#### Asean MPs, Amnesty welcome ICC ruling

ASEAN lawmakers and Amnesty International yesterday welcomed the decision of the International Criminal Court ruling that it could exercise jurisdiction over the alleged crime of deportation of the Rohingyas from Myanmar.


"This is a milestone decision and a step

forward towards accountability for the alleged atrocity crimes against the Rohingya population," said Charles Santiago, chair of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations Parliamentarians for Human Rights.

The Hague-based ICC ruled on Thursday it has jurisdiction over the alleged deportation of Rohingyas from Myanmar as a possible crime against humanity although the country is not a party to the Rome Statute, which established the ICC.

Meanwhile, Myanmar "resolutely" rejected the ICC ruling, reports AFP. "Myanmar resolutely rejects the (ICC)

decision which is... of dubious legal merit," the government said in a statement released by the president's office, adding it SEE PAGE 12 COL 2

The PM was speaking at the publication ceremony of the first edition of "Secret Documents of Intelligence Branch on Father of the Nation Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman" at the Gono Bhaban.

Professor Emeritus Rafiqul Islam chaired the function while Bangla Academy Director General Prof Shamsuzzaman Khan took part in the discussion.

Hasina, the elder daughter of Bangabandhu, said the book is a priceless store of information.

#### He signed the statement not Trump's feud with media deepens

He calls upon NYT to reveal the name behind critical op-ed

Less than nine weeks before a crucial mid-term congressional election, United States President Donald Trump's feud with critical mainstream media has deepened.

Thursday saw over 20 top Trump officials scramble to deny authorship of an op-ed in the New York Times - by an anonymous "senior administration official" - stating in essence that officials have been working quietly to circumvent and rein in an uninformed and capricious president.

Trump hit back via Twitter and at a campaign rally at the 12,000-seat Rimrock Auto Arena in Billings, Montana, on Thursday evening, suggesting the author of the op-ed may have committed treason.

"We've reached an all-time low," he told the crowd. "Unelected Deep State operatives who defy the voters to push their own secret agendas are truly a threat to democracy itself."

"For the sake of our national security, the New York Times should publish his name," he insisted.

Because of the inherent ambiguity of anonymity - the term "senior administration official" could apply to hundreds, not all close to the president - and the New York Times' antagonistic relationship with the President, the oped has poured fuel on the narratives of both sides of the


