1,000 private secondary schools to be brought under MPO

Says finance minister

Finance Minister AMA Muhith has said 1,000 private secondary schools will be brought under the Monthly Pay Order (MPO) coverage in the next budget.

Muhith said this on Friday night at a prebudget live show organised by Metropolitan Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Dhaka (MCCI) and Maasranga Television.

The finance minister said in the last six years no new school has been brought under the MPO. Even then, the number of schools under MPO is currently 27,000.

"During this period, the secondary schools grew like mushrooms, performance of which are worthless," Muhith said.

He also said a fund will be formed, which will be used to improve the quality of the teachers.

Earlier on Wednesday at a pre-budget meeting with Economic Reporters Forum (ERF), Muhith said some more private educational institutions would be brought under the MPO coverage in the next budget with strict conditions, as he criticised the education ministry for not reforming the MPO system.

"I have been trying to recast the MPO system for the last 10 years but my efforts did not see light. The education ministry thinks it is a safe arrangement [the way MPO enlistment is being done] for them," Muhith said.

"I formed a committee which was totally dysfunctional because the education ministry did not cooperate," the minister added.

He said despite resumption of the government's MPO facility, inclusion in the MPO would not be only about salary. A part of the grant would have to be spent on building infrastructure and procuring equipment, he added.

The minister observed that the education ministry's advice would not be taken in this regard and the money to be given under the MPO system would have to be spent as per the finance ministry's guidelines.

Several thousand teachers of nongovernment institutions, under the banner of different organisations, took to the streets last December and January. They observed programmes like hunger strike in front of Jatiya Press Club, demanding inclusion in the MPO.

They, however, called off their

Abandoned newborn finds a lifeline

Rescued from dumpster, girl recovers at DMCH

A newborn girl was rescued from a dumpster in Mohammadpur area of Dhaka yesterday.

Street cleaners spotted the neonate at a dumpster near Janata Housing around 5:30am and informed police, Jamal Uddin Mir, officer-in-charge of Mohammadpur Police Station, told The Daily Star.

On information, a team from the police station rescued her and took her to a nearby clinic, he said.

Later, she was referred to Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) around 2:15pm for better treatment, according to DMCH sources.

The baby, weighing three kilogrammes, is now undergoing treatment at neonatal ward and her condition is stable, DMCH Director Brigadier General AKM Nasiruddin said, adding that the baby was being orally fed.

A cleaner named Fatema was cleaning in Mohammadpur area at dawn when she heard the crying of a baby. She rushed to the spot and saw a newborn girl with umbilical cord still attached. When police came to rescue the newborn, Fatema went to the DMCH with the baby.

OC Jamal Uddin Mir further said they will collect CCIV footage to identify who dumped her into the dustbin. However, no diary or case was filed in connection with the incident.

In association with the Social Service Department and police, the baby will be shifted to "Chhotomoni Nibash", a government-run childcare centre in the capital's Azimpur tomorrow, he added.

Restrain yourselves from excessive private practice for judicial commission

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged the physicians in pubic service to restrain from excessive private practice.

"...You need to think how much pressure you can take... it's quite natural to lose temper when you're doing government job all day long and then going for private practice at night," she said.

The prime minister said this while inaugurating the National Institute of Advanced Nursing Education and Research (NIANER), the only institute in

the country set to provide higher education on nursing, in the capital's Mugda area.

"We've raised the salaries and allowances in government jobs... we've increased it by 123 percent," she said.

"I won't blame you (doctors and nurses)... we've got a huge population... you have to take so much pressure...so, it's very tough to control temper," she said.

Hasina said the attitude of


SAJIDA Foundation lends a hand to disadvantaged mothers

Ask poor litigants if they need legal aid

CJ urges district judges

STAFF CORRESPONDENT Chief Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain yesterday called upon district judges to take prompt measures to help the country's poor and

destitute people get justice. "When the accused persons are taken to court from the police station, ask them whether they are capable of hiring a lawyer. If not, take immediate steps to help them get a lawyer through the (govern-

ment) legal aid office," he said. The CJ was addressing a viewsexchange meeting in the Supreme Court auditorium.

SC Legal Aid Committee of National Legal Aid Services Organisation (NLASO) and rights body Manusher Jonno Foundation (MJF) arranged the programme on "Government Legal Service in Higher Court, Expectation of Justice-seekers, and the Role and Doable of Related Persons including Lawyers in Conducting Jail Appeal Cases".

The chief justice said lower courts have to be sincere about settling cases referred through the legal aid office.

He also said he will strongly consider forming a separate, or multiple benches to dispose of jail appeals. Jail appeals refer to appeals filed

by convicted prisoners through the jail authorities. Jail superintendents, district and

and SC lawyers took part in an open discussion which laid emphasis on government legal aid including difficulties in getting the certified

copy of judgement in jail appeals. The chief justice directed the lower courts to provide the certified sessions judges, legal aid officials copy to the jail authorities sincerely,
