Jamal Hossain Mollah fell four shots off the pace after a one-over in the crucial third round of the AB Bank Bangladesh Open yesterday.

The 33-year-old golfer, who started the day in pole position at eight-under, exchanged three birdies for two bogeys and a double bogey at the Kurmitola Golf Club on Friday to severely compromise his chances of winning his maiden Asian Tour title.

After his first over-par round, Jamal was on aggregate of seven-under-par (206), with England's Jack Harrison taking the clubhouse lead at 11-under-par (202).

Sri Lanka's Mithun Perera was one stroke behind the Englishman, looking to win his first title on Asia's premier tour while there were five other golfers between nine-under and eight-under.

Two-time winner on the tour Siddikur Rahman was way back at two-under-par alongside his compatriot Badal Hossain.



English rookie golfer Jack Harrison grabbed the clubhouse lead with a four-under in the third round.

A total of 89 golfers made the final two rounds, with 10 Bangladeshis from a total of 49 local golfers making it through.

Jamal, who has been in pretty good form of late having finished runner-up in the BTI two weeks ago, had a poor start to the day as he played a double bogey on the third hole. He recovered with three birdies in the next eight holes to get back in the lead, but two more bogeys on the 15th and 16th holes saw him slide down the leaderboard.

"My tee shots were not accurate today and I failed to putt properly so I had to concede a double bogey and two bogeys," the two-time PGTI winner said after the day's play.

The Kurmitola-based golfer, however, was not willing to give up and thinks there is still a chance for him to win his home event.

"Anything can happen on the last day because all top 10 golfers have a chance to win the title. I played really well in the first two days and the third day was a bad one for me. In golf, nothing is lost until the last shot. I will try my best to make a good start tomorrow," Jamal said.

Englishman Harrison, who is making his debut on the tour after coming through the qualifying school in January, said he was enjoying every bit of his game and the surroundings.

"I am loving the good vibes out here, especially when I am playing well. I am loving Dhaka so far. I love the course here, the people and everything else," Harrison told Asiantour.com.

The Englishman, who fired five birdies in his closing six holes, said he would play to his strengths on the final day. "I am just going to stick to the same game plan tomorrow and play my best and take advantage of my strengths, which is off the tees this week and hopefully win. I guess it's all about decision making and not being too greedy around the course here. It can really bite you. You got to keep it in play and don't try to go for the pins because if you miss, you won't have a chance really."

series at the Diamond Oval in Kimberly yesterday. The lack of technique and mental strength being

exposed by a quality side has been the theme of the ongoing South Africa tour and yesterdays' defeat was no exception. After being bundled out for 164 runs in the first ODI,

Bangladesh's three subsequent totals have been 89, 71 and 76 while South Africa were largely untroubled with the bat -- highlighting the gulf in class between the two sides.

Chasing 231 -- a fairly modest target but one made all | was playing in the Dhaka First Division the more challenging because of the failures in the last two matches -- only three Bangladesh batters were able to reach double figures with Fargana Hoque's 22 being the highest score. Rain fails to dampen zeal

It was hardly surprising to hear the words "rain stopped play" echo around Malahide Cricket Club when Test cricket

Yet the grey skies around Dublin did not dampen the enthusiasm of the fans in green, many of whom had waited decades for the day Ireland might at last be granted the opportunity to play in the five-day format so steeped in tradition.

came to Ireland for the first time on Friday.

"I played cricket way back in the '50s and as a child, of course, you dreamed of playing the international stuff," said Barry Ramsey, 76, who travelled from the north-west county of Donegal with his son, Barclay, to see the landmark match against Pakistan.

"Now to be at this stage, even though it's a long time since I played, is absolutely phenomenal."

Despite a World Cup win against Pakistan in 2007, an even more celebrated one over England in 2011 and their elevation to full Test match status last year, Ireland has always seen cricket very much as a minority game, way behind soccer, rugby and the traditional sports of Gaelic football

Ramsey recalled playing in the cricket street leagues in Donegal, a Gaelic football stronghold, and having to bow his head in team photos for fear the Gaelic Athletic Association, which until 1971 banned members from playing or attending socalled "foreign games", would forbid him from playing football.

Others were attending their first cricket game, keen to savour the occasion, while teachers brought lines of school children into the temporary stands, which were close to a 6,300 sell-out on the opening day.

Australians John Stewart and Jeremy Jastrzav had flown from Sydney just for the Test before returning home next Tuesday.

"Coming here and watching a Test in Ireland is a bit of a unique experience, this is a bit different to the SCG (the world-famous Sydney Cricket Ground) for us. It's an historic game," Stewart said.

No longer just constrained to the oneday game however, Ireland's enthusiastic fans will at least get four more shots at enjoying Test cricket for the first time.

"Could I swing Monday or Tuesday? Maybe," said Barclay Ramsey. "We'd be making nice phone calls into work!"
