## Stokes seals thrilling win

Ben Stokes took three wickets on Saturday, including the prize scalp of India captain Virat Kohli, as England won the first Test by 31 runs in a thrilling finish at Edgbaston.

The all-rounder, who could miss next week's second Test of a five-match series at Lord's because of a court trial on a charge of affray starting Monday, took two wickets in an over including that of Kohli.

Stokes ended the match, England's 1,000th Test, when he had Hardik Pandya (31) caught at first slip by Alastair Cook, with India bowled out for 162, having been set 194 to win.

Stokes finished with innings figures of four for 40 in 14.2 overs.

However, fellow England all-rounder Sam Curran was named man-of-the-match after starring with both bat and ball.

That England had a target of 194 to defend was largely down to the 20-year-old Curran's 63, his maiden Test fifty in just his second match at this level rescuing the hosts from the depths of 87 for seven.

Curran's innings came just a day after the Surrey left-arm swing bowler's Test-best haul of four for 74 during India's first innings of 274 that featured a brilliant 149 by Kohli -- his maiden Test century in England.

An elated Stokes told Sky Sports: "Virat played a brilliant knock in the first innings but moments like that (getting him out) change games."

"I am proud to be part of his group. I thought we were a bit behind yesterday (Friday) but for Sam Curran to play the way he did was a real turning point."

A stunned Curran added: "I can't take it all in, it is all very special."

For England captain Joe Root there was the relief of seeing his side win the first Test of a series after a run of three straight defeats in campaign openers against Australia, New Zealand and Pakistan.

"I am thrilled, it was a fantastic team performance," said Root. "I asked the guys to play with passion and show belief. If we did that, we would give ourselves a chance."

Meanwhile Kohli urged India to remain "positive and fearless" during the rest of the series.

"It was a great game of cricket and I was

glad to be involved in such a fantastic Test match," said Kohli.

"We showed character at times but England were relentless in the areas they hit."

"Our bowlers were outstanding in the second innings. Hopefully we will build on that. There is no hiding from this game. We have to play positive and fearless."

Saturday's play started with the match on a knife edge.

India were 110 for five -- still 84 runs shy of victory -- with England needing five wickets.

Given the sunny conditions in Birmingham, the only certainty then was the match would finish with more than a day to spare.

Kohli was 43 not out and wicket-keeper Dinesh Karthik unbeaten on 18.

England knew they needed early strikes and James Anderson, their all-time leading Test wicket-taker, duly obliged when he had Karthik (20) caught low down by Dawid Malan at second slip off just the sixth ball of the day.

New batsman Pandya played several solid defensive shots before driving Stuart Broad down the ground for a textbook four.

Kohli then completed an 88-ball fifty when he glanced Anderson down to fine leg, the fourth four of his innings.

India were 141 for six, needing 53 more runs to win, when paceman Stokes had Kohli lbw for 51 with just his third ball of the day.

Kohli reviewed but experienced Pakistan umpire Aleem Dar's decision was upheld.

Three balls later, Stokes had Mohammed Shami caught behind for a duck and India were 141 for eight, with their hopes of just a seventh win in 58 Tests in England fading fast.

And when Sharma was lbw to leg-spinner Adil Rashid's googly for 11, India had been reduced to 154 for nine and soon afterwards Pandya nicked Stokes to Cook.

The second Test will start at Lord's on August 9.

## BCB plans first-class for women

The Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB) is planning to hold a franchise-based longer version regional tournament to help women's cricket flourish across the country.

The BCB will introduce a first-class competition for women, resembling the Bangladesh Cricket League, which will initially be played in a two-day format. A day will be added every season until the tournament is granted Test status.

"We are planning to host a franchise-based longer version tournament for women cricketers. They usually play in the National Cricket League (NCL), which is a 50-over tournament. We plan to form four zonal teams for the tournament that

will continue for two days," Nazmul Abedin, team operating manager of the BCB, told reporters at Mirpur on Saturday.

The board is looking to turn the tournament into a three-dayer next season before they eventually transform it into a full-fledged longer-version cricket competition over the next two years, depending on public response and if the maiden season is a success.

Following the Bangladesh women's team's victory in the Asia Cup, the Ireland series and the ICC World T20 qualifier, Nazmul informed that women's cricket has grown in popularity in the country.

"Day by day, we will try to achieve Test status as early as possible. If we attain the status, we will be able to play Test cricket with top-notch teams on a regular basis," he said.

Meanwhile, the cricketers will

leave for Chittagong tomorrow to participate in an eight week training programme in the port city. Nazmul also informed that the first week of training will focus on fitness while skill and match preparation will follow. The programme will continue until the ICC World T20 tournament begins in November in the West Indies.

Nazmul added that the board is yet to confirm a team who will take part in four to five practice matches in October ahead of the World T20 tournament and that the BCB also plans to reinforce the structure of women's cricket from its roots.

"We have already given a proposal where we are planning to start an under-18 tournament as we did not have any age-level tournaments before. It will help the young cricketers play competitive cricket and represent the senior stage," said Nazmul.

"It is a fabulous advert for the game of cricket, isn't it? Anyone that says it's dead can just come and watch this on repeat."

## Shakib's finger still in pain

All-rounder may require surgery after Windies tour

Bangladesh Test and T20I skipper Shakib Al Hasan is suffering from pain on his left little finger, which had sustained an injury during a tri-nation series also comprising of Zimbabwe and Sri Lanka at home in January.

The ace all-rounder will have to take painkillers to participate in the two remaining T20Is against the West Indies but it is likely that he will undergo surgery. He was also absent from the training session in Florida yesterday ahead of the second T20I.

"He has been given an anti-inflammatory injection as the pain recurred. Once he returns home we can take a better look at him and decide the next step," Bangladesh Cricket Board's (BCB) chief physician Debashish Chowdhury told media yesterday.

"It is the second time he is taking such injections. He had taken them in Australia, where he went immediately after the injury. Although in some cases we have seen sportsmen manage their injuries with such medication, the problem arises if it is repeated often as

the steroids have some side effects."

"If he needs an operation then he will be out for at least six weeks," he added.

Shakib was forced to leave the field midway through the tri-nation final against Sri Lanka and later missed the following two-match Test series and two T20Is against Sri Lanka before joining the squad halfway through the Nidahas Trophy in March.

Try as they might, Sri Lanka can't seem to put together a competent ODI performance against South Africa. In the first ODI

of the series, the batsmen failed spectacularly. In the second, they hauled themselves to a competitive score, only for fielders to drop catches early in South Africa's chase, in addition to producing several other acts of fielding slapstick. They've lost 10 consecutive ODIs to South Africa now - a sequence that goes back to July 2014.

South Africa, meanwhile, have restored a little dignity to their own outfit with the two comfortable wins,

and may have begun to feel like there is some depth to their ODI squad,

despite the 5-1 drubbing by India earlier this year. Lungi Ngidi continues to impress, much like Tabraiz Shamsi and Andile Phehlukwayo.

Wiaan Mulder showed in Dambulla that he could be a handy utility option in the long term, while Quinton de Kock produced a solid innings to break out of a spell of poor scores.

So with the series on the line inallekele, the situation is that it might be a good thing for both teams for Sri Lanka to get themselves to a winning position on Sunday. The hosts would have the chance to break this terrible bad run, and South Africa may have their skills and mettle properly tested, if they have to fight through a

## BD lose all

Bangladesh lost all three of their group stage matches on the opening day of the Asia Rugby Seven Trophy, despite putting up great fights in two of those matches, at the Queenstown Stadium in Singapore yesterday.
