Starting out in 2010 as a simple endeavour by 18-year-old Ahmed Imtiaz Jami to help underprivileged children, OBHIZATRIK Foundation has now blossomed into an organisation with 3500 selfless volunteers across 32 districts in Bangladesh. The government registered foundation recently celebrated 8 years of extending an earnest hand fighting for poverty eradi-

cation, access to education, gender equality and better healthcare.

The event, which took place on September 21 at Trust Milonayoton, saw a large get-together of the executives, volunteers, students and donors of OBHIZATRIK Foundation. It also celebrated the first batch of examinees for the upcoming PSC examinations from OBHIZATRIK School, whom the organisation is particularly proud of. "I am honoured to be able to stand here

in front of all of the people who supported OBHIZATRIK," said Jami, who is now the president of the organisation. "Honestly, we could not have come so far without you, the volunteers and donors."

Renowned personalities were present during the event, and they conveyed their best wishes to OBHIZATRIK Foundation. "These children are trend-setters, and they never question what the country has

given them. Instead, they question themselves about what they could give to the country," said Arif R Hossain, who is a patron and advisor to the foundation. In a short span of time, sibling duo Nuzaimul Hoq Xishan and Kastha Haque Samara set up not one but three ventures, Worthy Books, Worthy Toys and Worthy Publications.

They started off with only Tk 5000

"In several countries, young writers are supported to publish their work. Such a platform was missing in Bangladesh. My sister and I always wanted to do something in our country and that's how we began," says Xishan.

They announced an open call to aspiring writers in the prominent online book club Litsphere, with an aim to publish a book. The response to that call was widely positive. The writers were required to submit fictional stories of minimum 500 words.

The duo wanted to offer something to a wide audience. So, *The Mason Jar* has an interesting combination of simple yet heart touching Bangla and English stories. As the back cover of the book reads, "This collection is a mélange of flavours that has something to offer to everyone—sweet stories of love, hope and friendship blended with tangy, piquant tales of horror, heartbreak and despair, mixed with bittersweet stories that fall somewhere in between." Maria Molla and Kashfia Haque Samara contributed to the primary editing of the manuscripts.

Worthy Publications intends to launch a new set of books in the upcoming Dhaka Lit Fest which would include another version of *Sehri Tales*, a revised version of *The Mason Jar* and an anthology of dark secrets.
