No election in two decades

The lack of government will over holding elections to the regional council and the three district councils in Chittagong Hill Tracts has long been depriving indigenous people of their right to have elected representatives in those local bodies.

For almost two decades, the district councils have been running by those chosen by the ruling parties.

The absence of elected public representatives in the councils and lack of accountability keep hampering the public-oriented services in the region, said local government experts and others concerned.

Besides, the promotion of political rights and progress of socio-economic development of the indigenous people, as promised in the the 1997 CHT Peace Accord, have also slowed down, they said.

The experts said election to the councils should be held within the "shortest possible time" to help fully implement SEE PAGE 2 COL 5

A distressed Saleha Begum struggled to hold back tears as she begged for the release of her only son Muhammad Rashed Khan, a quota movement leader under arrest since July 1.

"Please release my son. I will take him in my arm. I don't have anything else. Just bring him back..." Saleha pleaded with the prime minister from a human chain in front of Jatiya Press Club yesterday.

"He was not involved in politics. He was never against the government. He is just a general student. What has he done to be put on 15 days' remand?"

The demonstration was organised by Jatiya Oikya Prokriya, a citizen's platform.

Khaleda's release 1st condition: BNP

The BNP yesterday said Khaleda Zia's release was the number one precondition for its participation in the upcoming general election.

"We have made clear our demands that the number one precondition for holding any election in Bangladesh is that Khaleda Zia must be released. No election would take place while she is in jail and the people of the country will not allow it," BNP Secretary General Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir told a rally.

Mayor candidates in Rajshahi, Barisal, Sylhet cities breaching election codes; EC taking little action

Mayoral candidates and their supporters have been conducting campaigns in three cities flouting the electoral code of conduct, but the Election Commission is hardly taking any action to stop this.

Some candidates have lodged written complaints with the returning officers concerned about the violation of the electoral code. Election officials, however, said they were investigating the complaints and

would take action accordingly.

Loudspeakers have been used indiscriminately, billboards set up and processions brought out in Rajshahi, Barisal and Sylhet cities since the electioneering began on July 10.

The election campaign is gaining momentum every day as July 30, the polling day, is getting closer and the violations of the electoral code are also on the rise.

No-Confidence Motion

Modi survives

The BJP-led NDA government yesterday defeated the no-confidence motion moved against it by the Opposition and initiated by the Telugu Desam Party (TDP) after a 12-hour debate that sketched the contours of the 2019 electoral face-offs.

The final figures, subject to correc-

tion, stood at 325 with the government and 126 against, with no abstentions. The figures indicate that even without the Shiv Sena, the BJP got support from non-NDA parties.


