Khaleda taken to BSMMU

5-member medical board formed; BNP expresses displeasure, saying 3 docs on the board loyal to AL

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia was shifted to Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujib Medical University (BSMMU) from Dhaka's Old Central Jail for treatment yesterday, in line with a High Court order.

The BSMMU authorities formed a five-member medical board to assess her health condition. Khaleda, 73, has been suffering from problems in the

knees and other ailments for long, according to government doctors who treated her since she landed in jail on February 8 in a corruption case. Her personal doctors who met her in ail said she suffered a "mild stroke" on June 5.

Soon after her arrival at the BSMMU around 3:40pm, hospital Director Brig Gen Abdullah Al Harun met the former prime minister at her VIP cabin along with other senior doctors.

The medical board will decide on the duration of her stay in the hospital, he told reporters later in the evening, adding that the team would hold a meeting at 1:00pm today to SEE PAGE 2 COL 2

CLAIM OVER ST MARTIN'S Myanmar ambassador summoned

Myanmar has come up with another false claim showing Bangladesh's St Martin's Island as part of its territory, prompting Dhaka to lodge a strong protest.

The government yesterday summoned Myanmar Ambassador in Dhaka U Lwin Oo and strongly protested the incident.

Rear Admiral (retd) M Khurshed Alam, maritime affairs secretary at the foreign ministry, summoned the Myanmar envoy to his office in the afternoon and handed over a strongly worded protest note to him.

However, the Myanmar envoy said it was a "mistake" to show the St Martin's Island as part of his country's territory, a diplomat told UNB.

If anyone looks back at the history since 1937, he will find that the island had never been a part of Myanmar. Dhaka says there is an "ulterior motive"

He said the commission was yet to fix the date for announcing the polls schedule.


However, on September 27 and August 7, the CEC said the election schedule would be announced this month and the election was likely to be held in December.

Leave politics to politicians

President urges at DU convocation, slams professionals' tendency to enter politics after retirement



President Abdul Hamid yesterday urged all political parties to promote those who have an early orientation in politics, as it is not right to become a politician overnight, reports UNB.

"I have been in politics for so many years ... but if I want to be an assistant professor at Dhaka University today, can I? Many government bureaucrats, army officers, doctors, engineers want to get involved in politics after retirement ... but why? Now, all political parties should think about it seriously," he said.

The president was speaking at the 51st convocation of Dhaka University at the central playground on the campus.

"It is not right to try to be a politician overnight without early orientation ... Those who are in politics since an early age should be given the opportunity to continue politics. There has been no qualitative change in politics, as professionals are making direct entry into politics," he observed.

"Experts are needed. So, political parties can invite professionals as experts, but they shouldn't invite them for direct engagement in politics. There's no problem if anyone enters politics directly without taking up any job."

The president urged the political parties to ensure utmost professionalism in politics to bring a qualitative change, BSS reports.

"Only the politicians, who do politics since early years in their life, will do politics," said the former speaker of the Jatiya Sangsad.

A case of sheer negligence?

Prior to his departure for Australia on Friday night, premier Bangladesh allrounder Shakib Al Hasan said that his injured finger would never be the same again.

"This finger [his left little finger] will not be 100 per cent okay again. Since the bone is soft here, there is no possibility to fix it like it was before. By operating they [the doctors] will bring it to a position so that I can grip the bat well and continue my career as a cricketer," Shakib told reporters with a somber voice at the Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport.

His latest statement is quite moving, especially after the way his injury was handled by the team management during last month's Asia Cup in the UAE.

100 police teams active nationwide

2 YouTubers held for 'spreading rumour

Around 100 police teams across the country are monitoring social media to the prevent spread of rumours and fake news.

Police said the teams were formed as circulation of false information on social media platforms was causing deterioration in law and order. The move came after various rumours were spread on

social media centring the recent student movements for quota reform and road safety. Each police team, with four to five members, has been

working since the first week of last month, said Sohel Rana, assistant inspector general (media) of the police headquarters (PHQ). The teams would be supervised by the cyber crime coor-

dination team of the PHQ.

Led by an assistant superintendent of police, the teams have already been provided with necessary cyber monitoring tools. They will continue their work until the proposed Cyber Crime Investigation Bureau (CCIB) comes into effect, police officials said.

A coordination cell, which is monitoring activities of the teams, has been tasked with updating the policemen about fake news on social media, they said.

On the CCIB, a top police official said the specialised unit would be equipped with open source intelligence (OSINT), which helps law enforcers collect data from publicly available sources.

Trucks won't carry goods from today

Owners, workers call indefinite strike to protest transport act

Bangladesh Goods Transport Owners Workers United Association yesterday announced that truck owners and workers would abstain from work across the country from 6:00am today to press home their seven-point demand, including bringing changes to the Road Transport Act-2018.

Leaders of the platform, which represents around 80,000 owners and workers, said they would not transport any goods, including life-saving medicine and food, until their demands were met.

"The death penalty for truck drivers is an illogical punishment as they provide services to the nation by transporting goods. If the government does not take an initiative to amend the law, we will continue
