Woman throws newborn off hospital roof, kills herself

Following a "quarrel" with her expatriate husband over medical bill, a woman killed her newborn by throwing him from the roof of a five-storey hospital building and then committed suicide by jumping off it.

The incident took place around 8:30am yesterday at Labaid Diagnostic Centre and Specialised Hospital in Brahmanbaria.

On Tuesday morning, Shima Akter, 25, was admitted to the adjacent Life Care Shishu and General Hospital with labour pain. Her mother, Rehana Begum, accompanied her.

She gave birth to a boy by caesarean section the same night and was due to be released from the hospital yesterday morning, said doctors.

Unbeknownst to all, she somehow managed to get out of the hospital on Old Jail Road and then went to the adjacent Labaid building, said Selim Uddin, officer-in-charge of Brahmanbaria Sadar Model Police Station. He said police were yet to find out the reason behind her

actions but according to hospital staffers, other patients and eye witnesses, Shima killed her son and committed suicide over a quarrel with her expatriate husband the night before. Her husband, Monir Mia, of Basudeb union in

Brahmanbaria Sadar upazila, is in Lebanon now. The couple got married last year. This correspondent also spoke to one Shimul Mia, who

witnessed the incident. Shimul Mia, an employee of nearby Shandhani Child

Care Hospital, said he was standing on the street when the incident took place. "Our hospital is just opposite Labaid. While standing, I

saw something fell from the roof of that building. Many passers-by started screaming, saying it was a child. Some also shouted that a woman threw the child," he said. "I instantly looked up and saw the woman standing near

the edge. She was about to jump. All were shouting and telling her not to do so. Suddenly, she jumped," he added.

While visiting Life Care hospital, this correspondent saw Shima's mother, Rehana Begum, sitting on the cabin's bed. She was wailing and was beyond any consolation. She kept on saying why her daughter would act in such a way.

'We don't consider AL our rival now'

Says BNP senior leader Nazrul Islam Khan

BNP senior leader Nazrul Islam Khan yesterday said they do not consider Awami League as their rival now as they have to face the law enforcers, not the ruling party, in politics.

"We don't consider Awami League as our rival now. Not Awami League, police, Rab and BGB stand in front of us when we want to bring out any procession and hold any rally. BNP has to face different government forces, not Awami League," he said.

The BNP leader came up with the remarks while speaking at a discussion arranged by Afsar Ahmed Siddiqui Smrity Foundation at

Jatiya Press Club in Dhaka. Nazrul, a BNP standing committee member, said the government is making "black laws one after another to gag the media and people's voice. "Those who struggle for democracy and

raise voice for the restoration of democracy are being convicted in false cases," he alleged. Besides, he said, the government is trying

to suppress opposition leaders and activists by filing "fictitious" cases and "indulging in killing and enforced disappearance".

The BNP leader alleged that the ruling party has long been rigging votes in elections by using the law enforcers as its shield.

He said people do not believe that the national election will be held in a fair and

A youth has landed in prison on the charge of sexual harassment after the victim caught him and took him to police in Bogura town on Tuesday.

The girl said she was groped by Abid, 19, a local delinquent, when she was aboard a rickshaw in Kathaltali area. Police said the youth lives in Nishindhara area and was earlier taken to the police station for pickpocketing.

The 18-year-old victim said, "On Tuesday I was going to a bookshop in Kathaltali with one of my friends. Our rickshaw was stuck in a traffic jam, and it was around 7:00pm. Suddenly I felt someone groping me. I caught his hand right

"After getting down from the rickshaw, shouted at him 'why did you touch me'? But I was surprised to see he had not regret. He looked at me as if I were the one who did something wrong."

The girl, who passed HSC exams this year and is a university admission candidate, was even more surprised at the reply when she told him, "I will take you to the police sta-

"'Go on', he said to my face."

In the meantime, a crowd of onlookers and shopkeepers caught him. "They were about to beat him, but I asked

would get sympathy of police and would escape the legal punishment," she said.

With the help of the people, the girl took him to Bogura Sadar Police Station and filed a case, and he was put in the lock-

SM Badiuzzaman, officer-in-charge of the police station, said, "Abid is a local delinquent. Once he was taken to this police station for pick-pocketing."

He said a case was filed against him under the women and children repression prevention act on Wednesday, and the court

sent him to jail the same day. Talking to The Daily Star, the girl said she demands exemplary punishment for the criminal to ensure safety of women in public places. "I will do everything that needs to be done to make sure he gets the punish-

She said, "Maybe I will be a mother someday, and it may be a girl. I won't teach her to draw back in fear from sexual offenders. I

will teach her to fight." Recalling a past incident, she said she first faced sexual harassment when in fifth grade. "This was a mental trauma, and I was haunted by it. This was when I resolved to fight back and raise my voice

Rampant encroachment escalates risk of accidents, congestion in Barishal

Unauthorised vehicle stands, local markets and restaurants set up on highways have led to severe traffic congestion in Barishal division. Moreover, wires, spools, bricks and debris are often left on the highways, escalating the risks

Also, many influential people leave their construction materials beside and on the highways and often, workers continue the works blocking a portion of the roads, alleged locals. Many a times, vehicles load and unload the materials on the roads.

There are some 21 roadside markets and seven vehicle stands within the 40km highway from Barishal to Pirojpur, which witnesses a large volume of traffic daily. Many of these establishments have encroached upon the

Barishal-Khulna highway as well. "Remaining stuck on the highway [Barishal-Khulna] for around 30

The decades-old Bijaya Dashami Mela was held yesterday at Riverview High School ground in Thakurgaon with much fanfare.

People from all caste and creed look up to this fair as it is not only a place where they can find stalls of traditional snacks, handicrafts or amusement rides, but also because it is where they can reunite with friends and acquaintances at least once a
