no neighbour came to help them out. Political leaders came forward in few places." He added that the administration also did not come to their help.

"Religious and ethnic minorities as well as indigenous people feel that they are not getting justice in the country and are deprived of equal rights. We know that due to the lack of confidence in the state, many are forced to leave the country, which is extremely upsetting for us," he said.

Eminent human rights activist Sultana Kamal said it is sad that after 47 years of independence, religious and ethnic minorities and indigenous people have to organise a rally like this for the protection of their existence.

She pointed out that the government often says they could not implement many policies aligned with the spirit of the Liberation War because of strategic reasons.

"I want to say to them that due to strategic reasons, one cannot turn back on or give up their principles. If principle has to be given up for strategic reasons then we can call it a surrender," she said, adding they will continue to blame the government for the failure of ensuring rights of religious minorities.

Rana Dasgupta said, "Religious and ethnic minorities will extend full support to those political parties and alliances who will pledge for materialisation of seven-point demand in their electoral manifesto."

In December 2015, the Oikya Parishad made the seven-point demand which included ensuring empowerment and representation of minority groups in polls, elimination of discrimination from education sector and equal rights and dignity, elimination of constitutional discrimination, enactment and implementation of minority-friendly laws and freeing the country from communalism, fanaticism and terrorism.

Pointing out previous incidents of pre- and post-polls violence, the platform demanded that the Election Commission ensure safety and security of religious and ethnic minorities and indigenous people.

"Under the existing political and social circumstances, religious and ethnic minorities have become fed up with any election. Nowadays, no election brings festivity to them;

rather it brings disasters and misery," Rana said. "If security is not ensured, minorities and indigenous people will be bound to rethink whether they will go to vote

With Hasibul, at least 236 alleged drug traders and peddlers have been killed since the anti-narcotics drive began on May 4. Most of them were killed in so-called shootouts involving police and Rab.

Hasibul's wife Anwara Begum suspects that her husband was killed after he had been arrested.

Talking to this correspondent, Anwara said plainclothes law enforcers in several motorcycles and a white microbus picked up Hasibul from Muraripur area on Wednesday evening.

"Locals called me to inform that the law enforcers picked up my husband," she said.

Anwara went to Damkura police and was told that they

did not know anything. She said Hasibul was engaged in drug peddling for many

years but left the illegal trade two years ago.

"Police arrested him many times. Two years ago, some locals beat him up for drug peddling and broke his hands and legs. He quit the illegal trade right there," she said.

The military in Myanmar, previously known as Burma, where Buddhism is the main religion, has denied accusations of ethnic cleansing and says its actions were part of a fight against terrorism.

Some US lawmakers and human rights groups have pressed Pompeo to make a declaration of genocide to intensify pressure on Myanmar. While US officials have not ruled this out in the future, some in the Trump administration are wary that it could have legal implications of committing Washington to stronger punitive measures against Myanmar.

In calling for the release of Reuters reporters Wa Lone and Kyaw Soe Oo, Pompeo told Kyaw Tint Swe, minister of the office of the state counselor, that Myanmar must "strengthen and protect freedom of expression and the press."

The two men were convicted on September 3 under the colonial-era Official Secrets Act in a case seen as a test of democratic freedoms in Myanmar.

The reporters, who pleaded not guilty, had been investigating the killing of 10 Rohingya Muslim men and boys by security forces and local Buddhists amid the military response to insurgent attacks last August.

Hold members Demo in NY demands release of Shahidul Alam

Demonstrators in New York gathered outside the United Nations headquarters on Thursday demanding release of noted photographer Shahidul Alam, as Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina addressed the UN

General Assembly. Participants condemned the passage of Digital Security Bill and called for freedom of the press and protection of journalists in Bangladesh at the programme, joined by the Committee to Protect Journalists (CPJ), PEN America, Reporters Without Borders, Amnesty International and Human Rights Watch. Family and friends of Shahidul were also present, says a press release.

They said the passage of the bill points to a disturbing trend towards suppressing freedom of press and speech.

Steven Butler, the Asia program coordinator of Alam today," she said. CPJ, said the legislation "would violate constitutional guarantees of freedom of the press, and would create extensive legal dangers for journalists in the normal course of carrying out their professional activities."

Amnesty International's South Asia Campaigner Saad Hammadi said, "Given how the authorities have arbitrarily arrested hundreds of people in the past six years under the ICT Act, there are serious concerns that the new act will be used against people who speak out."

The protesters denounced the imprisonment of Shahidul, journalists, and student protesters in Bangladesh.

"What is really important for the state is that if one silences the creative artists and intellectuals,

then the conscience of the state is killed, because it's the role of the creative artists and intellectuals to make constructive criticism so that the state can be a real democracy," said Columbia University's Prof Gayatri Spivak. Shahidul, also founder of Drik Picture Library,

was picked up by plainclothes men from his home in the capital's Dhanmondi on August 5. He alleged he was tortured in jail.

He has been denied bail on several occasions and has been staying in prison since then.

Kerry Kennedy, human rights activist and daughter of Senator Bobby Kennedy, said, "Shahidul Alam is wrongfully detained, and I proudly stand with those who are calling for his immediate and unconditional release."

"Bangladesh should comply with its international human rights obligations and free Shahidul

Julie Trébault, director of the Artists at Risk Connection at PEN America, said Shahidul's detention is an "attempt to intimidate and silence voices of dissent in Bangladesh".

South Asia Director of Human Rights Watch Meenakshi Ganguly said the government has accused Shahidul Alam of "false propaganda" but he was doing what he has always done: speak up for human rights.

Wasfia Nazreen, National Geographic Explorer and Bangladesh's only Seven Summiteer, said: "Shahidul is a living legend who taught throughout his life how to see the light of our country, even during her darkest hours... he is being wrongly imprisoned."

Shahidul's cousin Salma Ahmed also spoke.
