

21st Young Artists' Art Exhibition inaugurates

To inspire young artists, Bangladesh Shilpakala Academy (BSA) has organised the 21st Young Artists' Art Exhibition at its National Art Gallery. Cultural Affairs Minister, Asaduzzaman Noor, inaugurated the exhibition yesterday as chief guest.



This year, Shagor Chakrobarty won the Young Artist Award 2018 for his work 'Red City-1', Prodip Saha received the best award (painting) for his artwork 'Regenerate-2.' S M Saha Anisuzzaman Faroque was the winner in the sculpture category for his work 'Flying Iron Wings.' Swapan Kumar Sana bagged the best award (print) for the work 'Realisation-2.'

The four honourable mention award winners are Susmita Mukherjee Misty, Faisal Abir, Mahmuda Siddika and Asim Kumar Roy.

Md Nasir Uddin Ahmed, Secretary, Ministry of Cultural Affairs, and renowned artist Chandra Shekhar Dey attended the event as special guests. Liaquat Ali Lucky, Director General of BSA, presided over the programme.

The exhibition showcases 412 artworks by 380 artists. The display features watercolour, oil, acrylic, mixed media, graphics, tapestry, woodcut, screen print, ceramics, metal, machinery, glass, paper, installation and more.

Initially, a total of 787 Bangladeshi artists (aged between 21 to 35) submitted 1976 artworks. BSA has been organising the exhibition biennially featuring works by talented young artists since 1975.

The award winning artworks have been selected by a three-member jury comprised of artists Chandra Shekhar Dey, KMA Quayum and Saidul Haque Juise. The exhibition will remain open from 11am to 8pm until 28 July.

Remembering Abdullah Al Mamun

What are your reflections on birthdays today?

RIA: Now it feels like time is just running out. I am getting older and there are many things I find myself pondering on. I am unable to greet these occasions as cheerfully as I once did. I wish for the rest of my life to carry on happily.

What are your plans for today?

RIA: It is most likely that I will be shooting. But, I don't mind this. I love my work and hope to be busy filming today. Have you had the chance to celebrate your birthday outside

Bangladesh? RIA: A few times, yes. However, those trips were for work. My wife and daughter live in the USA, and once when I was recovering from illness, I spent a long time there. My wife and daughter

threw me a surprise to make me happy. You have not focused on anything else other than acting - has

there been a particular reason why? RIA: That's right. I have never directed, produced, or done anything else other than acting, because I have never been tempted to do anything else. I believe people are best at doing what they love, and this is what I have always loved.

What are you currently working on?

RIA: I am working on a series called The Dhaka Express, directed by Shahadat Alam Bhubon. I am also working on a film titled Obotaar, directed by Hasan Sikder.
