

Talking nostalgic days with Ujjal

Megastar Ashraf Uddin Ahmed, better known by his stage name Ujjal, debuted in the world of cinema with Subhash Dutta's 'Binimoy' in 1970. A student of University of Dhaka, Ujjal was a prominent face in the field of television and theatre much before coming into films. Over the years, he made laudable screen pairs with Kabori, Rozina, Babita, Shabana, Shabnam, Sucharita and several others.

"I worked with Kabori in *Binimoy*. She was so beloved at the time that her fans and admirers would crowd the sets whenever she arrived," smiles Ujjal. "Some sequences of the film were shot at Madhabkunda at 500 feet. It was quite a hilarious situation because I couldn't understand what the director was telling me and neither could he hear me." Post the tremendous success of *Binimoy*, there was no looking back for Ujjal.

He further worked opposite Shabana in Anubhab, which was released in 1974. The song Jodi Shundor Ekkhan Mukh Paitam from the film is massively popular among the audience to this day.

Unfortunately, Ujjal met with a leg injury during the shooting of the film *Oporadh*. "It was a difficult time in my career because I was afraid I would not be able to pull of certain roles anymore," says Ujjal. However, he still got roles in films like *Janata Express, Kudraat* and *Phooler Shori* after the accident.

Ujjal then tried his hand at the genre of action with Mumtaz Ali's *Naalish* in 1982 opposite Shabana. The film's success was unparallel at the time. For about two decades,

his avatar as an action star earned him immense popularity with films like *Naseeb* and *Usila* among others. He has also worked in the notable film *Shomadhi* with the likes of Razzak, Babita and Sucharita. He describes that experience as a pivotal point in his career. Ujjal adds that he has spent some of the most memorable days of his life with actors Zafar Iqbal, Farooque and Sohel Rana.

He also spoke about the adoration he received from his fans. "I remember receiving thousands of fan mails and even love letters. I had a good time reading them," says a nostalgic Ujjal.

SALAHUDDIN AHMED PAULASH'S

'Rohingya Crisis: Through Despair there is Hope'

Bangladeshi photographer Salahuddin
Ahmed Paulash bagged the Ian Parry
Scholarship 2018 in the "Award for Potential"
category. The Ian Parry Scholarship grants
\$3,500 prize money and a year-long
mentorship programme for young photographers who are under 24, and attending a fulltime photographic education. Mushfiqul
Alam, another Bangladeshi photographer,
also won the Ian Perry Scholarship in the
"Highly Commended" category.

Paulash is a documentary photo activist from Bangladesh working as a photojournalist with UNB. To hone his skills he is also pursuing a course in Pathshala South Asian Media Institute. His work has been published in the New York Times, Time, The Wall Street Journal, Associated Press, Reuters, Independent-UK and UNB. His notable exhi-





bitions include 2015 Visa Pour L'Image, Ian Parry Scholarship Exhibition, Perpignan, France, and the 2015 Ian Parry Scholarship Exhibition, London, UK.

Paulash received the award for his famous series 'Rohingya Crisis: Through Despair there is Hope.' During the last few years, Myanmar has been forcing its Rohingya Muslim population into the neighbouring Bangladesh. In August 2017 an enormous humanitarian crisis erupted after Myanmar's military carried out a violent purge, leading thousands of Rohingya Muslims – mostly women and children – to flee to Bangladesh. Paulash stayed at the camps in Cox's Bazar for four months, extensively documenting the perilous journey of

the refugees. Some of those he met there had lost their identities and loved ones in Myanmar, and they are now living in squalid conditions without access to basic medical care. This photographic project centres on the struggle for health and survival in the camps, especially for women and children. He believes the desperate plight of these people needs to be the focus of greater worldwide attention.

An award night will take place in Mayor Office London on October 9 when the awardees will formally receive the Ian Parry Scholarship. Besides, a month long (October 1-30) exhibition, featuring their works will open at More London Riverside outside City Hall.



The lively rhythm of different forms of Latin dance - Cha-cha-cha, Tango, Salsa, Rumba, Samba, Mambo, Lambada, Merengue - can brighten up anyone's mood. To help the people of Dhaka appreciate the dance form, 3rd Space has introduced Latin dance classes.

3rd Space is a community platform in Dhanmondi, where individuals gather to nurture their creative interests. Every Friday and Monday nights, energetic Latin music surrounds the atmosphere of the place.

"I want people to relax and just have fun," says Shafrina Khatun, one of the co-owners of 3rd Space. There are also sessions for kids
