

BOLT POISED FOR A-LEAGUE TRIAL

Usain Bolt is on the verge of sealing a deal to trial with the A-League's Central Coast Mariners, the Australian club said Tuesday, as the sprint legend pursues his dream of playing professional football. Eight-time Olympic champion Bolt, 31, who retired from athletics after August's World Championships in London, is an avid Manchester United fan who has long dreamt of playing top-flight football. The 100m and 200m world recordholder trained with Norwegian club Stromsgodset last month and Bundesliga club Borussia Dortmund in March The planned arrangement will see him take part in a six-week trial starting next month at the Mariners' base in Gosford, some 75 kilometres (47 miles) north of Sydney, chief executive Shaun Mielekamp said. A season-long deal could follow if it goes well, he told commercial broadcaster Channel Seven. -- REUTERS

With the World Cup over, the superstar attacker's 100 million-euro move from European champions Real Madrid has put all eyes on the Italian champions and Serie A, and Ronaldo said that he wasn't "here on holiday".

"I'm different from other players who think their careers are over when they're my age," said the 33-year-old Portugal captain. "I want to show that I'm not like the others, I'm different.

"Players of my age go to China or Qatar so coming to such an important club at this stage in my career makes me very happy."

The five-time Ballon d'Or winner was his usual confident self at a press conference held largely in Portuguese at Juve's state-ofthe-art Allianz Stadium that was attended by media from all over the globe, saying that he had "nothing to prove to anyone".

"The numbers are there, everyone knows what I've done for football, but I'm ambitious and I like challenges," he said.

"I didn't want to stay in my comfort zone after what I did for Manchester and Real Madrid. I want to leave my mark on Juve."

Italian champions Juventus signed the

superstar attacker, who put pen to paper on a four-year deal worth a reported 30 million euros a season, in the hope that he will push them to a coveted Champions League title, the continent's holy grail.

Preparing to make a run at an eighth Serie A title in as many years, the Old Lady of Italian football have struggled to turn domestic dominance into European trophies.

Juve have not won the competition since 1996 but were beaten finalists in 2015 and 2017, bested respectively by Barcelona and Ronaldo's former club. Ronaldo meanwhile has scored more Champions League's goals -- 120 -- than anyone else and won four out of the last five editions with Real Madrid.

"We're going to fight for not just Champions League, but also Serie A and the others trophies," he said. "I need to work hard because the Champions League is not easily won. I hope I can help."

Ronaldo was speaking to media after a busy day in Turin, which began with a warm welcome from Juve fans before Monday morning's medical.

Hundreds of fans gathered outside the Allianz Stadium in Turin from early morning singing "Ronaldo, bring us the Champions [League]" as he emerged from the club's medical centre to sign autographs and shake hands amid raucous chants.

"It was a stunning moment to be welcomed this way," said Ronaldo.

"It increases your motivation to start work. I hope I can reward them."

France striker Olivier Giroud says criticism has always motivated him to do better and the 31-year-old is pleased to silence his detractors with his stellar work rate in his team's

World Cup triumph in Russia. The striker drew flak from fans for not scoring a

single goal during France's successful World Cup campaign but manager Didier Deschamps had previously defended him by highlighting his tremendous off-theball work rate and clever support play.

Despite the goal drought, Deschamps stuck with the Chelsea striker, who featured in all of France's seven matches at the World Cup, and Giroud is happy to have played his role.

"All of my career I have been, how can I say... I have been through certain difficulties and I have always tried to make it," Giroud told reporters as France were greeted by thousands of supporters on their return home on Monday. "It motivates me to get better and better and go through these difficulties and it is what happens in life when you are really motivated, determined, committed, it is never easy.

"Football is very hard and people see only the nice part of the job. But we work very hard for this achievement and I am very proud to say I am a World Cup champion."

Kylian Mbappe garnered global recognition for his performances in this year's World Cup, but the proceeds he earned are not going to him.

The 19-year-old, who scored four goals this year as France claimed its second World Cup, decided to donate his earnings from the tournament, amounting to nearly £400,000, to a charity that gives free sports instruction to hospitalized and disabled children in sports, Premiers de Cordee.

"Kylian, he's a great person," Sebastien Ruffin, general manager of Premiers de Cordee, told Le Parisien. "When his schedule allows it, he intervenes for us with pleasure. He has a very good [relationship] with children, he always finds the right [words] to encourage them. I sometimes even feel with the kids than the kids themselves."

Ashim, who won a gold

medal in the ISSF Islamic Solidarity Archery Championships in May, eclipsed his previous best of 690 points by scoring 696 out of 720 points on the opening day of the World Cup, where Bangladeshi archers are taking part for the

first time. The 25-year-old will face 84th-ranked Valerio Della Stua of Italy in the elimination round while Mamun will take on 72nd-ranked Ariyon Gankin of

Kazakhstan after the lad from Narail bettered his previous best of 682 points by scoring 691 points in the elimination round.

Though Ashim and Mamun improved on their scores, Bonna Akter frustrated in the qualification round of women's compound event after finishing 57th among 61 competitors with a score of 655 points, four less than her previous

best of 659. Bonna, who was selected ahead of Solidarity event's gold medallist Roksana Akter, will play the elimination round against 56thranked Ingrid Olofsson of Sweden. All the elimination round ties will take place today.

Cahill quits Soceroos

Australia's all-time leading goal-scorer Tim Cahill retired from international football Tuesday, ending an illustrious career that has taken him to four World Cups.

The 38-year-old, who scored 50 international goals in 107 appearances, last played for the Socceroos when he came off the bench for their final group game against Peru at the World Cup in Russia. "Today's the day that I'm officially hanging up my boots

on my international career with the Socceroos," Cahill tweeted. "No words can describe what it has meant to represent

my country. Massive thank you to everyone for the support throughout all my years wearing the Australian badge."



The former Everton striker, one of the finest players to come out of Australia, did not say if he would continue playing club football.

He joined his former club Millwall in the English Championship on a short-term deal in January after quitting Australia's Melbourne City in a bid to secure more game time

before the World Cup.

Governing body Football Federation Australia chief executive David Gallop hailed Cahill as a "genuine legend of our game and for a long time has been a great ambassador for football".

Ex-teammates and Socceroo fans paid tribute to the tireless player and praised his leadership on and off the field, using the Twitter hashtags #ThanksTim and #ThanksTimmy.

"When he put an Australian jersey on, he just had a knack of scoring goals and getting us out of trouble," former Socceroos great Archie Thompson told commercial broadcaster Channel Nine Tuesday.

"He contributed in making football a brand and in making the Socceroos a brand."

Cahill, born in Sydney to a Samoan mother, started his international career playing for Western Samoa under-20s and only became a Socceroo in 2004 after an intense lobbying campaign to world body FIFA.

Two years later in Germany, he became the first Australian to net a goal at the World Cup, going to score in two further tournaments in 2010 and 2014.
