Worker dies in factory boiler blast

A worker died and another was injured after a factory boiler exploded in Fatullah of Narayanganj yesterday. The blast at Al-Nasir

Washing-Dying factory in Lalkha area injured Selim Khan, 30, and Abdul Miah, 20, said Aminul Islam, subinspector of Fatullah Model Police Station. The boiler exploded

around 4:45am, leaving the duo with critical injuries. They were taken to Dhaka Medical College Hospital.

Selim succumbed to his injuries at 10:30am at DMCH. Abdul is still undergoing treatment.

The factory management staff are absconding, SI Aminul said. The tin-roof was blown away in the explosion and damages were caused to the factory.

Police are trying to arrest the management staff, SI Aminul added. The explosion took place as the machines of the factory were old. The matter is being investigated, he said.

Stop industrialisation in Sundarbans before election schedule

Environmentalists urge govt

The National Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power and Ports yesterday urged all political parties in the country to include forestry reservation, especially the Sundarbans, and environmental protection in their manifesto for the 11th national polls.

Speaking at a press conference at Mukti Bhaban in Dhaka, activists also demanded that the government stop all industrialisation near the Sundarbans, the world's largest mangrove forest, before declaring the schedule of the election. The committee organised the conference to place its

demands for the next polls where it announced rallies, human chains and seminars in October and November to wage the demands. In a keynote paper, its member secretary Anu Muhammad alleged that apart from the destructive coal-

grabbers have undertaken more than 300 commercial projects near the Sundarbans. "Such projects should be stopped to protect the

based Rampal power plant, a group of forest- and land-

Sundarbans as well as our environment," he said.

Two indemnity acts in the country's power sector -- that allow implementation of the projects in this sector beyond legal barriers -- create obstacles to stopping the harmful activities and protect the forest, said Anu Muhammad, a professor of Jahangirnagar University.

Political parties should commit to abolish such indemnity acts, and include forestry reservation to their election manifesto, he added.

Scaling up startups

Young Bangla, Microsoft join hands BSS, Dhaka

With an aim to boost growth of IT-based entrepreneurship, youth organisation Young Bangla and Microsoft's Bangladesh chapter yesterday pledged to launch a platform for providing potential startups with all sorts of assistance.

On the last day of a four-day summit -Young Bangla Microsoft Summit -- at IEB auditorium in Dhaka, five start-ups, out of 250, were awarded with cheques worth Tk 5 lakh each, alongside other support for expansion.

Yesterday, 20 teams presented their ideas in front of judges, including Radwan Mujib Siddig, trustee, Center for Research and Information (CRI); Nasrul Hamid Bipu, state minister for power, energy and mineral resources; Sonia Bashir Kabir, managing director, Microsoft Bangladesh, Nepal, Bhutan and Laos; and Sabbir Bin Shams, executive director, CRI.

The winning ideas are developing software for Bangla sign language (team BSL), connecting veterinary doctors with rural farmers (gorur doctor), using urban farming technologies to supplement traditional farming (micro beats), making lives better for senior citizens (blaze warrior) and introducing bicycle service "CHOLO" to avoid city traffic

(finance wizard). Radwan Mujib said, "We always intend to build bridge between youths and policymakers so their [youths] voice gets properly reflected in national policies."

Sonia Bashir said 100 volunteers engaged as campus ambassadors under the network will be made Microsoft's brand ambassador.

Curb air pollution in Dhaka: green activists

Green activists yesterday urged the authorities concerned to take immediate steps to properly control air pollution caused by dust in the capital and ensure punishment for people responsible. They came up with the demand at

a human chain organised in front of Jatiya Press Club.

Some 16 rights organisations including Poribesh Bachao Andolon (Poba) and Nagorik Odhikar Songrokkhon Forum (NASOF) organised the event to draw the attention of authorities concerned in this regard. The speakers said Dhaka's dust

menace is getting worse, especially in dry season, due to unplanned development projects, brick kilns and drain sludge kept on roads. Their other demands include

ensuring regular cleaning of streets, framing rules for mandatory covering of dusty construction materials during transportation and construction, and raising awareness among people.

Rab arrests 5 for 'selling fake question papers'

Rab yesterday claimed to have arrested five frauds who duped people by circulating fake question papers of MBBS admission tests, and six question paper-seeking admission aspirants, from different places of the capital in the last two days.

The gang used to prepare fake question papers and circulated them among medical admission aspirants through messaging apps for money, said Md Kaiyumuzzaman Khan, commanding officer of Rab-10, at a press briefing yesterday. The gang used to sell fake question papers for MBBS and BDS exams of medical

colleges, universities and dental colleges, he added.

On information, several Rab teams arrested them along with bank cheques worth around Tk 1.24 crore and academic transcripts of the aspirants, he said.

Some admission aspirants and their guardians gave those to the gang members to have the question papers, Rab said.

FROM PAGE 3 press, Speaker Shirin Sharmin Chaudhury on Tuesday signed the bill passed by parliament

on September 19. With the president's assent, the bill will

become a law. Sampadak Parishad (Editors' Council), a platform of editors of the country's national

dailies, and journalists and other media persons have expressed serious concerns over sections 8, 21, 25, 28, 29, 31, 32, and 43 of the bill, saying those sections pose serious threats to freedom of expression and media operation.

At yesterday's meeting, Prof Anu Muhammad, member secretary of the National Committee to Protect Oil, Gas, Mineral Resources, Power and Ports, said the Editors' Council have done a "timely and commendable" job by raising its concerns and explaining the loopholes and problems

of the bill before the government. "The government has an ill intention and that's why it formulated the law [the Digital Security Bill 2018]," he said.

Law enforcers "randomly" picked up people who were later sent to jail without any conviction. Journalists were also beaten up, Anu Muhammad added.

Attempt to bring such activities under a legal framework reflects the government's intention, added Anu, an Economics professor at Jahangirnagar University.

Zonayed Saki, chief coordinator of the central executive committee of Ganasamhati Andolon, said very few of the country's laws were as repressive as the Digital Security Bill.

Government employees have been given indemnity through the law, he said. "Thinking about it makes me shudder." Saiful Haque, general secretary of

Revolutionary Workers' Party of Bangladesh

and coordinator of the Left Democratic Alliance, said it would not be wrong if the bill was termed Government Protection Act. It is totally unimaginable that such a law could exist in present Bangladesh, he said,

Girl dies in hospital, family alleges negligence

A mentally challenged girl died at Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College Hospital on Friday night due to negligence of doctors, her family alleged.

The deceased is Meherunnisa Khanam, 15, daughter of Abdus Sahid Khan of Sylhet Sadar. She was admitted to the medicine ward on Wednesday

with physical illness. On Friday afternoon, her condition deteriorated, the family said. They alleged that they requested intern doctors to attend

to her but they did not, saying the senior doctor was not there and once the doctor arrives he would check-up on her. Later, a doctor from another ward arrived and declared Meherunnisa dead, said her brother Jahangir Alam Khan. "My

sister died due to negligence of the duty doctors," he alleged. Debapada Roy, deputy director of the hospital, said, "We have already taken statements from the patient's family and adding that LDA would organise programmes the duty doctors. We will take action if any negligence is against the formation of the controversial bill. found."
