## Modric pips Ronaldo, Salah

Real Madrid and Croatia star Luka Modric on Thursday received the accolade of UEFA Player of the Year in Monaco, beating his former teammate Cristiano Ronaldo and Liverpool's Mohamed Salah to the prize.

"I'm very happy to receive this great prize. I have worked hard for this, to get to the highest point possible," said Modric, who starred in the Real side that won the Champions League for the third year running before also leading Croatia to the World Cup final.

"I can say for sure that this has been the best year of my career, collectively and individually, and I am enjoying the moment," added the 32-year-old, who was announced as the winner of the prize after Thursday's draw in Monaco for this season's Champions

Modric started out at Dinamo Zagreb and then had four years with Tottenham Hotspur before Real prised him away six years ago.

His success here, after he was named the best player at the World Cup, confirms that he should be among the favourites to win the Ballon d'Or, a prize dominated by Ronaldo and Lionel Messi over the last decade.

Salah was in attendance at the Grimaldi Forum on Thursday, but Ronaldo, now with Juventus, was not there.



# Day may still turn to seniors

Day wants to keep his faith on the senior players ahead of the SAFF Championship, beginning from September 4 at the Bangabandhu National Stadium. "You always have to look at the

positives. We had lots of possession but didn't do enough with it. I think the older players we know can play much better," Day told The Daily Star. It was certainly a slight shift of stance from the Englishman, who was very upset with the performance of the seniors in that 1-0 defeat.

"I think the boys who played in the Olympics [Asian Games] have put themselves in a strong position to start, the issue will be whether they have enough experience," the coach said with an air of uncertainty.

Day's boys in the Asian Games defended well and attacked on the break against comparatively stron-

ger opponents. He is very much aware that the roles will be reversed in the SAFF Championship, where his team would have to assume the role of the attackers, leaving his strikers with the uphill task of breaking the opponent's backline; something that the forward line of the senior team failed to do against Sri Lanka.

"Well, that's been an issue long before I arrived and won't change it in the next week. So, we will have to look at ways in the next few days on how we can try and combat that if it happens," Day opined.

While Day has only a few days to make up his mind about whether his side for the SAFF Championship will be a mix of senior and junior players, a few members of his against Sri Lanka should not be considered a shattering blow ahead of the next week's event.

"I watched the match at home. Actually I felt sorry after watching the team going down. The players from defence to attack tried from their respective positions but they conceded an unfortunate goal. I

think Bangladesh should have scored although there was misunderstanding in the attacking third," said U-23 striker Saad Uddin, who struck against North Korea in the Asian Games.

"I believe we will bounce back despite the defeat against Sri Lanka. We played really well in the Asian Games, so there is nothing to be disappointed about before the start of the SAFF Championship," the 20year-old marksman said.

He also advocated the need for senior players in the team.

"The SAFF Championship is a big stage where experience matters and the team needs senior players to inject inspiration and courage to the younger players."

Games, where Bangladesh made it to the round of 16 for the first time, echoed Saad's sentiments and urged everyone to keep faith on them, saying they would not disappoint the nation in the SAFF Championship.

"Overall we played a good match but the finishing was poor," was Tapu's explanation about the friendly match.

"I firmly believe that we should not give up hope because yesterday's match was only a friendly. Our main target is the SAFF Championship. The squad that played yesterday was also not our full strength side, so you all can still keep faith on us," said the 25-yearold, who formed a solid defence with Tutul Hossain Badsha during the Asian Games.

"I think the players were bit nervous against Sri Lanka. They didn't play any matches for a long period and they didn't have match fitness. The mouthwatering prospect of an India-Pakistan final in men's hockey at the Asian Palembang Games was put to bed as both the subcontinent

giants were handed surprise defeats in their respective semifinals at the Gelora Bung Karno Stadium hockey field yesterday.

They will meet though, in the bronze medal match while Malaysia will take on Japan in the final, which will see a new champion.

Defending champions and pretournament favourites India lost to

champions, were handed a 1-0 defeat by Japan.

Malaysia will play only their second Asian Games final, having lost to Pakistan in their maiden appearance in 2010 while Japan will be appearing in the gold medal match for the very first time.

Hockey is a traditional sport in the Olympics as well as the Asian Games, and an India-Pakistan match always draws a crowd wherever in the world it takes place. The hockey final is the penultimate gold-deciding event of this year's Asian Games and everyone was expecting a grandstand finish to it. But Malaysia and Japan had other ideas.

It looked like India, the highest

while Pakistan, the record eight-time ranked side of the competition, sitting fifth in world rankings, would make it in normal time when they took a 2-1 lead over the 12th-ranked side going into the final quarter, thanks to goals in the third quarter from Harmanpreet Singh and Varun Kumar. However, with barely two minutes of play remaining, Muhammad Rahim Razie converted a penalty corner to take the game to shootouts, where Malaysia prevailed 7-6.

Japan meanwhile, took the lead against Pakistan through a 17th minute penalty corner conversion from Yamada Shota and held on to the lead, despite coming under heavy pressure from Pakistan for the rest of the match.

## Murray sent packing

Andy Murray's first Grand Slam in more than a year ended with a second-round exit at the US Open, where he fell in four sets to Spain's Fernando Verdasco on Wednesday.

Verdasco, seeded 31st, had lost 13 of 14 prior matches with the Scot, who claimed the first of his three Grand Slam titles at the 2012 US Open. But on another scorching day in New York, Verdasco

triumphed 7-5, 2-6, 6-4, 6-4 to book a third-round meeting with another former champion, third-seeded Argentine Juan Martin del Potro. The Scot, playing his first Grand Slam since Wimbledon of last year and just his fifth tournament since hip surgery in

June, gave himself a mixed report card. "I think some of the tennis I played today was some of the best I've played since I had the surgery or since I came back," Murray said. "There were also periods in the match, especially in the first set, where I really didn't play particularly well. I hit a lot of mistakes when I was up in that set. I feel like I should have won the first set and didn't."

Later, World No. 1 and defending champion Rafael Nadal steamed into the third round on another scorching day with a straight-sets win over Vasek Pospisil.

Nadal, spared the worst of the heat thanks to his late-night start on Arthur Ashe Stadium, sped past Pospisil 6-3, 6-4, 6-2. Meanwhile, former champions Stan Wawrinka and Juan Martin del Potro also advanced, while 2012 winner Andy Murray, like Wawrinka back at Flushing Meadows after missing
