Egypt's army yesterday said its forces have killed over the past few days 52 jihadists in the Sinai Peninsula where the military is conducting a vast operation against militants. More than 250 jihadists and at least 30 soldiers have been killed since the military launched the operation, according to official figures.

Head of Syrian regime research centre killed

6.9 quake hits Indonesia

At least three killed

At least three people have been killed after a major earthquake has hit Indonesia's Lombok island, Indonesian officials have said.

The US Geological Survey (USGS) said the magnitude-6.9 quake struck 3km from Loloan about 31km underground yesterday. The agency registered four aftershocks after the initial tremor.

The tremor came a week after a magnitude-6.4 quake killed 17, injured more than 160 and damaged hunreds of buildings.

Authorities issued a tsunami warning,

which was later cancelled. "Please go to a place with higher ground, while remaining calm and not panicking," Dwikorita Karnawati, head of the agency for

meteorology, climatology and geophysics, told local TV. She later said seawater had entered two villeges as high as 10cm and 13cm.

Many buildings are thought to have been damaged in Lombok's main city Mataram said Sutopo Purwo Nugroho, spokesman for Indonesia's disaster mitiga-

tion agency. "They are mostly buildings with weak construction material," Nugroho said.

The earthquake was felt for several seconds in neighouring Bali, about 100km away, where people ran out of houses, hotels and restaurants.

California wildfires spread

Trump declares 'major emergency' as death toll hits 7

A seventh person died in a northern California wildfire on Saturday, as a couple of other fast-growing wildfires in the state expanded by more than 25 percent overnight and continued to spread.

The White House announced on Sunday morning that US President Donald Trump declared that a major disaster exists in California, a move that makes it easier for residents, businesses, cities and counties to gain access to federal money, food aid and other programs.

"Assistance can include grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured property loses and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover

from the effects of the disaster," the White House said.

More residents were ordered to evacuate their homes this weekend as weary firefighters endured high temperatures and gusting winds.

The Carr fire, about 162 miles (261 km) north of Sacramento, claimed the life of a power company lineman

Saturday, according to a CBS affiliate.

The fire, one of the most destructive in California history, had already killed six people, including a great-grandmother and two children, and a firefighter and bulldozer operator.

Two other blazes collectively called the Mendocino Complex burned in Mendocino, Lake and Colusa counties, about 90 miles

> north of San Francisco. The River and Ranch fires had grown to cover a total of 229,000 acres (92,600 hectares) by late Saturday, and were considered 32 percent contained. Through last week, California

> fires had torched about 290,000 acres (117,300 hectares), more than double the five-year average over that same period according to Cal Fire.

The Mendocino Complex fires cover more than two-thirds the size of sprawling Los Angeles. They have forced the

evacuation of more than 20,000 residents and destroyed more than 100 structures.

Firefighters had managed to contain 41 percent of the Carr blaze by Saturday evening, and authorities were allowing some evacuees to return.

All 20 on board killed

Twenty people died after a vintage World War II aircraft crashed into a Swiss mountainside at the weekend, police said yesterday.

"The police have the sad certainty that the 20 people aboard perished," police spokeswoman Anita Senti told a news conference. There were 11 men and nine women

aboard, including an Austrian couple and their son, she said. The German-built Junker JU52 HB-HOT

aircraft, dating from 1939 and nickamed "Iron Annie", was a collectors' aircraft. It crashed into Piz Segnas, a 3,000-metre

(10,000-foot) peak in the east of the country on Saturday at an altitude of 2,540 metres on the mountain's western flank, Senti said. According to German-language newspaper Blick, the flight had taken off from Ticino in the south of the country and had

been due to land at the Duebendorf military airfield near Zurich on Saturday afternoon. Swiss reports said the passengers were returning from Locarno, a holiday spot in southern Switzerland on Lake Maggiore,

where they had arrived early Friday. The 20 Minutes newspaper quoted a witness who was on the mountainside at the time of the crash.

"The plane turned 180 degrees to the south and fell to the ground like a stone," the witness said, adding that the debris was scattered over "a very small area" -- indicating that an explosion was unlikely to have been the cause of the crash.

Andreas Tobler, Grisons canton chief of police said there was "no longer any hope of finding anyone alive." bAn investigation has been launched into the cause of the accident.

As this kind of collectors' aircraft is not equipped with "black box" flight data and voice recorders, investigators must rely on eyewitness accounts and analysis of debris.

'PLASTIC ATTACKS' ON SUPERMARKETS

How a protest became a global movement

When a group of concerned citizens started protesting plastic packaging at supermarkets, they had no idea that their actions would spark a global movement.

Earlier this year the activists in the UK began organizing "plastic attacks," where customers unwrap their shopping in a supermarket and return single-use packaging to the store. "We decided it was time to show supermarkets just how

many shoppers were concerned about the amount of plastic packaging on their food," explained Alex Morss, who helped organize some of the first events.

The average person in the EU generates 31kg of plastic packaging waste each year.

Globally, as little as 14% of plastic packaging is collected for recycling, according to the Ellen MacArthur Foundation, and each year, more than 8 million tons of plastic waste makes it into the world's oceans. Morss says the movement snowballed when videos of the first

minded people from around the world began contacting the organisers, asking how to hold their own protests. Now there have been well over 100 plastic attacks around

plastic attacks started being shared on social media. Soon, like-

the world, mostly in Europe, but also in Hong Kong, South Korea, Canada, Peru and the United States.

In Belgium, Christophe Steyaert was one of those inspired by the UK events. He now runs the Plastic Attack Global Facebook page, and advises groups around the world. At the



moment, he says he's helping to organize attacks in Belgium,

Colombia and Spain. Steyaert says that the biggest attacks in Belgium have drawn

hundreds of people. "We're just regular people who are very aware of the problem and want to do something," he said "and the best way to do something is to change yourself and spread the word that it's not so difficult to change.'

Morss, a journalist, ecologist and educator, says the protestors have generally been welcomed by supermarkets, and staff are often supportive of their aims. She says they always get permission from the supermarkets. The unwanted packaging is put into shopping trolleys and recycled by the stores where possible.

"We're not a bunch of anarchists," says Morss. "We're very polite, well-mannered people of all ages, from teens to people

in their 80s and 90s." Morss adds: "Plastic should not be used to justify the argument that it enables food to be flown further around the world -- why not buy local and reduce your carbon footprint that way?"

After Donald Trump sniped back at LeBron James' suggestion that he fuels American racial divides, support has flooded in for the NBA great -- includ-

ing from the US president's own wife, Melania. In an interview on Tuesday -- also broadcast late Friday -- Los Angeles Lakers player and philanthropist James told CNN he believed Trump "is kind of trying to divide us."

"He's kind of used sport to... divide us and that's something I can't relate to, because I know that sport was the first time I ever was around someone white. You know?" said James, who on Monday opened an elementary school for at-risk youth in his native Akron, Ohio.

For the rest of the week, Trump was uncharacteristically silent -- until Friday night, when he finally shot back.

"Lebron James was just interviewed by the dumbest man on television, (CNN presenter) Don Lemon. He made Lebron look smart, which isn't easy to do," the president tweeted.

His comment sparked huge reaction from James' supporters -- but the most surprising came from First Lady Melania Trump, whose communications director issued a statement that appeared to break ranks with the president.

Stephanie Grisham was quoted by CNN as saying James appeared to be "working to do good things on behalf of our next generation." "Just as she always has, the First Lady encourages everyone to have an

open dialogue about issues facing children today," she said. Grisham added the first lady "would be open to visiting" James' new school.
