he added.

The JnU is the first public university to make such a decision after the government's ban on MCQs from Primary Education Completion Examination amid severe criticism over a spate of question leaks.

At present, almost all the higher educational institutions in the country hold MCQ-based exams for admission seekers.

At the JnU, admission seekers were to answer 75 MCQs in an hour. Besides, teachers were allowed to hold mid-term and class tests with MCQs. The syndicate also decided that the teachers at the honours level cannot use multimedia in the classrooms, except for special considerations where the usage of multimedia is required, said the university's press statement.

The teachers in no way can use notes, guidebooks and lecture sheets in any course and they will fix a standard text which is affordable and available in the market. Several reference books can be used, if needed, it said.
