

With an eye on polls, Hasina urges people at her reception

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged people to vote for "boat" for a poverty- and hunger-free Bangladesh by 2021. She urged them to vote like they had done to liberate the country.

"Bangladesh has become self-reliant in food, entered the nuclear energy club, launched its first satellite, and

brought down poverty to 22 percent as the people gave the mandate to boat," she said.

Hasina said in the last 10 years of the AL-led alliance rule, the lost pride of the country has been restored.

"Today's Bangladesh is heading forward. But there is a lot more work to do. We have a plan to develop the country," she said in a grand reception at city's historic SEE PAGE 2 COL 2

Govt hospitals run short of free saline

Patients bearing the brunt as production of saline, blood bags, other supplies remained suspended at IPH for a year

Government hospitals across the country are facing a serious shortage of some key medical supplies -- saline, infusion and transfusion sets, and blood bags -- as their production at the state-run IPH remained suspended for about a year.

The Institute of Public Health (IPH) resumed production on June 5 on a limited scale, but hospitals are still scrambling for the supplies and patients are being forced to buy those from outside, which they are supposed to get for free.

An IPH official said that in 2016-17, the IPH manufactured 10,000-12,000 IV saline bags per day. Between July 5 and July 16, it came down to just 3,033 a day, which is too

little for too many patients across the country. There are 610 government hospitals across

the country with around 49,000 beds for patients, according to health ministry data. "The IPH has failed to meet our demand and we've no choice but to buy saline from

elsewhere. In other cases, patients buy their own saline," said Palash Roy, resident medical officer of Moulvibazar District Sadar Hospital. So far this year, they got a little over half

of their demand, he added.

Arrest fear grips BNP ranks

Ariful stages sit-in in Sylhet to protest arrest of 2 of his workers; 8 held in Rajshahi, 1 in Barisal

With the city corporation polls in Sylhet, Rajshahi and Barisal only a week away, arrests of BNP leaders and activists remain a major concern for the party's mayoral candidates.

BNP leaders have alleged that the ruling Awami league wants to follow "Khulna-Gazipur style" in the polls slated for July 30.

Yesterday, BNP mayor candidate Ariful Haque Choudhury staged a sit-in before the office of the Sylhet Metropolitan Police (SMP) deputy commissioner, protesting the arrests of two party activists.

Ariful along with around 100 BNP men started the protest in Upashahar area around 2:00pm. It ended around two and a half hours

In Rajshahi, seven leaders of BNP, Jubo Dal and Chhatra Dal and one from Jamaat were arrested on Friday overnight and yesterday. The BNP filed a complaint with the

returning officer about the violation of the electoral code of conduct by the AL mayor candidate, intimidation of BNP leaders and activists by the police and attacks on them by the AL men.

Civil society, parties slam 'interference'

Amid the charged political environment, representatives of different civil society organisations and main political parties in Pakistan, barring Imran Khan-led PTI, yesterday condemned the alleged electoral irregularities and 'interference' ahead of the July 25 polls.

The civil society groups, who held a consultation to reflect on the challenges ahead of general elections, also shared concerns about the shrinking space for freedom of expression in the country.

On Friday, Election Commission of Pakistan's (ECP) granted broad judicial powers to the powerful military at polling stations during next week's general election, a rare move that has fanned concern among political parties and

human rights groups. The July 25 election is seen as a two-way race between parties led by former cricket star Imran Khan and now-jailed former prime minister Nawaz Sharif, who has accused the

army of working behind the scenes to favour Khan, which it denies.
