Work to materialise Bangabandhu's 'Sonar Bangla': Chief justice

Chief Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain yesterday urged all to work together with a target to materialise the dream of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman for building the county as "Sonar Bangla".

"The Father of the Nation had a dream to turn the country into a Sonar Bangla. Our responsibility and target will be to work to implement the dream. If it is done, his [Bangabandhu] departed soul will have peace," he said. The chief justice was speaking at a blood donation

programme organised by the Supreme Court in association with Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University at the SC auditorium, marking National Mourning Day. Supreme Court judges, officials and staff attended the programme. He said August 15 is the most shocking and watershed

day in the history of Bangladesh, as Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and most of his family members were brutally assassinated on this day in 1975.

Justice Syed Mahmud Hossain paid respect to memories of all the martyrs of August 15, 1975.

Supreme Court Registrar General Dr Md Zakir Hossain also spoke on the occasion, among others.

Earlier in the morning, the chief justice paid homage to the Father of the Nation by placing wreaths at his portrait in front of Bangabandhu Memorial Museum at Dhanmondi Road 32 in Dhaka.

23 HC benches to operate during court vacation

National Mourning Day observed worldwide

Thousands of Bangladeshis across the world observed National Mourning Day yesterday with due solemnity, marking the 43rd martyrdom anniversary of Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman.

Bangladesh missions abroad organised Mourning Day programmes participated by members of the Bangladesh community, students, expatriates and people from host countries.

The day began with hoisting the national flag at half mast. Other programmes included: observing one minute's silence; placing wreaths at Bangabandhu's portrait; reading out messages from the president, prime minister, foreign minister and state minister for foreign affairs; milad mahfils; special prayers for Bangabandhu and his family members; panel discussions and screening of a documentary on

Bangabandhu. NEW DELHI

Marking the anniversary of his martyrdom, Bangladesh High Commission paid glowing tributes to Bangabandhu.

The mission also paid homage to his family members who were killed on the

fateful night of August 15, 1975. Officials, staff and family members joined High Commissioner Syed Muazzem Ali in placing floral tributes before the portrait of

Bangabandhu at the mission's Maitree Hall. The high commissioner earlier hoisted the national flag at half mast, followed by a minute's silence.

A panel discussion on "Bangabandhu's Vision for Peace, Stability and Development in the South Asian Region and Beyond" was also held.

Moderated by Deputy High Commissioner Rokeb-ul-Haque, the discussion was attended by panellists -- Prof SD Muni of Jawaharlal Nehru University; Venkat Narayan, president of Foreign Correspondents Club of South Asia; and Dr Kavita Sharma, president of South Asian University.

Jukta Front to This govt worse than that of 1/11: Fakhrul

BNP yesterday alleged that the incumbent government is worse than that of the 1/11 army-backed caretaker government, as it has snatched all the basic rights of people and political parties.

"The illegal 1/11 government had imprisoned our leader [Khaleda Zia] through a conspiracy. But she forced that regime to withdraw the state of emergency and free her. The current fascist government is worse than them [1/11 regime]," said Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir, secretary general of the party.

He made the allegation after offering prayers at a milad mahfil at the party's Nayapaltan headquarters, marking party chairperson Khaleda Zia's 74th birthday.

Fakhrul also urged party leaders and activists to wage a movement, even if they have to risk their lives, to force the government to free their Chairperson Khaleda Zia from

Criticising the government for "repressing" students who waged a movement seeking safe roads, Fakhrul said, "The government brutally repressed the students' non-political movement. Students are being arrested and picked up. Even girls are not being spared."

To get out of the situation, the BNP leader said there is no alternative for political parties to waging a strong movement. "As a political party, it is our duty to restore democracy

and people's rights and free Khaleda Zia," he said. Remembering Khaleda's role in democratic movements,

he said she took to the streets for nine years and ensured the fall of an autocratic regime in the 90s. The party held doa mahfil in all upazilas and districts

across the country praying for Khaleda's wellbeing and release from jail.

The BNP chairperson has been behind bars since her conviction in Zia Orphanage Trust graft case by a lower court on February 8.
