

A true test of 'Predictable, inoffensive' 'Only the start' character

Belgium passed their test of character with a display of true fighting spirit, coach Roberto Martinez said after they came from 2-0 behind to beat Japan 3-2 in injury time.

"That's what happens in the World Cup," said the Spaniard, who was hired after a side packed with English Premier League talent collapsed against Wales in the Euro 2016 quarter-final.

"It was a test of character and a test of the team," said Martinez after substitute Nacer Chadli slammed the ball home four minutes into stoppage time, breaking the hearts of Japan fans whose side scored twice early in the second half.

Run ragged at times by the skilful and determined Samurai Blue, ranked 58 places behind them at 61st in FIFA's world rankings, the Red Devils will look hard at their defensive frailties and difficulties in turning pressure into goals before they face Brazil in the quarter-final.

Spain's media flayed the team's unimaginative style after their shock World Cup elimination by their lowly ranked hosts Russia but federation president Luis Rubiales escaped the bulk of criticism despite the abrupt sacking of coach Julen Lopetegui.

"Walking all the way home," said the front cover of newspaper Marca after Spain were beaten 4-3 in a penalty shoot-out by Russia.

"The end of a generation," declared the cover of AS after a defeat which denied veteran midfielder Andres Iniesta one last gong before retiring from international football. "Penalties threw Spain out of a World Cup which, if we're honest, will not miss them. Spain didn't play well,"

added the editorial in AS, lamenting a run of three draws against Portugal, Morocco and Russia and only one win, a narrow 1-0 victory over Iran.

Strangely, only Valencia-based daily Super Deporte, pointed to the decision to sack Lopetegui the day before the tournament started for failing to tell the federation about his impending move to Real Madrid.

Super Deporte laid the blame for Lopetegui's dismissal squarely at Real's president Florentino Perez, picturing the Madrid chief and asking "Are you satisfied?"

Former Sevilla coach Joaquin Caparros was fiercely critical of Spain's play against Russia in a column for newspaper El Mundo.

"Spain's football was slow, predict-

able and inoffensive," he wrote.

"They were way off their usual level. They had a magnificent opportunity to grow after taking the lead and kill the game off but they conformed with the goal and instead of going forward they took a step back."

Broadsheet El Pais pointed to a collective debacle, from the federation down to the players' disappointing displays in Russia.

"Spain built up so much absurdity during this tempestuous World Cup campaign that they ended up condemning themselves," it said.

"Spain frequently looked like they were climbing the Himalayas, no matter how much they raged against criticism and didn't focus on their real enemy: themselves."

Russia coach Stanislav Cherchesov believes the World Cup hosts' shock victory over title contenders Spain on penalites following a 1-1 draw in the last 16 on Sunday "is only the beginning".

Captain Igor Akinfeev saved two penalties as Russia triumphed 4-3 in a dramatic shootout in Moscow to reach a first quarter-final since the Soviet era, in 1970.


"I'm not the man of the match, the man of the match is our team and fans," said Akinfeev, after each converted penalty, and his saves from Koke and Iago Aspas, were greeted with a deafening roar from a crowd of 78,011 at the Luzhniki Stadium.

Russia were largely expected to just make up the numbers at their own tournament after entering with a sevenmatch winless run and ranked the lowest of the 32 teams.

Cherchesov has masterminded a remarkable upturn in fortunes, with back-to-back wins over Saudi Arabia and Egypt to launch their campaign sparking a wave of national euphoria.

fourth wicket after the home side struggled on 74 for 3. Mosaddek, who struck his second consecutive first class hundred since being left out of the national team's Test match against Sri Lanka earlier this year, was dismissed on 135.

On the other hand, Sabbir registered a career-best first-class knock of 165 runs off 243 balls. During his over seven-hour stay at the crease the righthander displayed great patience, which is the biggest concern when it comes to him batting for the Bangladesh team.

However, Sri Lanka replied strongly in their second innings with skipper Dimuth Karunaratne striking a hundred to help post 262 for two as the game eventually ended in a draw.

Serena, Federer sail thru'

Dimitrov crashes out of first round

Eight-time champion Roger Federer and seven-time winner Serena Williams shrugged off 30-degree heat to breeze into the Wimbledon second round Monday.

Federer, the defending champion and seeking a 21st major, marked the start of his 20th successive Wimbledon with a new look and a comfortable 6-1, 6-3, 6-4 win over Serbia's Dusan Lajovic. Williams, like Federer, 36-years-old but

chasing a 24th Slam title, enjoyed a hardfought 7-5, 6-3 victory over Holland's Arantxa Rus. It was the American's first match at the

All England Club since lifting the 2016 title. She missed the 2017 edition as she prepared for the birth of her first child.

Federer cruised past world number 57 Lajovic in just 79 minutes. After just 20 minutes to complete the first set, Federer went on to fire 35 winners past Lajovic, breaking serve five times, setting up a second round encounter against either Lukas Lacko of Slovakia or French qualifier Benjamin Bonzi.

Out on Court One, Serena, seeded 25 this year despite a ranking of 181, had too much power for Rus, the world 107 who made the third round in 2012 but failed to

get out of qualifying on her last three visits. Williams, looking to move within one title of Martina Navratilova's Open era 7-6 (7/4), 6-3.

record of nine Wimbledon titles, fired 23 winners past Rus and broke serve four times. She next faces either Bulgarian qualifier Viktoriya Tomova or Czech wild card Tereza Smitkova.

US Open champion and fourth seed Sloane Stephens became the tournament's first big name casualty when she slumped to a 6-1, 6-3 loss to Croatia's world 55 Donna Vekic. A few hours later, sixth seed Grigor Dimitrov crashed out 1-6, 7-6 (7/3), 7-6 (7/5), 6-4 to three-time slam champion Stan Wawrinka, currently ranked 225 as he was out of the game because of knee surgery.

Third seed and 2017 runner-up Marin Cilic enjoyed a 6-1, 6-4, 6-4 win over Japan's Yoshihito Nishioka.

Cilic, who won the Wimbledon warmup event at Queen's Club last month, fired 21 aces and 44 winners past his 259th-

ranked opponent. Second seed Caroline Wozniacki built on her Eastbourne title at the weekend with a 59-minute, 6-0, 6-3 win over Varvara Lepchenko.

Venus Williams, a five-time champion and runner-up last year, made the next round with a 6-7 (3/7), 6-2, 6-1 win against

Johanna Larsson of Sweden. Serena's fellow tennis-playing mother, Victoria Azarenka, a former world number one and two-time semi-finalist, defeated Ekaterina Alexandrova of Russia
