Indian products rule border haats

Border haats, which are meant to trade produce of border communities to help them improve their livelihoods, are selling products usually consumed by urban people.

As India has a variety of products, its vendors are the sellers and Bangladeshis the buyers. And India dominates transactions with over 80 percent market share, according to sellers, buyers and local people.

A team of The Daily Star found this while visiting a border haat located at Purba Madhugram in Feni, Bangladesh and Srinagar in

Tripura, India. The haat is open for business every Tuesday from 10am to 4pm. On the day, about Tk 1 crore worth of goods are sold at 104 shops. Indian vendors sell chocolates, cosmetics,

baby food and saris to buyers of the other side, while Bangladeshis sell fish, dry fish and plastic goods to a few Indians.

"I sell Tk 1 lakh to Tk 1.5 lakh worth of cosmetics, chocolates and baby food on every haat day," said Samiran Roy, a vendor from Tripura.

Roy sees huge demand of these products among Bangladeshis as they are cheaper than the normal market prices.

In his shop a Kit Kat, a chocolate-coated wafer bar confection, was selling for Tk 30, which is half the normal market price **DISPLAY CENTRE** -- thanks to the duty benefits.

> Similarly, Cadbury, Perk, Safari bars could be found at half the market rate in Bangladesh. Indian saris also have a good demand among the Bangladeshi customers, said Kabir Boidya, another vendor from Tripura.

> At the haat, Benarasi saris could be bought for Tk 3,000, cotton Tk 500 and silk for Tk 1,000, he added.

Shishu Ranjan Tripura, a vendor of the locality, said his income has doubled since he started trading at the haat three months ago. Almost all the buyers are Bangladeshis, said a

frustrated Baloram of Feni, who runs a biscuit shop at the market. "The Indian shops are overcrowded while we

are sitting idle," he said, adding that shop owners from adjacent upazilas flock to the haat to buy merchandise on the cheap. Some individual consumers also go to the

market to take advantage of the lower prices. Mohammad Alauddin from Feni district

town comes to the market twice a month to buy some toiletries and baby food for his family.

Alauddin said he bought a large pack of Huggies brand nappies for Tk 500; the same item is sold at Tk 700 in the local market.

On the other hand, dwellers from adjoining Indian villages prefer to buy fish, dry fish and some plastic utensils from the haat.

Mithun Saha, a school teacher from Udaypur in Tripura, came along with two of his female colleagues for the first time. He bought a piece of dry Ilish (Hilsha) at Tk 500 and two kilograms of lentil.

Anonymous transaction via mobile raises risks: study

Anonymous transaction through the mobile payment service is considered the most vulnerable area as it creates scope for money laundering, a survey found.

Some 81 percent of bankers identified the transaction from anonymous sources as the major concern for money laundering while improper KYC (Know Your Customer) encourages such transactions, according to the perception survey.

Management (BIBM) conducted the survey titled "Money Laundering Vulnerabilities in New Payment Systems".

BIBM, who led the research, presented the findings at a workshop at the institute's auditorium in Dhaka yesterday.

A weak identification process and lack of

verification mechanism as well as identity fraud encourage fund transfer from anonymous sources through electronic payment channels such as mobile banking, card payment and agent banking, according to the research.

According to the bankers' perception, proper selection of agents is the biggest challenge when it comes to fighting money laundering. Unhealthy competition among the

banks is also a major factor for the wrong The Bangladesh Institute of Bank selection of agents. Ultimately it leads to improper customer identification problem. Other concerns are a lack of awareness

and anonymous funding, according to the Shah Md Ahsan Habib, director of the survey. Due to a lack of technological expertise, bankers face difficulties in detecting complex transactions under internet banking, the report said.

Regional trade falters for higher duty: expert

Despite agreeing to lower tariffs back in the 1980s, regional trade in South Asia is still not flourishing for higher duty, said Commerce Secretary Shubhashish Bose yesterday.

The average tariff rate of the South Asian nations is 13.6 percent, which is more than double the global average of 6.3 percent. As a result the intra-regional trade volume among the

South Asian nations is still 5 percent of their total annual foreign trade in a year, which is one of the lowest in the It is not clearly stated in the South Asian Free Trade Area guideline how to phase out the sensitive lists of goods to

eliminate the tariffs holding back trade among the South Asian nations, he said. "We need to work to remove tariff and non-tariff barriers," Bose said, while he was moderating a session on barriers to intraregional trade in South Asia at the 2nd South Asia Maritime and Logistics Forum at Le Meridien Hotel in

Dhaka. The estimated trade potential among South Asian nations is \$67 billion. In reality, it is \$23 billion.

Bose went on to hint of a possible comprehensive economic partnership agreement with India that will guarantee not only commodity trade but services and investment.

The political leaders of the region should work together to eliminate the mistrust that is acting as a major barrier to trade among the nations, the participants at the session said.

"We are living in the world of trade war," said Md Nojibur

Rahman, principal secretary to the prime minister. For South Asia this is the best of time to work on intraregional trade. "We would be pursuing a win-win

situation," he added. In another session G Chandrashekhar, an Indian cotton trade expert, said there is a possibility of the price of cotton to increase in the world market because of trade war

between the US and China. Chinese spinners have started buying cotton from India

after the US slapped 25 percent retaliatory duty. As a result, the demand for Indian cotton will go up. But at the same time there is a possibility of lower cotton production this year.

Post offices to make e-commerce delivery

Bangladesh Post Office will deliver parcels for online marketplaces to all parts of the country from now onwards, in a development that can be viewed as a shot in the arm for the e-commerce players.

"The post office has the largest delivery platform and ecommerce entrepreneurs could use this infrastructure to reach the remotest parts of the country easily," said Posts, Telecommunication and ICT Minister Mustafa Jabbar at the inauguration of e-post, Bangladesh Post Office's dedicated department for e-commerce deliveries.

Until now, the delivery channels available to the ecommerce platforms were restricted to the urban areas, meaning a large chunk of the market was cut off to them.
