

Over 300 people sick after taking biryani

The contaminated food was provided at separate rallies of a former AL lawmaker

Over 300 Awami League (AL) activists fell sick after taking contaminated biryani provided at separate rallies in Moheshpur and Kotchandpur upazilas arranged by a former female AL lawmaker.

Former AL MP from Jhenidah-3 constituency Parvin Talukdar Maya, also one of the nomination seekers in the upcoming National Parliamentary Election, arranged the rallies on Tuesday and Wednesday where hundreds of ruling party activists took part.

At least 70 AL men fell sick after taking contaminated biryani, following a rally of the female AL leader at Moheshpur Secondary School ground on Tuesday.

The victims were admitted to Moheshpur, Kotchandpur and Jibonnagar Upazila Health Complexes with severe pain in their abdomen.

Similarly, nearly 250 AL leaders and activists fell sick after taking biryani at a rally arranged by the former lawmaker at Kotchandpur Main Stand around 5:00pm on Wednesday.

Dr Shahabuddin, on duty doctor at Kotchandpur Upazila Health Complex said about 250 patients, suffering from vomiting and abdomen pain, took admission at the hospital due to food poisoning till 12:00noon yesterday.

While talking to this correspondent Ex-MP Maya said she and her husband also fell sick after taking the biryani.

Envious at her popularity some dishonest people might have mixed toxic elements with the biryani, she alleged, adding that it is surely a conspiracy against her as such similar incidents cannot happen on consecutive occasions at two different venues.

Ruling AL lawmaker from Jhenidah-3 constituency Nabi Newaj said many AL leaders and activist fell sick after taking contaminated biryani provided by Parvin Talukdar Maya on Wednesday and the day before.


Legal action should be taken against the female AL leader for arranging such controversial conference under the banner of ruling AL.

Meanwhile, district administration formed a five-member probe committee led by Assistant Superintendent of Police Kanak Kumar Biswas to investigate the incident.

Barapukuria miners', villagers' strike continues

Food shortage feared as agitators block main entrance of compound

Hundreds of employees, including 150 officials and 300 foreign nationals, living at Barapukuria Coal Mining Company Limited (BCMCL) compound have been facing food crisis and insecurity as the joint indefinite strike called by the miners and villagers to press home their demands is turning out to be a bit cruel.

Earlier on Sunday, about 1,000 miners of BCMCL and villagers affected by land subsidence started an indefinite strike which entered its fifth consecutive day yesterday.

BCMCL employees said many officials, their family members and foreign nationals have remained confined inside the coalmine compound as the agitators kept its main entrance blocked since Sunday.

"We will have to starve if the situation continues for two more days," BCMCL Secretary Abdul Kashem Prodhania said, adding that the agitators are not even allowing medicines and foods for the children inside the compound."

Deputy General Manager Zafar Sadique said they bought some food and groceries under police protection on Wednesday.

On Tuesday, at least 15 people were injured during a clash in front of the coalmine compound.

Orders on Khaleda

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Apart from the two cases, there was no development in the other five cases yesterday.

In another development, lawyers for the BNP chief yesterday submitted four petitions with four Dhaka courts seeking withdrawal of production warrants issued earlier against Khaleda in Gato, Niko, Barapukuria coal mine and Zia Charitable Trust graft cases.

Of them, production warrant of the Niko graft case was withdrawn, while judges of Gato and Barapukuria coal mine graft cases will pass orders subject to submission of Khaleda's SC bail order in Zia Orphanage Trust corruption case.

And judge of the Zia Charitable Trust corruption case fixed June 4 for passing an order on the petition filed for withdrawal of the production warrant, said Sanaullah Miah, lawyer for the BNP chief.

So, Khaleda cannot walk out of prison right now even after winning a hard-fought legal battle for bail in the Zia Orphanage Trust corruption case at the SC on Wednesday, as she didn't get bail in seven other cases in which she was shown arrested.

LAWYERS MEET KHALEDA

Khaleda yesterday alleged that the government was trying to keep her in jail for a long time so that it could hold a one-sided election like that of 2014.

She made the comment while four lawyers met her at the old Central Jail on Nazimuddin Road in Dhaka yesterday afternoon.

"Khaleda Zia said the lower courts were not granting her bail and withdrawing production warrants issued earlier against her, even though the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court upheld her High Court bail in the Zia Orphanage Trust corruption case," said Masud Ahmed Talukder, one of the lawyers who met her, told The Daily Star.

