SSC results today

The results of Secondary School Certificate (SSC) and equivalent examinations will be published simultaneously across the country today.

Education Minister Nurul Islam Nahid along with 10 chairpersons of the education boards will hand over a summary of the results to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina at her office at 10:00am.

The results will be formally announced at a press conference at the education ministry at 1:00pm, said a ministry press release.

A total of 20.31 lakh students from 28,551 educational institutions under 10 educational boards appeared in this year's SSC and equivalent examinations.

The examinations, held in February, were marred by widespread allegations of question leak that drew fierce criticism.

A government probe committee found question papers of "Kha" set of multiple choice questions (MCQ) of 12 out of 17 subjects were leaked, but the education ministry

Imams and khatibs of different mosques in the capital yesterday vowed to play their part in preventing militancy, terrorism and

drug addiction. They decided to deliver messages of Islam against militancy and narcotics at different prayers -- including Juma and Tarabih during the upcoming Ramadan -so that people, especially youths, cannot be badly influenced.

If the sermons, which some mosques are currently delivering sporadically, could be delivered in a unified way, it would be more effective, they said at a views-exchange meeting held at Paltan in the evening.

Imams, khatibs and muezzins of the mosques from Motijheel, Paltan, Kamalapur and Shahjahanpur areas as well as teachers of various madrasas participated in the programme.

Woman rescued after dialing 999

A woman, who got stuck in between a wall and a high commode inside a lavatory at her Uttara residence on Friday night, was rescued by the members of the fire service in the early hours of yesterday after her husband sought help from the emergency helpline 999.

Alam Ara Akther, 55, slipped and fell, resulting in her getting stuck in between the narrow space around 11:00pm, her husband Abul Hossain told The Daily Star.

"My wife suffered a stroke two years back. Since then, she

has been sick. She also gained weight." "Once she got stuck, we tried to rescue her. Failing to do

so, I dialed 999," said her husband. An eight-member team rushed to the house at Uttara-11

and rescued her around 12:20am yesterday, said Shafiqul Islam, senior station officer of Uttara Fire Station.

She was also given primary treatment, the official added. The accident occurred due to the faulty set-up of the bathroom, Shafiqul said.

Abul Hossain said they were glad that the fire service team acted promptly and rescued his wife. She is doing well now, he added.

Solution lies in dialogue Sheikh Hasina tells Islamic world

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday said all differences of opinion and views that Islamic world have been experiencing can be resolved by openminded discussions and dialogue.

Bloodshed is unnecessary and indeed counterproductive, said the premier.

Reiterating her steadfast stand against terrorism and four-point proposal she made in Riyadh Conference in 2017, the premier said the points still remain valid to address terrorism.

She made the comments at the inaugural ceremony of the two-day 45th OIC Council of Foreign Ministers (CFM) at Bangabandhu International Conference Center (BICC) in the capital.

"We should stop supply of arms, stop flow of financing for terrorism, remove divisions within the [Muslim] Ummah (community), and pursue peaceful settlement of conflicts through dialogues resulting in a win-win situation," she said.

Sheikh Hasina said with one fifth of the world's

gic resources, and a number of rising economies with immense prospects, the Muslim world has no reason to remain behind.

Islamic countries must redesign their strategy of joint Islamic action, she said, adding, "Development is our right, economic prosperity is within our reach, and social progress is within our means."

In this context, she gave five suggestions so that

Islamic countries unitedly can protect their values, wealth and civilisation. Firstly, she said, Islamic countries must keep trust in basic Islamic faith, banish sectarian

mindset and stop using religion as a tool for divisive purposes or narrow political gains. Secondly, OIC countries should resolve all conflicts peacefully and solve all issues politically without giving any scope of interference and inter-

vention to detractors. Thirdly, OIC countries should live an enlightened life of self-awareness without compromising their fundamental faith, to stamp out Islamophobia.

"We should foster value-based international order," she added.

Fourthly, she said, OIC countries should pursue a fast track development course to eliminate poverty and hunger, and address humanitarian exigencies and collective actions to implement the OIC-2025 Programme of Action.

"Finally, we should constantly seek inspiration and strength from the eternal values of Islam peace, moderation, fraternity, equality, justice and compassion," the premier said. Sheikh Hasina said Bangabandhu had realised

the necessity of a collective voice of the Ummah on

issues of global importance, as to why Bangladesh, under his visionary leadership, joined OIC in "Bangabandhu gave importance to unity and solidarity within the Ummah in its common aspi-

rations of peace, prosperity, development and security. His vision still inspires us to move ahead as a nation," she said.

working towards a knowledge-based society: excellence in research of the social sciences". The book fair is open to public every day from


