
Since you've began your career, what has been the most memorable celebration so far?

What are you most grateful for?

Omar Sani: I am most grateful for the love I have earned from so many people. However, I have not yet earned a National Film Award for my work yet. When my career was at its prime, the forum for The National Film Award was closed for 8 years, so I have missed my chance! Many new actors are now following the journey you had taken once. Whose work do you admire most?

Omar Sani: To be honest, I have not seen a noteworthy performer since Shakib Khan. There are a couple that are emerging, but only time will test their endurance.

Selina Azad's solo musical soiree at BNM

Indira Gandhi Cultural Centre (IGCC) organised a solo musical soiree by noted artiste Selina Azad on May 4 at Poet Sufia Kamal Auditorium of Bangladesh National Museum, Shahbagh. The singer performed adhunik Bangla songs most of which she recorded for films of yesteryear.

The singer's husband, eminent musician Azad Rahman, directed the music for the featured songs. The packed audience was spellbound by Azad's soulful singing. She took the stage after 30 years.

Azad's repertoire included Doyel Koel Shalik, Rimjhim Rimjhim Brishti, Abar Kokhon Hobe Dekha, Tumi Hol-e Tumi Dur Elo Kachhe and Monero Rong-e Rangabo. Several young artistes of Sangskriti Kendra also presented two chorus songs at the event. It was one of

the most memorable events by IGCC as its director Jayashree Kundu mentioned in her concluding speech after the performances. Eminent music composer and director Sheikh Sadi Khan, who attended the event, spoke highly of the singer.

Azad is also a music teacher and general secretary of Sangskriti Kendra, which was established in 1990 in Dhaka by music maestro Ustad Azad Rahman. Born in a musical family, Azad took musical lessons from Ustad P.C. Gomez, Ustad Ful Mohammad and Nazrul Singers Sohrab Hossain and Sudhin

She is a Special Grade artiste of Bangladesh Betar and BTV. She earned great fame as a playback singer for the films Masud Rana, Dashyu Banhur, Khokan Sona, Mayar Badhon and more.

Suman Sarkar's "Poem of Varendra-2" Opens at BSK



Promising artist Suman Kumar Sarkar's third solo painting exhibition titled "Poem of Varendra-2" was opened on May 4 at the gallery of Bishwo Shahitto Kendro.

Suman, who has fond memories with the Santhals living in the north-western part of Bangladesh, depicted numerous realistic watercolour paintings shedding light on the life and culture of one of the oldest indigenous populations of this part of the world. The artist beautifully depicted the cattle's grazing in the uncultivated and uneven reddened land of Varendra and the yard nearing the kitchen of the Santhals.

For Suman, the yard suggests the saga of the indigenous people, while the clay walls of their huts with the roofs made of straw beckon the simple yet struggling life sketches of them who were originally hunters, gatherers, and agriculture labourers.

The painter also created several portraits of a Santhal mother with her offspring, Krishnokoli and Radha for the exhibit.



Suman portrayed life of the Santhals with the close proximity of nature in most of his paintings. The Santhal society is marked by diverse feasts, festivals, and ritualistic celebrations of life with the changing course of nature. The serpentine beauty of rivers, farmland, ferry ghat, series of resting boats, the idyll of Santhal village and the cattle house are marked by the artistic compositions and transparent colour treatment by the artist. Mingling the mature hues of ultramarine blue

with burnt sienna, the artist fantastically

depicted the landscape of ferry ghat, silent woods on both sides of a road, resting carts and many more.

The painter also created several portraits of a Santhal mother with her offspring, Krishnokoli and Radha for the exhibit.

Suman dreams of making a museum by collecting the musical instruments and the artistic elements of the Santhal culture with the proceeds of the paintings at the show. The artist's social liability towards the community truly deserves appreciation.
