IGP asks police to monitor social media during Durga Puja

The Inspector General of Police yesterday directed law enforcers to monitor social networking sites so that none can spread rumours to disturb the communal harmony centering the upcoming Durga Puja, using Facebook and other social networking sites.

"If any individual or quarter spreads anything that can hurt religious sentiments, take immediate steps to stop it, and take tough actions against them immediately," IGP Mohammad Javed Patwary asked law enforcers.

The police chief issued the directives at a meeting held at the Police Headquarters to ensure law and order and security during Durga Puja.

Durga Puja, one of the biggest religious festivals of the Hindu community, will be celebrated from October 15 to 19. The IGP also directed police officials to perform their

duties with sincerity and professionalism, maintaining

religious fervour. Javed Patwary urged leaders of Bangladesh Puja Udjapan Parishad and Mahanagar Sarbajaneen Puja Committee to deploy volunteers during preparing of idols, setting up CCTV cameras and firefighting equipment at the puja mandaps, and use handheld metal

"Religious harmony has to be maintained showing respects to other religions," he told the meeting.

Assistant Inspector General (operations) Sayeed Tariqul Hasan presented the security measures planned for Durga Puja at the meeting.

Road crashes

Two persons were killed in

two separate road accidents in the capital yesterday. Mohammad Rubel, 19,

was going to Mirpur Section-10 by riding a motorcycle. A Nure Makka Paribahan bus from Dhaka Zoo gate to Malibagh hit the motorcycle. The bike fell on the road and the bus ran over Rubel, killing him on the spot.

Police arrested bus driver Azad, and seized the vehicle, said Sub-inspector Nuruzzaman of Mirpur Police Station.

Rubel used to live at Sadullahpur in Savar, he added.

Meanwhile, Saidul Islam, 40, a labourer who used to load sand on trucks, was standing behind a truck yesterday noon when another truck hit him from behind and sped away.

Saidul was rushed to Dhaka Medical College Hospital where doctors pronounced him dead around 2:30pm.

50 university teachers issue statement demanding release of CU Assistant Professor Maidul Islam

Chittagong University teacher Maidul Islam has to be released immediately, demanded 50 teachers of different universities yesterday.

The CU authorities on Tuesday suspended Maidul Islam, an assistant professor of the sociology department, a day after he was sent to jail in a case filed under the controversia section 57 of the lICT Act.

A joint statement, issued by the university teachers yesterday, says, "We are surprised, angered and saddened at the incident.

"We learned from newspaper reports that Bangladesh Chhatra League stood against Maidul Islam and another teacher following their Facebook posts during quota reform movement across the country, and they were declared 'persona non grata' in their

departments on July 17," it reads.

"Facing threat from BCL, Maidul was forced to leave the campus and he sent a letter to the proctor seeking security," it adds.

A former Bangladesh Chhatra League leader filed the case with Hathazari Police Station on July 24, accusing Maidul of making "derogatory remarks" about Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina on Facebook.

On August 6, Maidul received anticipatory bail for eight weeks in the case. On expiry of the bail term, he surrendered before a court that sent him to jail, rejecting his bail petition.

In the statement, the teachers slammed CU authorities for suspending Maidul Islam.

They also demanded that the persons who threatened him be identified and brought to book.

'Angered and saddened' Nobody knows where they are

Police stonewalling families of five 'missing' youths

Fourteen-year-old Nasrullah has no reply to his mother's repeated phone calls asking the whereabouts of his elder brother, who has remained missing since plainclothes men picked him up from Jatrabari two weeks ago.

"Police are trying to find out brother" is his only reply to an inconsolable Momtaz Begum, who lives in a village in Pirojpur.

"What should I say? That I have no clue? My mother has gotten ill and sometimes passes out over concern of my brother," Nasrullah told The Daily Star yesterday.

Shafiullah, 20, a student of Dhaka College, is among the five youths who were picked up by people identifying them as detectives, from Jatrabari and Dhaka airport on September 12.

Like Momtaz, parents of the other missing youths are anxiously waiting for safe return of their children.

The families alleged that police are reluctant to find out their loved ones, and they were even denied to register a general diary to this end.

The Daily Star has contacted police officials

regarding the disappearances multiple times, and each time law enforcers have denied picking them up. Contacted yesterday, Noor-e-Azam Mia, officer-

in-charge of Airport Police Station told The Daily Star that they do not have any clue yet about the three youths being picked up from the airport. Of the missing youths, two siblings -- Shafiul

Alam and Monirul Alam -- along with Monirul's friend Abul Hayat were picked up while they were receiving their hajj returnee parents at the Shahjalal International Airport.

Shafiul, president of Dhaka city (south) unit of Islami Chhatra Shibir, was later taken to his Jatrabari hostel on that night, from where Shafiullah and Mosharraf Hossain Maaz, a ninthgrader, were taken away, families alleged.

"What a country we live in! An adolescent boy has been traceless for two weeks but law enforcement agencies could not yet provide us with any update of his whereabouts," said Maaz's uncle Haurn Or Rashid.

Maaz's parents are bedridden of worries over their youngest son.

A hapless Ramisa Khanam, mother of Shafiul and Monirul, says her two sons were dragged into a microbus and taken in front of her eyes at the airport.

"I have no one to complain to, or to seek help from. They have taken away my sons from me, and now nobody gives any clue as to where they are," said Ramisa.

The families reiterated what they said in a press conference in the capital on September 15: that the five are either produced before court or be released.

Talking to The Daily Star about the issue, human rights activist Nur Khan Liton said, SEE PAGE 5 COL 1

Cops shoot two 'muggers' in city

'This is a country of lobbying'

Says health minister about challenges to shutting down substandard clinics, hospitals

Every private clinic and hospital across the country will have to maintain quality and no substandard one will be allowed to operate, said Health and Family Welfare Minister Mohammad Nasim yesterday.

Addressing the national convention-2018 of Bangladesh Private Clinic and Diagnostic Owners' Association as chief guest, Nasim said clinics and hospitals are mushrooming across the country, many of which do not maintain minimum quality.

Bangladesh Private Clinic and Diagnostic Owners' Association organised the convention and health exhibition at Bangabandhu International Conference Center. The health minister said whenever they

go to close a substandard clinic, political lobbying rears its ugly head.

"This is the country of lobbying ... No other country sees such level of lobbying," Nasim said.

He also urged Bangladesh Medical Association (BMA) and Bangladesh Private Clinic and Diagnostic Association

to not give membership to those who do not have quality healthcare services in their clinics and hospitals.

He said they shut a clinic in Chittagong where a baby died due to wrong treatment of a doctor. For one bad clinic, ten other clinics have to bear the criticism, he

added. "Incidents like keeping a dead person in the ICU for two or three days to earn additional money is also happening, and you have to come forward against those peo-

ple," Naism said. "I am giving you the power to shut substandard clinics and hospitals. Please

close down at least 10 in a year," he said.
