# Toughest time for BNP

Party observes 40th founding anniversary today, first time with its chief in jail

Since its inception four decades ago, the BNP formed government four times -- once under the leadership of its founder Ziaur Rahman and thrice under the leadership of his widow Khaleda Zia.

Arguably the second largest political party in the country after the ruling Awami League, it ruled the country for 14

But as it observes its 40th founding anniversary today, the BNP faces the "toughest time" yet since its formation in

Party chief Khaleda, 73, is in jail for seven months now after being convicted in a corruption case, and faces at least 34 more lawsuits. It's not clear when she will be able to walk out of prison. Her son Tarique Rahman, 50, the second-in-command of

the party, has also been convicted in two graft cases in absentia. A fugitive facing several arrest warrants, he has been living in London in self-exile since 2008.

With Khaleda in jail, Tarique has been instructing the party leaders about their course of action.

#### BIMSTEC SUMMIT Leaders agree on regional power grid

18-pt Kathmandu declaration focuses on joint efforts to combat terrorism

The fourth Bimstec Summit concluded in Kathmandu yesterday with the member states inking a deal for crosscountry energy grid interconnection and reaffirming strong commitment to working out a comprehensive approach to combat terrorism.

In the two-day summit, Bimstec leaders agreed to turn the Bay of Bengal region peaceful and prosperous by building common strengths through collective efforts.

They also agreed to make the organisation a dynamic, effective and result-oriented body for intensifying regional cooperation, alleviating poverty and promoting connectivity, energy and free trade.

### start crackdown Around 5 lakh undocumented Bangladeshi workers may

Malaysia set to

face trouble PORIMOL PALMA

Thousands of Bangladeshi and other expatriate workers in Malaysia are in fear as the country's immigration department is set to begin a major crackdown on undocumented migrants after an amnesty programme ended on Thursday.

"I went to Cyberjaya where there are a lot of construction sites. Undocumented Bangladeshis, Nepalese and Indonesian workers were seriously afraid. They are not even leaving their rooms," said Abu Hayat, a migration researcher based in Kuala Lumpur.

Even the ones who have work permits are scared as there are instances of documented workers being arrested, he told The Daily Star over phone yesterday. The situation is similar across Malaysia, he added.

The amnesty programme that began a year ago allowed undocumented migrants in Malaysia to pay a fine of RM300 (about Tk 6,000) and another RM 100 fee for a special pass to return home.

Mustafar Ali, Malaysian immigration director-general, on the Facebook page of his department, on Thursday said, "The amnesty deadline will not be extended. We will intensify our operations against illegal immigrants starting on Friday. We have given them ample time to sign up for the programme."

Abu Hayat said yesterday was Malaysia's Independence Day and the crackdown was likely to begin early today.

The immigration DG said syndicates that treat workers like "modern-day slaves" would be busted in the operation

### One held over abduction of small trader

Victim's father sues him for fraudulence

Police yesterday arrested an alleged source of a law enforcement agency over the abduction of small trader Mohan Miah from the capital's Mirpur in June.

The arrest came hours after Mohan's father Jamsher Ali filed a fraudulence case with Mirpur Police Station against the alleged source, Babu, 40, who runs a small garment shop in Mirpur-2.

Babu took Tk 2 lakh from Jamsher on July 12, saying he knew the whereabouts of Mohan and would help Jamsher have his son released. But instead of helping Mohan's family, Babu kept wasting time, according to the case SEE PAGE 2 COL 2