He said the BNP chief also instructed the party leaders and activists to continue the peaceful movement for her release.

Khaleda is seriously ill and she cannot move normally, the lawyer said, adding that she felt that if she was treated at United Hospital, she would get well.

She also conveyed Ramadan greetings in advance to the people and her party leaders and activists, Masud said.

Three other lawyers who met Khaleda from 4:00pm to 5:15pm were Khandker Mahbub Hossain, AJ Mohammad Ali and Sanaullah Miah.

Groundnut farming increases in Bandarban

Groundnut cultivation in the riverside areas in the district has added a new dimension to local agriculture and is gaining popularity as production cost is low and the profit is good.

District Department of Agriculture Extension (DAE) Deputy Director (DD) Altaf Hossain said 2,021 tonnes of groundnut were produced on 971 hectares of land under the seven upazilas this year, while it was 1,986 tonnes on 869 hectares last year.

Groundnut is one of the most profitable among all crops cultivated on the sandy lands in the riverside areas of the Sangu, Mathamuhuri and Banskhali rivers.

"I have been cultivating groundnut for

the last three years and earned profit of around Tk 20,000 per season. I expect to get more this season," said Hla Mya Prue Marma of Ruma area.

"There are huge opportunities for groundnut farming as the soil and weather in the district are favourable for its cultivation," the DD said.

The DD said more and more farmers in the district are opting for groundnut farming as it is profitable and production cost is low.

Zinga, Tridana, and Bina-6 varieties of groundnut are cultivated in the district, the DD said.

DAE field workers are raising awareness among the farmers about cultivating new and high yielding varieties of groundnut instead of tobacco for gaining more profit, he added.

Child in Habiganj suffering rare genetic condition

Eleven-year-old Nitu from Shyestanagar in Habiganj doesn't get to play outside and socialise like other children. Mostly she stays at home. Nitu suffers from a rare genetic disorder called progeria, which causes rapid aging in children. The diagnosis is grim: Most children with progeria do not live for more than thirteen years.

"Three months after her birth, Nitu suddenly fell ill," explains her father Kamrul Hasan, an employee at a local workshop. "Her hands, feet, face and the skin all over her body became dry. Her feet started to look like an old person's feet. We sought treatment for her at different places in Habiganj. She underwent two years of treatment in Sylhet, without any good result."

Nitu was also admitted at the Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University Hospital in Dhaka where she was treated intermittently until 2016. But not much could be done.

Progeria is not an inherited condition. It is caused by a single mistake in the coding of a certain gene, which causes the body to produce an abnormal protein. The protein causes the rapid aging.

"It is a very rare condition," says Dr Md Abu Sufian, the principal of Sheikh Hasina Medical College in Habiganj. "A study found that progeria affects one child in 40 lakhs. No cure for the disease has been discovered. Only we can try to support Nitu in managing the symptoms."

Drugs designed to lower cholesterol and prevent blood clots can help a progeria patient. A low daily dose of aspirin can work to prevent heart attack and stroke. Growth hor-

mones can stimulate improvement in height and weight, and there is a cancer drug that may fix damaged cells.

At home, a child with progeria needs to drink

plenty of water since they are easily dehydrated. It is advisable for them to eat small meals more frequently for better sustenance. Shoes with padded inserts can help a child to stay active for longer.

Physiotherapy is also worthwhile.

"Mostly Nitu stays at home," says her mother Jusna Begum. "We have done everything we could do. Her medical costs are expensive and we have spent nearly all our savings."

Local social worker Chowdhury Jannat Rakhi has helped the family. "Many people were saying bad things about Nitu so I brought her to my home, and I was able to have her admitted at the nearby school for children with disabilities."

"We stand with Nitu," says the deputy commissioner in Habiganj, Mahmudul Kabir Murad. "The district administration will support her and her family in any way that we can. I would also urge wealthy citizens to stand beside her."

"When I heard about her condition I went to her home," says the parliamentary representative for Habiganj-3, Abu Jahir MP. "The government will spend Tk 4 lakh on a new home for her family. In my personal capacity I will also do whatever I can."

Nitu's parents also appeal to the well-to-do in society to help in whatever way they can. The hope is that Nitu can live a longer life; and that whatever time she does have left, is lived with as much dignity and as little discomfort as possible.
