
Sharmin Rahman's exhibition at Manas

This journey was the beginning of the path to self-discovery for great passion in fashion design and intense amount of talent in excelling in it.

Having friends and family who are actively part of the media, designing clothing has been an integral part of her life. This April, Sharmin Rahman collaborated with Manas, a local boutique store where she exhibited some of her most classic summer blouses. This event was organised by Manas from 7 April to 12 April with amazing response from customers.

Sharmin is an avid Bengali at heart and thinks highly of local crafts and materials. She also understands the change in taste and exposure of the young generation in Bangladesh. "Youngsters in our country are loud and proud Bangladeshi in their hearts but their perception and experiences are changing through exposure of global proportions," said Sharmin.

Keeping that in mind, her designs for this exhibition have been extremely unique with the use of local crafts and incorporating local trends.

This unusual collection of twenty blouses/crop tops are unique but based on a common theme; contemporary yet very much root of this region, ensuring a refresh-



ing and playful look to welcome any day of our sunny summer.

The whole collection is on white, beige and ivory khaadi, cotton or endi with multi-coloured gamcha, crochet lace, and fringe-tassels displaying experimentation in patterns and unusual hemlines through playful balance of traditional materials and trendy cuts.

The brilliant execution of cherry-picking from the trends of the era and effortlessly blending it with today's style and aesthetic norms was a homage to the icons of the decade, complemented with the movement for women's empowerment and an absolute freedom to love all.

Always judicious in selection of colour and fabric, the entire range was fashion 2018 in perfection. There was an effortless transition from one colour scheme to the next. Kickstarting things with the vibrant hues of yellow, the blue and the orange that followed, mimicked a bright morning of a lively, unadulterated beachside party; and a stylish one at that.

The next queue burst into a sensual show-

down with an eclectic mix of orange into a red, so hot that it almost resembled the colour of the summer sun.

The event ended with an ode to the evergreen black in flattering cottons, cashmere-suede blends, the ideal sheen on silk, experimental neoprene and translucent plastic, the precise wool-silk blend, jersey cotton, chiffon and georgette — that seemed like perfection!

At the end, the meticulously placed sequins by hand, modern-day digital printing, and old-school hand painting that showcase what we can perhaps safely attribute as the designer's most vivid, nearly animated collection.

As the season changes in the coming months, the A-list Dhaka crowd eagerly anticipates yet another collection that is guaranteed to dazzle. What comes next is left to our imagination, as Mehruz Munir once again outdid himself.
