Thorny issues remain thorny

Country ticks towards 90-day countdown to JS polls beginning Oct 31

Less than two weeks before the 90-day countdown for holding the general election begins, a number of contentious political issues remain unresolved.

The issues include the nature of the polls-time government and dissolution of parliament before announcement of the election schedule -- two key demands of the BNP and some other opposition parties.

Under the constitutional provision introduced in 2011, the next national election must be held within 90 days before the five-year term of the current parliament expires on January 28. And the Election Commission has said it would announce

the schedule any day after the countdown begins on October 31. The government and the ruling Awami League have already rejected the

opposition demand for a nonpartisan administration and dissolution of parliament, saying the election will be held in line with the constitutional provisions -- that is under the current government.

However, the size of the government during the election remains The prime minister and some of her cabinet colleagues have said the

polls-time cabinet will carry out some routine work only and provide all assistance to the EC to hold the polls.

Another unsettled issue is the deployment of army during the election.

In the 2008 parliamentary election, armed forces personnel were deployed to work alongside regular law enforcement agencies. At the time, army personnel were given the power to arrest troublemakers without warrant. That power was curtailed by amending the law after the 2008 elecALLIANCE-Y

QUITTING 20-PARTY Rifts emerge in NAP, NDP

Jebel Rahman Ghani, chairman of Bangladesh National Awami Party, also known as Bangladesh NAP, was expelled yesterday by one of the party's senior leaders, MN Shaon Siddiqui, for what he said was a "violation of the party charter".

However, Ghani claimed that it was Shaon who was expelled from the party for breaching party discipline.

"He [Shaon] does not belong to the party anymore," Golam Mostofa, general secretary of the party said.

Meanwhile, Shaon, who now claims to be the party chief, rejoined the BNP-led alliance again yesterday.

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KSA deports another 80 Bangladeshis

MoUs to enhance cooperation in chemical, steel and solar power sectors between the two countries. He said apart from meeting the Saudi King, the PM also had a courtesy meeting with

the kingdom's Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman in the evening. Foreign Minister AH Mahmood Ali, at a press conference in Dhaka on October 15,

announced that two memorandums of understanding (MoUs) -- one on defence and the other on ICT -- would be signed during Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's visit to the gulf country.

Ali, however, did not elaborate on the defence deal.

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Crimea college attack kills 19

Gunman opens fire at fellow pupils before killing himself; dozens hurt; probe launched

At least 19 people were killed and dozens injured at a college in the Black Sea region of Crimea yesterday afternoon when a student went through the building shooting at fellow pupils before killing himself, Russian law enforcement officials said.

Eighteen-year-old Vladislav Roslyakov turned up at the college in the city of Kerch carrying a firearm and then began shooting, investigators said. His body was later found in the college with what they said were selfinflicted gunshot wounds.

There were no immediate clues as to his motive in mounting such an attack, which recalled similar shooting sprees carried out by students in US schools.

Soon after the attack, Russian officials said they were investigating the possibility that it was terrorism. Troops with armoured personnel carriers were sent to the scene. Local parents were told to collect their children from the city's schools and kindergartens for SEE PAGE 2 COL 2
