

Quake, Tsunami in Indonesia

Hundreds killed

At least 384 dead as 7.5 tremor causes devastation; toll could be 'thousands'

At least 384 people were killed, many swept away as giant waves crashed onto beaches, when a major earthquake and tsunami hit the Indonesian island of Sulawesi, authorities said yesterday.

Hundreds had gathered for a festival on the beach in the city of Palu on Friday when waves as high as six metres (18 feet) smashed onshore at dusk, sweeping many to their death and destroying anything in their path, following a 7.5 magnitude earthquake.

"When the (tsunami) threat arose yesterday, people were still doing their activities on the beach and did not immediately run and they became victims," Sutopo Purwo Nugroho, the spokesman for Indonesia's disaster mitigation agency BNPB said in a briefing in Jakarta.

"The tsunami didn't come by itself, it dragged cars, logs, houses, it hit everything on land," Nugroho said, adding that the tsunami had travelled across the open sea at speeds of 800 kph (497 mph) before striking the shoreline.

Some people climbed six metre trees to escape the tsunami and survived, he said.

Amateur footage shown by local TV stations showed waves crashing into houses along Palu's shoreline, scattering shipping containers and flooding into a mosque in the city.

Around 16,700 people were evacuating to 24 centres in Palu.

Aftershocks rocked the coastal city until yesterday afternoon following the massive earthquake on Friday, which triggered the tsunami. The series of earthquakes were felt in an area with 2.4 million people.

Nugroho described the damage as "extensive" and said thousands of houses, hospitals, shopping malls and hotels had collapsed. A bridge washed away and the main highway to Palu was cut off due to a landslide.

Atrocities on Rohingyas genocide

Newly-introduced US legislation says STAR REPORT

US Congressman Steve Chabot, Chairman Royce and Ranking Member Engel on Thursday introduced a bipartisan measure to declare the Myanmar military's atrocities against the Rohingya genocide, according to a statement issued by the House Foreign Affairs

Committee. "The Burmese military is engaging in horrific violence against Rohingya men, women and children. Their actions amount to genocide," said Edward R Royce in the statement issued on Friday.

This is a straightforward resolution to put the US Congress on record.

Earlier this week, Royce said, "Confronting genocide of the Rohingya is a moral issue. And a national security issue." Also this week, the US

BNP gets rally nod on 22 conditions

Set to unveil demands at Suhrawardy Udyan rally today; police say party must arrange own security

With about three months before the national election, the BNP will come up with some specific demands, including polls under a nonpartisan administration, from its rally at Suhrawardy Udyan today.

The party believes the process for a "greater national unity" will move forward based on these demands, which also include release of Khaleda Zia and dissolution of parliament ahead of the election.

"We will place our charter of demands before the people and announce our next course of action," Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir, secretary general of the party, told The Daily Star yesterday.

The Dhaka Metropolitan Police gave permission for the rally on 22 conditions, including the party's own arrangement of security, when two BNP representatives met DMP Commissioner Asaduzzaman Mia around 11:30am yesterday.

The BNP will have to install highresolution CCTV cameras inside and outside the venue, set up archways and use metal detectors at all entry points, scan rally-bound vehicles with own scanners and arrange fire extinguishers in the venue, police said.

The DMP also banned all activities that can hamper public safety; carrying sticks; speech hurting religious sentiments, and arriving at the venue in processions.

Police asked the party leaders to end the rally by 5:00pm.

The BNP has been planning a massive gathering for today's rally. The party has asked its units at eight districts adjacent to Dhaka to bring people to send the government a message that they have the strength for both waging movement and contesting election.

The last time the party held a meeting at the historic Suhrawardy Udyan was in November last year when Khaleda Zia was present.

An employee of Ekattor TV was killed when a bus crushed his motorcycle near Jahangir Gate in the capital yesterday.

Anwar Hossain, 32, was a marketing executive of the television channel, Habib Rahman, a staff correspondent of Ekattor TV told The Daily Star. Quoting witnesses, Habib said Anwar was on his way to

work in Baridhara from his Jhigatola home when an Uttarabound bus rammed his bike around 9:45am. The bus first hit an auto-rickshaw near the Jahangir Gate intersection on Kazi Nazrul Islam Avenue and tried to flee

the scene of the accident. It then rammed Anwar's bike and pushed him up the road at least 25 feet before running him over, Habib added. Pedestrians stopped the bus and traffic police pulled him

out from under the bus, he added. Anwar was taken to Kurmitola General Hospital in a

critical condition. Doctors declared him dead around 12:45pm, he said. After an autopsy, Anwar's body was taken to Ekattor TV's

Baridhara office for a namaj-e-janaza, Habib said. His body will be taken to his village home at Kalai upazila of Joypurhat for burial.

Police the detained bus driver Mohammad Sujan, 22, and seized the bus, Abul Kalam Azad, a sub-inspector of Kafrul Police Station, said.

Police are now interrogating him, Kamal Hossain, additional deputy commissioner (Mirpur zone) of DMP, said.
