





Govt eases trade union rules

Cabinet okays labour law amendments in line with suggestions from ILO, EU, US

The government yesterday approved a draft of the Bangladesh Labour (Amendment) Act, 2018 to make it workers-friendly in line with the suggestion of the international communities. Under the proposed law, workers' partici-

pation required to form trade unions at factories will be reduced to 20 percent from the existing 30 percent. The draft also proposed finishing the

registration process of a trade union by 55 days instead of 60.

Besides, it provides for mandatory maternity leave and ban on child labour in factories. It curtails discrepancy power of the director general of the labour department in cancelling registration of a trade union.

Concern over EVM natural


Says CEC on use of voting machines in nat'l polls STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Chief Election Commissioner KM Nurul Huda yesterday said it is quite natural that there would be some concern among the political parties about the use of electronic voting machines (EVMs).

"Concern remains among the people about any new technology and its uses. As the EVM is a new technology and the political parties don't know about it, it is quite natural that there would be some concern among them about the use of the machine," he said.

The CEC was addressing a workshop on EVM at the Election Training Institute in the capital's Agargaon.

She walked barefoot most of her life as she would not step with footwear on the soil where her two sons and hundreds of thousands of Liberation War martyrs were laid

Debt trap?

Devoid of the whims, high-handedness and the Cold War propositions of the bilateral and multilateral donors, smaller countries had found a new source of financing in China. Its funds could be easily tapped without being imposed with the harsh conditions like those of the World Bank and the IMF

China after all was the wonder country that had posted a double-digit growth spur for quite a long time before being inevitably slowed down. It along with the US and the EU shared almost half of the world's trade; with 17% of the global exports being churned out from this oriental land, China became the leader closely followed by the EU and distantly limped by the US. It accumulated a huge \$3 trillion reserves and became a major buyer of

US treasury bonds to the tune of \$1.2 trillion and is about to become the world's biggest economy measured on PPP (purchasing power parity).

So when such a big economic powerhouse had extra money to offer without much of the unpleasant strings of putting in order public finances or taking care of human rights situation, countries jumped on it. From the Pacific to Africa, from Asia to South America, Chinese money poured in in the

form of loans with interests hovering around 3 percent.

The takers were plenty because all these countries badly needed to upgrade their poor infrastructure although in the process low priority projects were often taken up at high costs through later-on negotiations.

Bangladesh is no exception here. It has embraced the Chinese loans with an open arm and Chinese companies have snapped up project after project. In the last one year since the visit of Chinese President Xi Jinping in 2016, \$4.29 billion Chinese loans have flowed into Bangladesh for five mega projects from Padma rail links to river tunnel in Karnaphuli to oil pipeline. Another 3.5 billion loans are expected to flow in this year.

Myanmar's army offers rare apology

The Myanmar military issued a rare apology yesterday, acknowledging that two photographs it published in a book on the crisis over the Rohingya Muslim minority were "published incorrectly".

Reuters published an exclusive report on Friday revealing that two of the pictures in the book that aimed at illustrating the army's account of last year's events in the western Myanmar state of Rakhine, were in fact archive pictures of different conflicts, and one was posted with an incorrect caption.


