Scrap quota in govt jobs

Review panel suggests abolishing the system for 1st, 2nd class jobs, places report to PM for approval

A high-powered government committee has recommended abolishing the quota system for class-I and class-II jobs in civil service.

The development comes in the wake of months-long quota reform demonstrations that saw arrests of the movement's leaders and attacks on students.

"Our findings are that there should be no quota for appointments to the posts in 9th to 13th grade, previously dubbed as first class and second class jobs," Cabinet Secretary M Shafiqul Alam, who heads the committee, told reporters at the secretariat after the weekly cabinet meeting yesterday.


The committee also opined that quota is no longer indispensable to small ethnic groups and physically challenged people, he added.

Earlier in the day, the seven-member body submitted its report to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, suggesting that officials of grade 9 to 13 should be recruited "completely on merit".

Under the 8th National Pay Scale, class-I officials -- cadre and non-cadre -- join 9th grade positions while class-II officials are appointed to posts from 10th to 13th grade.

Quota movement leaders welcomed the recommendation, but said they would continue demonstrations until their three-point demand is met.

Sri Lanka

Afghanistan continued their rise in international cricket with an upset 91-run win over Sri Lanka in Abu Dhabi yesterday, knocking the former champions out of the Asia Cup.

Sri Lanka needed to win the Group B match to stay in the tournament but were outwitted by smart batting from Afghanistan, who put up a fighting total of 249 all out at the Sheikh Zayed Stadium.

The fighters then laid into Sri Lankan batting with spinner Rashid Khan (2-26), Mohammad Nabi (2-30) and Mujeeb Ur Rahman (2-32) sharing wickets as the five-time former winners were bowled out for 158 in 41.2 overs.

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TRANSPORTING GOODS TO 7 SISTERS
Dhaka to let Delhi use Ctg, Mongla ports

The cabinet yesterday approved a draft agreement to allow India to use Chittagong and Mongla ports to transport cargo to its northeastern states.

The decision came at a cabinet meeting at the Prime Minister's Office, with PM Sheikh Hasina in the chair.

Briefing reporters after the meeting at the secretariat, Cabinet Secretary Shafiqul Alam said the draft has been prepared for signing the deal with India, but Nepal and Bhutan can be added to it if they wish to use the two ports.

India would have to follow GATT (General Agreement on Tariff and Trade) and Bangladeshi regulations, pay the customs duties, and buy tax equivalent bonds to

transport freight, he added.

The two countries had signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on the use of the two ports during Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi's visit to Dhaka in June, 2015.

Under the proposed deal titled Agreement on the Use of Chattogram and Mongla ports for Movement of Goods to and from India, a new modern tracking system would be used to track cargos, Shafiqul told journalists.

He said India would also have to pay fees for using the infrastructure of Bangladeshi land ports.

According to the secretary, goods will be transported as per the capacity of the two sea
