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Call for justice, safe return

UN secretary-general urges global support for Rohingyas, strong int'l pressure on Myanmar, listens to heartbreaking accounts of refugees

As he walked through the alleys of the makeshift camps in rains and met Rohingya boys and girls, he remembered his granddaughters and tried to imagine what it would be like to see them in such conditions.

And he felt heartbroken as he listened to the Rohingya men and women -- their stories of cruelty and abuses in Rakhine State of Myanmar and subsequent escape.

"In Cox's Bazar, Bangladesh, I've just heard unimaginable accounts of killing and rape from Rohingya refugees who recently fled Myanmar. They want justice and a safe return home," said UN Secretary-General António Guterres in a tweet as he visited the camps yesterday.

'We are all

In another tweet, the UN chief said nothing could've prepared him for the scale of crisis and extent of suffering he saw in Cox's Bazar. "I heard heartbreaking accounts from Rohingya refugees that will stay with me forever.

"My appeal to the int'l community is to step up support."

Guterres arrived in Cox's Bazar from Dhaka on a special flight of Biman Bangladesh Airlines at 8:45am yesterday, accompanied by World Bank President Jim Yong Kim and UN High Commissioner for Refugees Filippo Grandi.

They went to Hotel Sayeman where Foreign Minister AH Mahmood Ali briefed them on the Rohingya situation. From SEE PAGE 10 COL 4

"I am extremely humbled and moved by the courage of the #Rohingya. We cannot turn our heads away. We stand in solidarity -- today we are all Rohingya," Jim tweeted after visiting the refugee camps in Kutupalong along with UN Secretary-General António Guterres.

At a press conference after the visit, Jim said the Rohingya issue was not a problem only for the host country or the refugees.

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The government yesterday evening formed a seven-member committee "to review or reform or cancel" the quota system for the civil service.

The committee, led by Cabinet Secretary M Shafiul Alam, was asked to submit a report within 15 workings days, Mominul Hoque, senior information officer of the public administration ministry, told The Daily Star last night.

Other members of the committee are: secretaries of public administration ministry, finance ministry, Liberation War affairs ministry, law ministry (legislative division), Public Service Commission and acting secretary to the Prime Minister's Office, he said.

Faruk Hassan collapsed on the ground as punch after punch rained down on him. Now the attackers, led by Bangladesh Chhatra League men, were taking turn to stomp on him in front of the central Shaheed Minar.

A woman rushed to the scene to save Faruk, a master's student at Dhaka University. But the attackers showed no mercy, pushing and shoving the woman, as they continued stomping and kicking Faruk, also a leader of quota reform movement.

"How could they beat us in front of so many of you? Don't you have anything to say? Then what democracy we are living in where we don't have any freedom of expression? We have come here at a rightful demonstration.

"Did we commit any crime? How dare these hooligans get such impunity that they abduct people in broad day light?" asked Luthfunnahar Luma, a second-year student of Eden Mohila College.

She was crying, covering her face.












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
