A school for the poor

Once a child labourer, Alok Chandra sets up free school for underprivileged kids

As the sun sets on the horizon in Elahipur village of Khulna's Rupsha upazila, most children begin heading home from the playgrounds; except eight-year-old Sukur. The child eagerly leaves his homes and makes his way to Anushilon Mojar School.

"I have been waiting all day for this wonderful moment," Sukur said.

Like many of his fellow classmates, Sukur had never thought of reading books and writing before enrolling in the school. After his father left him and his mother a few years ago, the duo joined a fish processing company in the locality to make ends meet.

But the earning was too little and education became a luxury they could not afford.

In 2017, the authority of Anushilon Mojar School provided free tuition to Sukur who once had no knowledge of reading and writing. Today he is a proud nursery student of Elahipur Government Primary School.

"I had to spend all day working but now everything has changed. The teachers are very affectionate and caring. They love me very much. They also give me snacks during the evening school," he said.

The initiative for the school was taken by Alok Chandra Das. Once a child labourer himself, Das understood the SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

Anarchy rules transport sector

Cheating continues in the name of seating service

With the government failing to regulate the so-called "seating service" bus operators in the capital, the buses continue to charge extra every day.

Around 96 percent buses and minibuses offering "seating services" are taking extra fares, a survey of a passengers' platform revealed yesterday.

Bangladesh Jatri Kalyan Samity, the platform, said in the name of "seating services," 96 percent buses and minibuses lock their doors between 7:00am and 11:00am and 2:00pm and 11:00pm, causing trouble for passengers who want to get on the buses between their starting point and journey end.

Those buses take extra fare as they do not follow the government's fare chart, the platform alleged, saying, "For REUTERS, Seou this reason, transportation cost for the lower-income group is becoming unbearable."

Unregulated charging of fares is common throughout the year but during Ramadan many regular buses turn themselves into "seating services" putting passengers in trouble, Mozammel Haque Chowdhury, secretary general of the samity, observed.

"Cashing in on the higher demand for buses before Iftar time, they [bus operators] overcharge the passengers," he told The Daily Star referring to the survey yesterday.

Hopes rise for talks

Leaders of two Koreas hold surprise meeting to keep US-N Korea summit on track



South Korean President Moon Jae-in held a surprise meeting with North Korean leader Kim Jong Un yesterday in an effort to ensure a high-stakes summit between Kim and US President Donald Trump takes place successfully, South Korean officials said.

The unannounced meeting is the latest dramatic turn in a week of diplomatic flipflops surrounding an unprecedented summit between the United States and North

Korea, and the strongest sign yet that the two Korean leaders are trying to keep the onagain off-again summit on track.

Their two-hour talks at the Panmunjom border village came a month after they held the first inter-Korean summit in more than a decade at the same venue on April 27 and declared they would work toward a nuclearfree Korean peninsula and formally ending the 1950-53 Korean War.

The hidden world under Antarctica

Vast canyons and mountain ranges twice the size of Ben Nevis have been discovered hidden beneath the South Pole.

Ice penetrating radar was used to uncover the canyons, which cut through three expansive subterranean mountain ranges under the Antarctic ice shelf.

As global warming continues to heat up the poles of our planet, these valleys could play a crucial role in controlling the flow of ice, scientists claim.

Researchers from Northumbria University were part of an international team that studied the canyons as part of the European Space Agency PolarGAP project.

Radar images revealed the deep troughs, which run for hundreds of miles under the ice and cut through subterranean mountains.

Girl killed 'after rape' in Tangail

A schoolgirl was allegedly raped and killed at Aronkhola union in the district's Madhupur upazila on Friday. The victim was identi-

fied as Liza, 11, daughter of Mizanur Rahman of Uttor Gachhabari village. Mizanur, a farmer, said his daughter, a fifth grader

at Gachhabari Government Primary School, went missing on Friday afternoon. She last told her mother that she was going to take her bath at a nearby water body, he added.

As she did not return home till the evening, locals in groups started a search for her. Her body was later found under banana leaves in a bamboo orchard

around 9:30pm, said Belayet Hossain, member of Aronkhola Union Parishad.

Police recovered her body and sent her body to Tangail General Hospital morgue for autopsy yesterday morning.

Indian army foils infiltration bid

Kills five 'militants' in Kashmir

At least five terrorists were killed in a gunfight with the Indian Army on the Line of Control (LoC) after an infiltration attempt from across the de facto border with Pakistan was foiled early yesterday, officials said.

The operation was launched in north Kashmir border area of Tanghdar. "Five terrorists killed while attempting to infiltrate early morning today," a defence spokesperson said.

Officials said more militants could be involved as the operation was still on.

This is the first infiltration bid to be foiled near the line of control (LoC) with Pakistan since the Union government declared a unilateral ceasefire in view of Ramzan recently. Although Army personnel had spotted a few militants near SEE PAGE 10 COL 4
