YOUTH OLYMPICS QUALIFIERS

Bangladesh beat S Korea

After failing to secure a ticket for the Youth Olympic Games, the Bangladesh under-17 hockey team had to be content with a thirdplace finish in the Asian Youth Olympics Qualifiers with a 5-4 win over South Korea in Bangkok yesterday.

Last edition's runners-up Bangladesh, who came into the place-deciding match after losing 2-9 against India in the semifinals, got off to a fine start and took a 3-0 lead in the first 10-minute session, with Abed Uddin, Sarwar Sawon and Mehdi Hasan scoring one goal apiece.

In the second session, Bangladesh strengthened their grip on the match by extending the margin to 4-0 with captain Shohanur Rahman Sabuj netting the fourth goal before Korea pulled one back in the penultimate minute of the second quarter.

Bangladesh however, had to face some challenges from the Koreans in the third and final session as Cheon Min and Choi Inhyeak struck one goal each in the 23rd and 24th minutes to make it 4-3.

Bangladesh came back strongly to make it 5-3 in the 27th minute before South Korea responded in the same minute, but Bangladesh held on to the lead to snatch victory. Meanwhile, India beat

Malaysia 2-1 in shootouts in the final after regulation time had yielded a ended in a 4-4 draw.

Both India and Malaysia qualified for the Youth Olympic Games to be held in October in Buenos Aires.

Shakib wants Mash in Tests: Mahmud

Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) director Khaled Mahmud has become the latest in a chorus of voices calling for Mashrafe Bin Mortaza's return to Test

cricket. However, the former Bangladesh captain's entreaty was a little different as he seemed to be speaking on behalf of the current Bangladesh Test captain Shakib Al Hasan, who is now playing in the Indian Premier League for Sunrisers Hyderabad.

"Shakib thinks that it will be good for the team if Mashrafe returns [to the Test team]," Mahmud told reporters yesterday about a conversation he had with Shakib before the all-rounder left for his IPL stint. "He thinks that Mashrafe can swing the new ball and that is a very rare and valuable thing in our country.

"Shakib is of the opinion that if Mashrafe can bowl 15-20 overs per innings, it will help the team," said Mahmud.

Mashrafe last played a Test in June 2009 on the tour of West Indies and has since been prevented from a serious run in the

longer formats by a series of knee injuries. Since late 2014 however, the 34-year-old has played the ODI and T20I formats -until he retired from the latter in April 2017 -- relatively injury free and he played the last round of the four-day Bangladesh Cricket League for champions South Zone from April 24 to 26.

On the second day of that match he said in an interview that he wanted to come back to Test cricket and that he had the ability to play in the longer version for two more years. He however qualified that statement by saying that he needed some more time in the longer version to truly know whether he

was fit enough to play Tests. Mashrafe's international cricket is currently restricted to only one format -- he captains the ODI team. BCB president Nazmul Hassan asked him to come back to T20Is during a disastrous home series against Sri Lanka earlier this year, but Mashrafe seemed not to be interested. On Friday, the BCB boss said that if the physio and the player himself thought he was fit for Tests, the BCB would welcome him back. Bangladesh's next Test assignment is

on the West Indies tour in July-August.

Bangladesh Premier League champions Abahani will leave for the Maldives today for their AFC Cup match on Wednesday against New Radiant SC with the hope of securing a point against the Group E leaders.

The Sky Blues are in third position with four points from as many matches, five points less than JSW Bengaluru FC and New Radiant SC, who are however ahead of Bengaluru due to a superior goal difference. The first meeting between these two sides in Dhaka ended in a 1-0 win for the Maldivian champions.

Abahani, who wasted a good opportunity to stay in the race by being held to a 1-1 draw against Aizawl FC at home in their previous match, have a slim chance of becoming group champions if they post wins in their next two matches and New Radiant SC and Bengaluru FC suffer defeats in both their fixtures. Abahani will play their sixth and final group match against Bengaluru FC at home on May 16.

The Dhanmondi giants are likely to miss the services of goalkeeper Shahidul Alam Sohel and defender Nasir Chowdhury, who did not practice for the last four days due to ankle and knee injuries respectively.

"Our approach is to secure at least one point against them but we know it will be tough because New Radiant SC, who are also playing domestic league, have been in good form after beating Bengaluru FC in their previous match, Abahani coach Saiful Bari Titu said yesterday.

"New Radiant SC are ahead of Abahani in regards to local players. However, everything depends on how the players take the game mentally on the given day. If they continue to perform like they did against Aizawl, it is not possible to secure points. However, I am looking forward to the performances of foreign players like Sunday [Chizoba] and Emeka [Darlington]," said Titu, adding that they want to end the Maldives tour on a high note.

Maiden futsal stint for women

In a quest to gather new experience, the Bangladesh women's football team will leave for Thailand today to take part in the AFC

Women's Futsal Championship, to be held from May 2 to 12.

A total of 15 nations including Japan, China and Thailand, split into four groups, will play five-a-side indoor football matches with the top two teams from each group advancing to the quarterfinals.

Bangladesh have been pitted against Malaysia, Vietnam and Chinese Taipei in Group B and they will play their first match against Malaysia on May 2. The second match against Vietnam and the third match against Chinese Taipei are scheduled to take place on May 3 and May 6 respectively.

"We have never played futsal at any football will be a new experience for the girls because it is a high intensity 40-minute game where only five players will play and there will be no limitation to substitutions," explained coach Golam Rabbani Choton at a

press conference yesterday. There are usually special futsal teams for each nation, but Bangladesh do not have any such squad and the game's governing body is sending players who are regularly representing the country at football's age-level

tournaments and the national team. Out of the 42 players who have been in training round the year, the BFF picked

14 players with international experience. The only senior player in the side is Sabina Khatun while there are other level before. Playing such a type of good age-group players such as Krishna Rani, Sirat Jahan Swapna, Masura Parvin, Sanjida Akter, Sheuli Azim, Maria Manda, Mariza and Akhi Khatun.

"We have been preparing for this tournament since April 7 and I believe the girls will give their best to produce good results. We don't want to earn experience only, we also want to let others know about the rise of Bangladesh women's football," said Choton.

Captain Sabina has experience of playing competitive futsal -- she played in the Maldives league -- but believes that playing a different format of football rather than the regular one is going to be tough for each of the players.
